#### BABIES BETTER THAN COWS

Court Shows Dalryman Relative Value of Two Lives.

"Lives of children are of more im portance in this court than lives of cows," said Judge Bennett, in Municipai Court yesterday, in speaking of the cases of Leonard Capaul and Casper Huber, charged with seiling milk without a license. The two men are drivers for John Zoller, a dairyman, who sells the milk of 80 cows in the city. All his cattle, said Zoller, have un-dergone some kind of a test for tuber-culosis, and he refused to sumbit to city inspection, during the 60-day per-iod, required for the former inocula-tion to run its course. In the mean-time he attempted to sell the milk from the cows, and ran counter to the Junes Dart Undergoes Operation - city ordinance, which refuses a license for the sale of milk from cows not incounty, of St. Helens, underwent a spected by the city bacteriologist. spected by the city bacteriologist.

Zoller said that he had been influenced by reports circulated by inter-ested persons to the effect that the city ordinance was unconstitutional, and need not be obeyed. Attorney C. J. Schnabel appeared for Zoller, and assured the court that his client was anarious to comply with the law, but did not wish to endanger his cattle by sub-mitting to the test before the former test had run its course. Commercial Club Establishes Industrial Bureau.

**NEW FACTORIES WANTED** 

Manager to Be Placed in Charge of Department to Communicate With Eastern Men Desiring to Locate in Portland.

At an enthusiastic meeting of the promotion committee of the Portland Commercial Club yesterday afternoon it was unanimously decided to establish an industrial bureau in connection with the promotion bureau of the organisa-

The meeting of this committee was called to consider communications from several Eastern capitalists desiring in formation on the manufacturing possibilities of Portland and vicinity. The committee decided to create this new exploitation bureau. G. F. Johnson, chairman of the promotion committee, presided at the meeting, which was attended by all of the members. The committee authorized C. C. Chap-

The committee authorized C. C. Chap-man, manager of the promotion work of the club, to negotiate with a man who is said to have wide experience in this matter, and, if possible, to se-cure his services and place him in charge of the new bureau at once. The object of the new bureau is to furnish data relative to the possibility of establishing manufacturing industries in Portland. The bureau will be required to look up the facilities for securing materials, the cost of building sites. transportation, labor, rent and similar matters connected with the promotion of industries in this vicinity

A number of Eastern capitalists have made inquiry as to the advantages Portland offers for various lines of

anufacturing. Hitherto the promotion work of the Commercial Club has been devoted mostly to the farming branches and the dispersing of information on Oregon lands, but the rapid growth of the city and surrounding community now makes it imperative that new industries be secured, and for this purpos he new bureau is to be established.
Another item which gives Portland a favorable opportunity to secure large industries is that the labor situation here is such as to encourage them. This feature will be exploited in the pamphiets and letters of information to pamphlets and letters of into






