Source Before February 1.

EUGENE, Or., Sept. 15 .- (Special.)-N. EUGENE, Or., Sept. M.-(Special)--N. H. White, gas engineer for the H. M. Eyllesby Company, now in control of the light and gas plants of Eugene. stated today that the new 200,000 cubic feet ca-pacity gas plant which the company has contracted to have finished by February 1 will probably be completed before that time.

This new plant will have seven time the capacity of the present plant and is intended to serve the city for many years. This will be the source of supply for both Eugene and Springfield.


