Harness Events at Fair Meet Have to Be Postponed to This Afternoon.

\$5000 PACE COMES TODAY

Two Running Races Are Only Speed Events Held on Course Hoof-Deep in Mire—Programme Today Starts at 1 P. M.

TODAY'S PROGRAMME AT LIVESTOCK SHOW. 9 A. M.—Judging of stock begins at above stable.

A muddy track marred the second day's racing at the track of the Portland Fair and Livestock Association yesterday.

Track Is Quagmire. When the regular hour for starting the races arrived, the race course was almost a quagmire.

The first race held yesterday was the five-eighths-mile dash, in which five horses went to the post.

The second running race was the half-mile dash, for which a field of seven starters faced the barrier.

The addition of the two running events to the other three races scheduled for today, makes one of the finest racing cards ever introduced at one afternoon's meet.

The running of this \$5000 pace means much to Portland and if the track is in good shape and the weather favorable, the event is likely to be run in record time.

The withdrawal of Joe McGuire's Hubbard, Jr., was one of the surprises at the track yesterday.

The first race today will be the 2:30 pace postponed from yesterday.

Judges Say Animals at Show Are of Highest Class.

ZOBONA CAPTURES PRIZES

Horse From Illinois Takes First in All His Entries, and Gets Championship Stakes—List of Awards Is Given.

Finer blooded animals have never been assembled in one show than are those exhibited at the Country Club, according to the judges who are here to pass on the fine points of the prize contenders.

On account of the showers which fell intermittently yesterday morning, judging of the animals was not started until 11 o'clock.

One of the prettiest and best poised horses ever seen in Portland is Zobona, owned by W. B. Linn, of Martinville.

In the high class herds are some fine bulls, chief among which is Golden Goods, of short horn stock, owned by W. A. Minor, of Heppner, Or.

Among the large strings of stock on exhibition are 65 heavy draft horses and coach horses from the A. C. Ruby Stock Farm.

In speaking of the general livestock display, Professor Logan, formerly in the Canadian Experimental Farm Service, said that the Portland show had, in all probability, as fine an exhibit as was ever gathered together.
