

# SEE BEAVERS LOSE AND THE WIN

### Series With Vernon Taken Only by Margin of One Hard-Fought Game.

## BRACKENRIDGE IS STAR

### Villagers' Pitcher, Who Seems to Have Portland "on Hip," at All Times Cleverly Fights Way to Victory in Opening Contest.

Portland broke even with Vernon yesterday, and thereby squeezed out the decision on the series of seven games by the margin of four games to three. The scores of yesterday's bargain-counter affair were 3 to 1 in favor of Vernon and 2 to 1 in Portland's favor.

There was not much to the opening contest but the pitching of Jack Brackenridge, who seems to "have" the series of the Portland batters every time he faces them. In fact Brackenridge came near scoring a shutout, and held the home guard safely in his hands through the entire engagement.

Throng of 8000 Sees Game. Fully 8000 people were on hand to witness the double-header, which was the first of the season, and it was the presence of the crowd in the outfield which was mostly responsible for the number of long hits that big assembly did not have much chance to cheer in the opening game, but in the second contest they made up for the lack of opportunity afforded in the first game by cheering the Portland players incessantly double.

"Southpaw" Raleigh was sent in to lead off Portland in the second game, but he was not so fortunate as was his teammate, Brackenridge. Instead of being a puzzle to the McCredie batters, Raleigh was pounded for eight hits, three of which were two-baggers, and the game only went seven innings, because of an agreement made whereby the Vernon team could catch the Shasta Limited leaving Portland at 6 o'clock.

Sheehan to Rescue. The second run was the result of Tommy Sheehan coming to life once more as a batter. Tommy had gone through the entire Vernon series without getting a hit, until he came up as a first man in the fourth inning. Tommy washed one into the right center-field crowd and took two bases under the rules. Bill Rappaport, who caught Sheehan between third and second, but Rappaport failed at first safety.

The two runs were amply sufficient for Portland to win, though McCredie took no chances, and when Bert Coy smashed one for two sacks in the sixth, McCredie decried Boise and substituted Garrett, who was likewise replaced by Gregg when Drummond Brown opened the seventh with a single to left. Gregg got rid of the Vernons quite easily, and the game was called as agreed.

This afternoon the Portland team plays an exhibition game with Joe Cobb's Spokane Champions of the Northwestern League, while tomorrow the Beavers hook up in what will probably be the deciding series of the pennant race, when Wolverton and his husky Oaks come for a series of seven games. ## PORTLAND MEETS SPOKANE TODAY

### Northwestern League Champions Will Try to Defeat Beavers Next.

## REAL BALL WILL BE SEEN

### Visitors From Inland Empire Promise to Make It Interesting for McCredie's Boys—Prominent Ball Men to See Game.

The Portland baseball team, leaders of the pennant race in the Class A Pacific Coast League, will cross bats at 3 o'clock today with the champion Spokane team of the Class B Northwestern League in an exhibition game, the proceeds of which will be divided among the players of the two teams. In addition to the game being arranged to play, which opens the series against the Oakland team, the management of the respective clubs desired to help the players to some extent, and permitted the game, as well as turning over the entire management of the game to the ballsters, who will share the profits.

Visitors Bring Boosters. The Spokane club, excepting Phil Cooney and Danny Shea, who arrived here Friday, will see Portland this evening from Seattle, where the Indians wound up the season yesterday. With the Spokane club will come a number of Seattle, Tacoma and Spokane fans, as well as a number of Northwestern League players who are anxious to see this game. Among the Spokane players are several who formerly wore Portland uniforms. Miles Netzel, Gus Hettling, Phil Cooney, Danny Shea and Ben Kratsger are ex-Portland players, and with this crowd of four Beavers playing against McCredie's "near-champs" there ought to be some excitement. Captain Harry Ostfeld, the active leader of the Indians, may send Southpaw Jesse Baker against Portland, though it is also possible that Jack Killiam or Vic Helm may be slated for the job of teaching the Coasters.

The Portland team will present the regular playing line-up, with the exception that George Ort will be back in right field in place of Eddie Menor. Rappaport, Casey, Sheehan, Olson, Krueger and Ryan will fill their regular berths, while Gus Fisher will officiate behind the bat for the Portland team. This array means that Portland will present a strong front to the invaders from the Northwestern League, and with Eugene Krapp and any kind of form there ought to be some mighty interesting things on the field for the Spokane enthusiasts, as Krapp is a most puzzling pitcher when he is going well, and he says he will be out to beat Spokane from the jump.
