I, therefore, hereby declare to the world that I have no hueband or lineal descendants living. MIKADO'S DEATH PLOTTED

and Executed, Is Report.

TOKIO, Sept. 21 .- A sensation was created by the publication this after-noon of the alleged details of a plot mong his own subjects to assassinate Emperor Mutsuhito.

The startling story appeared in the Hochl Shimbun, which states that the plotters, who are now under arrest, will e sentenced to death after trials be-re a special secret court. This is the first time in the history

of the country that the life of the sov-ereign has been piotted against by his own people and the fact known. It is understood that a rigorous cen-

sorship had prevented the publication of so much as a hint of the conspiracy until this evening, when the Hochi Shimbun assumed responsibility for the alarming announcement.

The paper's assertions are not with-

out a show of authority. There are now in jail in this city a number of per-sons alleged to be active in the "allied socialists" movement, and those who may be considered to be responsible, state, as does the Hochi Shimbun, that the arrests followed the discovery of a conspiracy against the throne.

According to the paper, the assas-sins planned to accomplish their end while the Emperor was visiting the military school just outside the capital. The plot was discovered in time to protect his majesty and the plotters

Previous Agreement May Bind. Mrs. Chanler, the first, has an agreenent of her own with her ex-husband providing for the payment of \$10,000 yearly for her support and \$5000 yearly for the support of each of her daughters.


