

BOURNE'S SECOND DEFENSE LINE AD

Oswald West to Receive Support if Bowerman Secures Nomination.

LEGISLATIVE SLATE MADE

Anti-Assembly Does Work Deftly. Names Beginning With A B and C Are Preferred for Strategic Reasons.

Senator Jonathan Bourne, Jr., since his return from Washington, D. C., a week ago, has plunged into the anti-assembly campaign to safeguard his political career from wreckage on the reefs of party rehabilitation, and up to the present time has done these things:

Decided upon a complete anti-assembly legislative slate.

Threw force of workers into the field to pass cards and interview voters.

Given all possible impetus to the campaign of Oswald West for the Democratic nomination for Governor.

Purred George C. Brownell out of the running for Senator from Clackamas County, substituting for Brownell a more trusted exponent of Stateism, N. I. and Bourneism.

Chamberlain in Partnership. Perfected political partnership with Senator Chamberlain, with the object of giving the Democratic nomination for Governor to Oswald West, upon whom he can fall back as a second line of defense in the event that the anti-assembly Republican element fails to nominate a man.

Failure has met his efforts to give Stephen A. Lowell, of Penikese, a clear field to run for Governor. In order to have him out of the way in the Senatorial campaign of 1911, failure has met his efforts to thin out the list of anti-assembly candidates for Governor.

Here is the Bourne legislative slate:

For Representative: De T. L. Perkins, A. G. Rushlight, J. C. Smith, James M. Chamberlain, James J. Flynn, J. C. Bryan, W. L. Carter, Stephen Collins, James D. Abbott, Charles A. Bigelow, James Cole, Charles A. Bigelow, W. State Senator—George W. Smith, For Joint Senator—Dan J. Malachuk, For Joint Representative—W. H. Chastain.

Ballot Formula Decided. Here is the formula, as lately decided on and struck from the process yesterday, that is to appear on the ballot after names of Bourne candidates: "Opposed to the assembly plan of nominating candidates for direct primary."

The slate was compiled deftly and the word was passed with utmost diplomacy. Trusted lieutenants called on the various candidates, except in two cases, where personal interviews with Bourne are recorded.

Two requisites were demanded—a name good to find a general place on the ballot, and dependability. Particular care was exercised in the selection of Senator and Joint Senator, as the two elected this year will be held-overs in the legislative session that will decide Bourne's fate, two years hence.

Anti-assembly candidates rejected by Bourne are Ralph C. Clyde, Senator; Fouts, E. G. Annie, L. M. Davis and John B. Gollard. Not until yesterday was it decided whether Clemens or Fouts should be chosen.

Three Men Compose Assembly. The anti-assembly assembly that made the selections was made up of three men, Bourne, Thomas McCusker and James D. Abbott. Messrs. McCusker and Abbott have been scanning the local field for some months in the absence of Bourne and many of those selected were brought into the fight earlier with that express end in view. In making its selections the three-man assembly took only two men whose names are not up at the top of the alphabet—Rushlight, who could hardly be ignored as a local figure, who is favored with profound trust.

The withdrawal of Brownell from the race in Clackamas is taken as obviously the result of a Bourne coup. The means used are strong to end of speculation. Brownell was in the race early. He decided suddenly on Monday to draw out and telephoned that fact to Walter Dimick, who immediately telegraphed the fact to the Legislature of 1910.

In doing what he can for Oswald West, those in touch with the situation aver, Bourne is providing an adequate second line of defense in the event the anti-assembly faction explodes at the primary election. Failing to get a possible winner up against Jay Bowerman, the Bourne plan is plainly to rally his forces to the West standard, obliterate party lines so far as he is able, elect West, and pave the way for a non-political contingent that will pay homage to the Chamberlain-Bourne partnership.

This Bourne is not staking his all on a single flop of the political dice.

Bowerman Worries Opponents. The race for Governor is known to be causing Bourne and his lieutenants grave concern. Jay Bowerman, the assembly candidate, is developing unexpected strength throughout the state. The anti-assembly element, with Dimick, Hofer and Abraham in the field, is badly split. Bourne now favors Judge Dimick, it is said, after having failed to get Dimick and the others out of the way for a fourth man, preferably Judge Lowell. Little was thought of the aspirations of Hofer and Abraham at first. But they are both out on live campaigns and naturally are picking up more or less of a following. Hofer is particularly active and is now touring the state by automobile, meeting hundreds of voters each day. While he is not looked upon as having a remote chance of winning, the effect of his campaign is taken as strengthening Bowerman, since the assembly element is conceded to be tired of party chicanery and therefore will hold together.

At present the Bourne activities are reported to be centered in Multnomah County, but since the menace to Bourneism is reported as statewide, arduous efforts to stem the ominous tide in other directions will likely be undertaken with as little delay as possible.

SHEPHERD REBUKES LAFFERTY Candidate for Representative Denies He Is "Standpatter."

George S. Shepherd, candidate for the Republican nomination for Representative in Congress from the Second District, last night denied the inference made by his opponent, A. W. Lafferty, that he (Shepherd) was a "standpatter." In this regard Mr. Shepherd said:

"I noticed that Mr. Lafferty is quoted in today's Oregonian as saying over the long-distance telephone that he would be glad to meet even Mr. Shepherd and debate on 'standpattism.' Now, I have no patience with such methods. That he should undertake to put me in the 'standpat' class is so manifestly unfair that it should not be countenanced by any one with a pretense of fairness. Had Mr. Lafferty been a resident of Oregon as long as four years, he would know that I have advocated tariff revision downward all this time, and during the last session of Congress I drafted a bill which was introduced by Representative McCredie providing for the removal of restrictions against American registry of corporations when the same are owned by American citizens, but was killed by the shipbuilding and steel trusts, although it had the editorial support of the country, including The Oregonian.
