Many think that because Oregon has contributed so much in land sales a large apportionment should be made for this state out of the appropriation of \$20,000,000 by Congress for irrigation. There are sections of country, like Arirons, where nobody will buy land be-cause it is nothing but desert and irrigation is absolutely necessary to make it valuable. The reason there have been large land sales in Oregon and other places is because irrigation is not absolutely necessary, else no one would buy. Where land sales cannot be made freigation is necessary to make the land productive. The question is, shall

The foregoing reasoning on the subject of irrigation was made by Briga-dier-General W. L. Marshall, consult-ing engineer to the Secretary of War, at the Portland Hotel, yesterday. General Marshall is accompanying the board of Army engineers appointed to investigate the various irrigation projects in the West for the purpose of advising President Taft as to what dis-tribution should be made of the \$26. 686,666 appropriated by Congress for the reclamation of arid lands. He is not a member of the board, but the board's report will pass through his hands before reaching the Secretary of War for transmission to the President. The General will give his views on the

#### General Likes His Company.

"The board of engineers is acting on its own account and I have nothing to with its work or report. I saw chance to be in good company and joined them. When the report is made f shall be better prepared to review It. continued the General.

"There appears to be so much con-troversy and confusion over the sub-ject of irrigation and so many claims made for a share of the \$20,000,000 which was placed in the hands of the President for distribution that I presume he appointed a disinterested toard, composed of Army engineers, to any extigate all irrigation projects and report the facts to him. Where land sales have been heavy the fact is apparent that it can be culand is for sale in Oklahoma because it has all been bought up and Oklahoma wants a big sum for irrigation because it has contributed so much money to the Government. Oregon has a lot of good land that will produce crops withirrigation, and that is why land sales in this state have been heavy. Then, there is a question about the amount of water used in each district. Too much water can be used as well as not enough. It is a big ques-tion, and I do not know how it will be settled until the report of the engi-neers is made. I will not know then, for the whole matter is in the hands of the President."

General Marshall arrived in Portland ahead of the board of engineers. Lieutenant-Colonel John Biddle, chair-man of the board, and Major Charles W. Kutz, are inspecting the Okanogan project. This project has been re-ported complete but there are 2000 or 4600 arres not provided with ditches. Colonel Biddle did not think it neces-sary to take the entire board into this field to investigate the feasibility of making such a small extension.

Dr. F. H. Dammasch, Assistant City Physician, Declares Disease Is Not. Sprending Enough to Be Menace in This City.

Although between 15 and 20 cases of infantile paralysis have been reported in Portland, and others probably exist which have not been reported to the health authorities, Dr. F. H. Dammasch, assistant city health officer, says the disease is not spreading with sufficient rapidity to cause alarm. "There are more cases in the city than usual," he said last night, "but the disease cannot

be said to be epidemic."
One physician in Oregon City is known to have six cases, which, with the reports that the disease has gained footbold in Vancouver, Wash, show Bend Man Threatened With Death that other towns are suffering as well as Portland.


