FRY SAVED BY WARDENS

YOUNG BASS RESCUED FROM STREAMS DRYING UP.

Additional Number to Be Installed in Klamath Lake—Violators of Game Law Punished.

J. L. Green, chief deputy game warden under Warden Stevenson, is busy completing the work of transplanting 50,000 bass fry from streams and sloughs rapidly drying up at present, and within ten days he expects to have completed this task.

By acting in time the deputy warden and his assistants have saved this great number of young fish from extermination and the young fry have been placed in other streams throughout the state. Deputy Warden Green returned yesterday from a trip through the Willamette Valley, where he not only completed transplanting bass fry in Gale and Dairy creeks, but also assisted in the arrest and prosecution of several hunters caught violating the game laws.

Among the game law violators arrested and convicted since September 16 are the following: Sherman Saxton, of Houston, Or., arrested and convicted of running deer with dogs near St. Helens and fined \$100; Fred Grear, of Gresham, arrested near Jefferson, Marion County, found guilty of hunting upland birds out of season and fined \$25 and costs; Will and Arthur Klepper and W. J. Looney, arrested in Marion and Linn counties and fined \$25 each for violating the up-land bird shooting law.

A. T. Roddy, C. Roddy, H. H. King and J. T. King were arrested on the North Santiam for running deer with dogs and on conviction were compelled to pay fines of \$50 each.

Deputy Warden Green and his assistants have several other cases of game law violations pending, and as soon as they are tried the work of installing 5000 young bass fry in Klamath Lake, now ready for shipment, will be completed.

SIXTH STREET COMES NEXT
Beautification Scheme to Be Worked Out in Cluster Lights.

Men who own property on Sixth street, between Morrison and Jefferson streets, have a scheme on foot that will work to the beautification of the street. Yesterday a group of them held a meeting in the office of D. Parker Bryon, in the Commercial Club building, and took the preliminary steps to form the South Sixth Street Improvement Association.

The first things to be undertaken are the clearing out of trees and the installation of cluster lights. From Morrison street to Jefferson the plan is to take out all the trees on the street and then to install lamp posts such as are now in use on Seventh street, with five lights each. Permission to remove the trees will be asked from the Park Commission and the lamp posts must be permitted by the City Council.

Attendant on the meeting yesterday were Leo Fyfe, A. F. Smith, A. C. Davis, Jr., E. B. Pittelkau, H. M. Burpee, W. P. Crawford, of Vancouver, and D. Parker Bryon. All these men are desirous of making Sixth street present as good an appearance as any downtown street in the city.

PAVING NEARLY ENDED

RAINY SEASON WILL PUT STOP TO STREET IMPROVEMENT.

City Officials in Doubt as to Ability of Letting Contracts for Additional Work.

With a number of contractors, City Engineer Morris yesterday afternoon made a tour of the city to inspect street work, and after his return he expressed the opinion that not only will the contractors be enabled to finish the work now under way before the rainy season begins, but with the usual amount of Indian Summer weather, 10 or 15 miles of additional pavement can be laid this Fall.

In spite of this fact, it is evident that the city can let but few more contracts this season with the expectation that much work can be done before next Spring. Whether it would be to the advantage of the city to let contracts this Fall that cannot be completed until the good weather begins next year is a question on which which city officials are divided.

Cement will be advanced in price, it is said, 20 cents on the barrel by the first of next month, and there is a possibility that material will be so much higher next year than at present that contracts let then will be much more expensive than at present. It is feared by some of those city officials who are interested in street improvements that material and labor may drop next Spring and that the city would realize a profit by refusing to

let contracts this Fall that will not be completed until next year.

Concerning the present conditions, Mr. Morris said after his return yesterday that the contractors seemed to be doing all in their power to hurry the completion of their work.

"We can figure on at least 20 more days of good weather," said Mr. Morris, "and that will give the contractors sufficient time to complete their present contracts and still do much additional paving."

High School Farming Popular.
PENDLETON, Or., Sept. 21.—(Special.)—The agricultural department introduced in the high school this year for the first

time promises to be popular. There are now seven boys and seven girls in the class and arrangements are being made for a tract where actual demonstrations may be made. A series of contests for school children are also to be conducted in the Spring.
