

Sale of these bonds by the Council will give the Mayor and the Executive Board the long-sought opportunity to proceed rapidly with the construction of the big. high span across the Willamette River. The bid of Ladd & Tilton is not condi-tioned at all upon the outcome of the linguiton that is pending to test the legality of the issue, but merely upon the approval by their attorney as to the tegality. tegality.

Court Action Not Asked.

If it is found that it has insuf-ficient number of signatures, there is ample time for the St. Johns people to file an amended petition, as the Council cun pass the necessary resolution within 20 days of the November election. There-fore, the town is certain to be allowed the privilege of voting on the subject.
