TAX DISPUTE SETTLED

WEYERHAEUSERS COMPROMISE IN CHEHALIS COUNTY.

Company's Timber Cruise to Be Accepted in Certain Instances. \$50,000 Forfeit Posted.

CHEHALIS, Wash., Aug. 18.—(Special.)— The long-drawn-out contest between the Lewis County Commissioners and the Weyerhaeuser Timber Company over pay-ment of delinquent taxes has been com-promised by a reduction in the 1910 valua-tions on certain lands. It is estimated that the biggest timber

owner in this county owes the county close to \$28,000 in back taxes and accrued interest. The statement of the county owner in this county owes the county close to \$285,000 in back taxes and accrued interest. The statement has been made that the interest is accruing at the rate of \$57 a day. Under the terms of the compromise, which does not in any way affect the back taxes or interest due, the County Board has agreed to the following: Up to date for taxation purposes the company accepts the cruises of timber made by the county cruisers on townships if and 15 in ranges 5 and 6 east. For 1916 and in the future, however, the county accepts the cruises of the company on the same lands, which amounts in substance to a reduction of 33 per cent from the cruise and valuations placed on the property by the county. On township II, range 4, west, the county accepts the company's cruise, which is 30 per cent less than the county's cruise. The same reduction applies to any private holdings in the townships noted.
