

ROOSEVELT IS IN FIGHT TO FINISH

Name Will Surely Be Presented to State Convention, Griscorn Says.

PARTY LEADERS ARE MET

Candidates for Governor Are Discussed With ex-President—Bitter Primary Fight Expected in Gotham Today.

OYSTER BAY, N. Y., Sept. 12.—Theodore Roosevelt meant what he said when he announced on his return from his Western trip that he was going home "to fight the bosses."

"Mr. Roosevelt's name certainly will be presented to the Republican state convention," said Lloyd C. Griscorn, president of the New York County Republican committee tonight, after a conference of several hours with Colonel Roosevelt.

"Moreover," he added, "we can count on a majority of the delegates."

In conference with Mr. Griscorn and Mr. Roosevelt were Representative Herbert Parsons, Representative W. M. Seader, of Brooklyn; Controller Proctor, of New York City; F. J. H. Kracke, naval officer of the port, and Postmaster Vorhies, of Brooklyn.

Governorship Is Discussed.

Mr. Griscorn admitted the subject of candidates for Governor had been discussed, but no one name, he said, had been considered to the exclusion of others, as before a choice could be made the preference of state leaders from every section must be learned. The names of W. H. Hotchkiss, State Superintendent of Insurance, and of Clark Williams, State Controller, which have been mentioned, had not come up for consideration, he said, but, although he did not say so, it is known that Mr. Proctor's name was among those discussed.

The Controller himself was asked if he was a candidate, and laughingly replied that he was not.

"Could anything happen between now and September 27 to change your mind?" he was asked.

Roosevelt Says Little.

"I don't know," he answered guardedly.

"President Taft and Colonel Roosevelt," said Mr. Griscorn, "are in perfect accord."

All that Mr. Roosevelt would say was:

"These gentlemen came to discuss the state situation. They report satisfactory progress."

He was told of the Democratic victory in Maine, but had nothing to say. In order to ascertain the exact status of the fight which the progress was making against the old guard for control of the Republican state convention, Theodore Roosevelt summoned a number of leaders to Oyster Bay for a conference. Primaries are to be held in New York tomorrow, and in Buffalo and Rochester on September 20, and Mr. Roosevelt hoped to ascertain "what inside the old guard leaders might be able to make of the New York County delegation and how much progressive support might be expected from Kings County."

Probably one of the bitterest Republican fights in Manhattan tomorrow will be carried on in the Fifteenth District, where the old guard leader, Bennett is a candidate, not only for reelection as district leader, but for the Congressional nomination to succeed J. Van Vechten. The district committee has endorsed the ticket of the Old Guard faction, and Chairman Griscorn, replying to an inquiry today from State committee Harry R. Mack, stated that because of the district committee's endorsement, the Old Guard ticket was to be recognized as backed by the organization.

CLARK PREDICTS TICKETS

Ex-Senator Believes Roosevelt and Harmon Will Be Opponents.

SPOKANE, Wash., Sept. 12.—(Special.)—"Ex-President Roosevelt is undoubtedly grooming himself for the Republican Presidential nomination in 1912, and, barring unforeseen developments, he will probably be the choice of the Republican party," said Senator Clark, of Montana, who arrived in Spokane in his private car early this morning.

"Opposed to Roosevelt will be probably Governor Harmon, of Ohio. Harmon is a strong, clean candidate. The Democratic party will undoubtedly nominate a strong candidate, for chances for Democratic success have never been better than what they are now."

"Had Governor Johnson, of Minnesota, lived there is no question in my mind but that he would have received the nomination from our party."

"The Democrats have three or four good strong men. Mayor Gaynor, of New York, is a strong man. Mr. Bowers, of Missouri, is an able and strong man, and Woodrow Wilson is a good man. Harmon, of Ohio, I believe is the strongest at this time."

In discussing the Roosevelt-Lorimer incident, Senator Clark said:

"The action of ex-President Roosevelt in declining to dine with Senator Lorimer was an exhibition of unbounded assurance and could only come from a Roosevelt. No other man in public life would dare to act so boldly and make such demands when the man in question is a Senator of the United States whose guilt has not yet been established."

TAFT ACTS AS PALLBEARER

Many Distinguished Men at Funeral of Solicitor-General Bowers.

BOSTON, Sept. 12.—With President Taft and other distinguished men in attendance, a funeral service for Solicitor-General Edward W. Bowers was held in the parlor of the Hotel Touraine here today. Mr. Bowers died at the hotel last Friday. Those present numbered hundreds of leading men. Bowers and her son Thomas, a daughter, Miss Martha Bowers, who was traveling in Yellowstone Park when she received the news of the death, were not able to reach Boston today, but will meet her mother and brother at Westfield, Conn., the former home of Mr. Bowers, where burial will take place tomorrow. Congressman Duncan McKinlay of California attended.

President Taft, Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes of the United States Supreme Court, E. P. Hribut of Chicago, Otis H. Walde of Chicago, Thomas B. Marston of Chicago, John Hays Hammond, Washington, James Byrne of New York and Robert Green Monroe of New York, were the honorary pall bearers.

TREATY IS OFFERED

Nicaragua Proposes to Establish Firm Government.

ESTRADA SENDS MESSAGE

President of Southern Republic Would Re-establish Friendly Relations, and Suggests Plan for Paying All Claims.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—A definite programme for the establishment of a stable government in Nicaragua and for the financial rejuvenation of the country was set before the American Government today for its approval, in a long dispatch from Provisional President Estrada, who sent Salvador Castillio, Nicaraguan representative in Washington, presented to Huntington Wilson, Assistant Secretary of State.

First of all President Estrada wishes to re-establish friendly relations with the United States.

He suggests that the American Government appoint a high commissioner to visit Nicaragua, one with full powers to negotiate, if necessary, a treaty covering all the claims which the United States now has against Nicaragua.

Offers Made to Pay Claims.

These include the claim for indemnity for the execution of the Americans, Groce and Cannon, and the Emery claim. The Nicaraguan government desires to settle these claims and to get money to pay them. President Estrada expressed his desire to negotiate a loan which would be guaranteed by the setting aside of one per cent of Nicaragua's customs receipts.

Situation Is Discussed.

Sensor Castillio, representing the Estrada government, had a long conference today with Mr. Dawson, the retiring chief of the Latin-American division, regarding Nicaraguan affairs generally.

Judging from the experience of the Cubans, it might fairly be expected that the election of an assembly and the enactment of laws by that body would consume a period of six months and an equal length of time would be required for the election itself, and the inauguration of the new permanent president. It is expected that within a few days Estrada will issue decrees providing for the election of a constituent assembly as the initial step.

The suspected men are a clerk in the Washington-Alaska Bank of Fairbanks, a relief of the purser of the steamer Tanana, and two miners.

No arrests will be made until more evidence is obtained.

The use of the duplicate bank seal on the boxes by the robbers gave the detectives the first clew. This, with evidence gathered against the clerk, leads the agents to believe that an employee of the Tanana steamer had acted as a relief for the purser, was "fixed" and permitted the two miners to enter the private compartments in which the treasure was stored.

By means of a jimmy, it is believed, they pried off the iron band protecting the seals, removed the end of the box, extruded the gold and substituted the lead in its place. The seal, wires and band were then replaced and the seal and wax of the bank duplicated.

Immediately after the boat landed at Tanana the two miners left for the hills, where they took acquaintances, they intended to hunt. They have not been seen since.

NAGEL MAY BE PUT ON SUPREME BENCH

Washington Gossip Connects Secretary for Position in Court.

RUMOR IS GIVEN CREDENCE

With Death of Solicitor-General Bowers, Nagel, Who Came From District Now Unrepresented, Is Logical Candidate.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—The name of Charles Nagel, Secretary of Commerce and Labor, has replaced that of the late Solicitor-General Bowers in the gossip of Washington on the expected appointments to the present and prospective vacancies in the Supreme Court.

More apparent substance is given to the mention of Mr. Nagel because he hails from the eighth circuit, which although it embraces 12 states, west of the Mississippi, has been without a representative on the Supreme Bench since the death of Justice Brewer. With the death of Mr. Bowers, the rumors regarding Mr. Nagel become decidedly worthy of attention.

Secretary Nagel was born in Texas in 1859, but has lived in Missouri nearly all his life. Part of his education was received in German universities. In the last few years he has been prominent in politics, having been an active member of the Republican National committee in the campaign of 1908. At times he has been mentioned for the United States Senate.

Mr. Nagel's selection would be to fill the prospective vacancy to be created by the resignation of Justice Moody who is understood to have decided to accept the provisions of the recent Congressional enactment, allowing him to retire on a pension on account of ill health. It would still leave vacant the chief justiceship. For this position, it is said, the President has in mind Governor Hughes, of New York.
