VANCOUVER Wash, Oct 1-(Spe cial.) After an eminently successful peried of four days, the gates of the first annual harvest show in Clark county were closed tonight. While it rained the greater part of the day, at least 2000 risted the show today. After services were over in the churches at noon, the gregations of many of them attended the harvest show in bodies.

It is estimated by Clement Scott, mar ager of the show, that about 25,000 per ple pessed through the gates during the four days the fair was running. There receipts were collected. The money for the fair was contributed by business men of Vancouver and the county.

Every farmer and fruit grower questioned, admitted he had been surprised at the won-terful showing made, especially without preparation. > Proposed Charter Change Will Delegate Civic Affairs to Mayor and Two Commissioners.

BAKER CITY, Or., Oct. 2.-(Speial.)—At a mass meeting tonight in the opera-house for the discussion of the commission form of government City

The sentiment against the adption of the proposed charter, which was strong up to a few days ago, seems to have switched.

A special election will be held here tomorrow to decide whether Baker City shall adopt the commission plan of government. The proposed charter has been distributed to the voters.

The new charter provides that the city shall be governed by a Mayor and two Commissioners, the Mayor to receive \$2500 and the Commissioners \$2000 yearly. Ward lines are abolished except for registration.

The Mayor will have charge of public affairs, finance, police, pound, municipal court, public buildings, parks and library and general supervision of all undelegated authority. The first Commissioner will have charge of sewers, highways and lighting and the other Commissioner will look after water, fire and sanitation.

itiative, referendum and recall. The Commissioners must meet daily, and and while not engaged in office work, assume the foremanship of work in assume the foremanning of which is their departments.

Ordinances cannot be passed at one meeting. All franchises must be subject to a vote of the people, and the tax levy cannot exceed the present

RAINS CAME ON TOO LATE

Grazing so Bad That Sheepmen Were From Ranges of Umatilla

and Deschutes.

Abnormal conditions during the present grazing season indicate to stockmen that theep and cattle will come from the public ranges of Oregon in very poor public ranges of Oregon in very poor condition for Wintering, and that there will be an unusually light turn off of marketable cattle. Aiready many of the sheepmen have been forced to withdraw their bands because of the shortage of the forage crop on the Uma-tilla and Deschutes ranges, while it is possible that grassers making use of the Malheur, Whitman, Wenalia, and Wal-

possible that grazers making use of the Malheur. Whitman. Wenaha, and Wallowa National forests will drive out unless the heavy rains come immediately. Range conditions in the State of Washington have been somewhat more favorable during the Summer of 1910, and the stockmen will be able not only to keep their herds on the range for a longer period of time, but will bring them off in far better condition for wintering. In Northern Washington a largely iscreased range has this year become available for sheep grazing because of new railroad facilities which permit of sheep being delivered to the grazing ground with the least amount of trailing. H. K. O'Brien, Chief of Grazing for the Northwest District of the Forest Service, with headquarters at Portland, is planning to ald the Oregon grazers next year by allowing them to make use of a large section of the Washington unused district. Mr. O'Brien has also made recommenda-

tion of the Washington unused district.

Mr. O'Brien has also made recommendations for the development of water in the Paulina Mountain district of Central Oregon, where he believes that fully \$5,000 sheep may be cared for after water holes have been drilled. A geological examination of the district has just been completed by Herbert E. Gregory.

Wells will be driven during the Winter at favorable points on the 255,000 acres of bunchgrass land which have never been grazed. The famous les cave, 800 feet in length, will be developed through a well driven through the roof, with the belief that a large supply of pure water may be

Water will be developed at Pine Mountain, in the valley south of China Buttes, in the old lake heds south of Foster's Cabin, at Horres Springs and at Button Springs. 
