MENTOR IS PINCH HITTER

San Jose Man Gets Credit for Bringing in Portland's Only Run. Garrett and Bloomfield Are Hit Hard by Visitors.

The victorious march of Walter McCredie's Portland Beavers halted before the gutted flinging of Jack Brackenridge, a peculiarly formed twirler of the Vernon crew, yesterday and "Haplog" Hogan struck one game away in his grip, the score of which was 5 to 1.

The Beavers were simply helpless against the slant and curve of Brackenridge, who closed the home team out in one, two, three order for five frames, and was not dented for a hit until Eddie Mentor, the young San Jose recruit, batting for Jesse Garrett, in the sixth, punctured the clean slate of the Vernontics by bouncing one off Artie Ross' shins which scored Gus Fisher, who completed the second through Carlisle's muff of his corking long fly. All told, the lead carried four bases off Brackenridge, and Mentor was responsible for two of them.

By way of introducing himself to the fans present yesterday, Walter Carlisle, the first batter up for Vernon in the first inning, cleared the ball over the lot via the right field fence, and it is just possible that some school boys might have found some of the pieces, so hard was the sphere hit. This gave the Hooglians one-run lead and injected a lot more ginger into the visiting bunch than was shown by them on the opening day.

Vernon also added another ace to the score sheet in the third. This time, there were two in pickle when Mr. Carlisle came to bat amid the applause of the galleries, or to be exact, the bleachers. This time Garrett lost control and Carlisle walked, and immediately stole second.

This made it two runs for the Villagers, and still nothing doing for Portland.

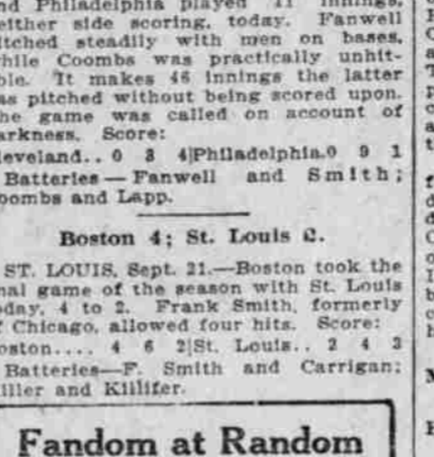

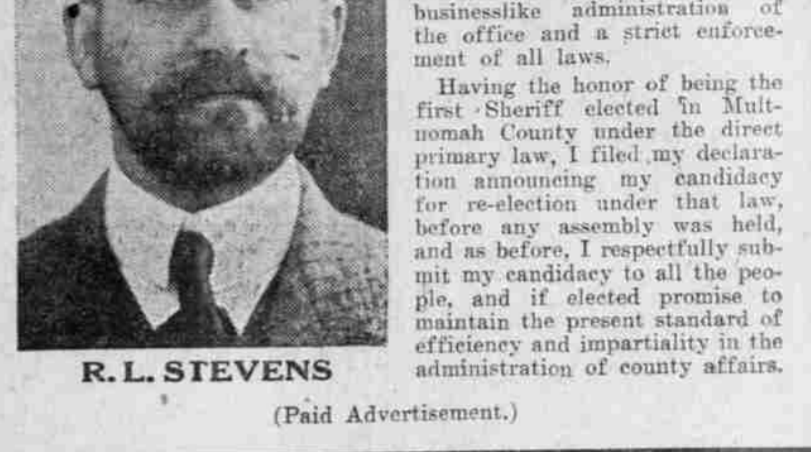
