All the terrible facts in connection with the fatal joyride of early Sunday morning, September 13, 1509, in which Dolly Ferrera was crushed to death, Dolly Ferrera was crushed to death, were recalled yesterday when John Robertson, driver of the automobile, was placed on trial for manslaughter. A jury in Judge Gatens' department of the Circuit Court is hearing the case. The jury was secured, the opening statements made, and seven witnesses examined yesterday.

This is the case in which Robertson and Harry Holland took William M. Ladd's automobile without permission and sped out to the Twelve-Mile House with Mrs Ferrera and Rose and Eva Meyer as passengers.

Drinks, Speeding, Then Disaster.

The party had a few drinks at the tavera according to the testimony yesterday, and had re-entered the automobile and reached the gravel-pit curve when the machine overturned after the front wheel had struck the guy post to a telephone pole.

Harry Holland said Robertson approached the curve at a 15-mile-anhour clip and said that he called to

preached the curve at a la-mine-ma-hour clip and said that he called to him to slacken the speed, as he was fearful of the down grade and the sharp curve. He did not jump up and attempt to take the wheel, he said, as Eva Meyer was sliting on his lap. Eva Meyer corroborated this statement.

John J. Zimmer, the machinist who was employed to repair the automobile, said he found the machine overturned 15 feet from the road, where it lay after crashing through a hoard fence. It had caught fire, he said. Deputy Sheriff Bulger and County Jaller Phillips testified that Robertson appeared to be in a dazed condition after the secident.

Holland Pleads Guilty.

Holland pleaded guilty to a charge of stealing the automobile and was pa-roled. Robertson was acquitted of the charge.

"The trouble in Oregon is that it does not make enough noise about what it wants," said Mr. Hobson. "I believe it can be shown that no project is more de-serving than the 60,000 acres on the Umatilia Reservation. It is deep, rich soil and some of the best in the state. re-gret very much that such an erroneous report about the project as appeared was printed. The assertion that the town of Stanfield will be undermined is ridiculous. The fact is that the reservoir contem-plated by building a dam across the Uma-tilla River does not reach Stanfield. Besides that, the railroad separates Stan-field from the proposed reservoir. The land is worthless without irrigation.

Project Is of Importance.

The Umatilia project is a strip of land about 12 miles wide and 30 miles long on the banks of the Columbia River. It is level and the 90,000 acres are all under the proposed canal. The project is really an extension of the 25,000 acres that have just been placed under water. It will cost between \$3,000,000 and \$4,000,000. The land, when the project is completed, will be worth, on a low estimate, \$200 an acre, or \$12,000,000, so that it would be an exchange of say \$4,000,000 for \$12,000,000. Oregon has contributed about \$10,000,000 from public land sales and has received about \$2,500,000 back. I know of no better project than that on the Umatilla Reser
