Eucharistic Congress Comes to Close.

CANADIAN TROOPS IN LINE

Gathering Most Cosmopolitan Ever Seen in America.

CARDINAL HOLDS SERVICE

Procession Is Four Miles Long and Is Made Up of High Catholic Church Officials, Priests, Soldiers and Laymen.

MONTREAL, Que., Sept. 11.-A religieus pageant as rich in emotional devotion as sacred imagery, and as orderly in behavior as it was diverse in nation ality and huge in size, closed today the twenty-first International Eucharistic time in the Dominion of Canada.

The procession had been arranged to lemonstrate the unity and universality of the Catholic Church. It started from Notre Dame with a preliminary detachment of mounted officers, firemen and Papal zouaves, followed by a choir of 200 male voices. The state, the church and the army were well represented, and there were envoys from the missionary activities in foreign lands.

Spectators Are Silent.

A profound slience stole over the spectators when the Sixty-fifth Degiment, recruited from French-Canadians of Quebec Province, was seen approaching in full dress uniform. The government had wished to give the regiment an opportunity to act as guard of honor to the host, which it does at each recurrence of the fete, but a techinical difficulty had arisen by reason of the men rushed out and lifted the machine presence of a mission from the Papal See. The city was surprised that it had been smoothed over at the last moment. The official order of the Cele-nel was for the regiment to attend a church celebration.

MACHINE OVERTURNS, KILLING MISS FLORENCE PARDEE.

Daughter of ex-Governor of California Victim of Wreck at Corte

SAN RAFAEL, Cal., Sept. II .- Pin oned beneath the weight of a large ouring car that plunged over an embankment on the Corte Madera road to Marin County, Miss Florence H. Pardee, he eldest daughter of ex-Governor of 'alifornia, Dr. George C. Pardee, was killed today.

All of the others of the party of five of which Miss Pardee was a member, were thrown from the machine when it urned turtle, but the injuries they received were slight.

LOWS IN WAKE OF OIL FIRE. Bakersfield Wells Burn, Creating Great Excitement-Fire 1s Finally Extinguished.

BAKERSFIELD, Cal., Sept. 11.—(Spetial.)-Flames shooting 200 feet in the air from two blazing gushers of the orth Midway group of flowing oil wells kept this city and the entire west side oil region in a state of intense excitament for three hours this afternoon unil 200 firefighters succeeded in stopping

Flames from the burning wells shot in all directions, and the men who were rushed out from here struggled desperately to keep the fire away from

other wells in the vicinity. While the flames were at their height fissure more than 1000 feet long and of an unknown depth opened up between two wells, breaking the embankments of imp holes and causing the loss of a large quantity of oil. The crack is supposed to have resulted from the collapse of the cavity left by the sand thrown up by the wells when the men clicked off the flow automatically, and starved out

No estimates have been made regarding the loss caused by the fire. Both of the burning wells stopped flowing, having choked themselves with the sand which the great gas pressure forced up into the casing.
