Walter McCredie's 1910 Beavers are playing such grand baseball that it seems impossible for the other fellows to even score on them, and yesterday afternoon, with "Big Six" Steen pitching, Portland again shut Los Angeles out in nine frames and made it 58 consecutive innings since a run has been registered by a visiting club. The final score was 4 to 0.

Sacramento failed to score for 40 innings previous to the departure of that club Sunday night, and the two white-hot games scored against Los Angeles gives the grand total of 58 innings in which the other fellows have drawn ciphers.

Bill Steen went on the hilltop determined to keep up the good work started by his compatriots last week, and he went through the game without allowing a score, though Artie Krueger with a great catch of a Texas leaguer in the ninth, when the Angels rallied three hits without being able to tally, saved the zero record, which will be taken up today by Veau Gregg.

Beavers After Record.

The Pittsburgh National League is said to have a record of 63 innings without allowing a score, and today Portland, with Gregg pitching, will try to beat this mark and have undisputed title to the world's record for shutting the opposing teams out. Yesterday the Beavers established a Pacific Coast League record, but in so doing they simply beat their own mark of 54 innings established last season.

The great work of the Portland team is a source of considerable pride to the fans, who hope to see the pennant here in spite of all. Following the hit for the Angels, and the southpaw was hit quite often by the Beavers. He managed to escape serious molestation until the third inning yesterday, but in that inning the home guard came over three runs. Buddy Ryan opened the third with a tap to Howard, who hit Ryan running to first instead of landing the ball into George Wheeler's mitt. Olson's out put Buddy on second and Hallinan's bad toss allowed him to reach third. Artie Krueger beat Pete Daily to center, and Ryan beat the toss home, scoring the first run. Casey then beat out an infield tap and Tommy Sheehan walked, which put it up to Bill Rappa with two men out. "Boss" Hill ripped one to deep center for a couple of cushions and Casey and Sheehan clattered over the plate like the Irish leprechaun on a St. Patrick's Day parade. This gave Portland a lead of three runs.

Locals Score in Fifth.

The fourth run scored by Portland came in the fifth canto. Krueger opened by getting a ticket to first. Casey advanced Artie to second with a neat sacrifice, and when George Wheeler dropped Delmas' toss of Sheehan's grounder, Krueger scored all the way from mid-station. That ended the scoring, although it looked very much as though the Angels would dent Portland's whitewashing record in the ninth.

Daily, the first Angel up in the ninth, flew to Ryan, "Barney" Bernard, who played second base while Howard went to right field, singled to left. Howard followed by Bernard with a poke to center, but Bernard was held at second. Wheeler's Texas leaguer fly was captured nicely by Krueger after a hard run, and then Kennedy managed to advance one over second, which Buddy Ryan retrieved in time to hold Bernard at third and the bases were populated. Hallinan hit to center and the shut-out was recorded.

Gregg will pitch for Portland today, while Nagle or Criger will twirl for Los Angeles. The score follows:

Editor Is Held on Libel Charge.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Oct. 12.—Grant Lincoln, editor of the Klamath Chronicle, charged with criminal libel by Mrs. Kate Osterheide, editor of the Merrill Record, waived preliminary hearing today and was bound over to the grand jury.

McCredie Takes Issue.

"I have not had time to study over the text of President Graham's findings in the Helling case, but from what I have learned of it he seems to place the entire blame on Portland. If we are to blame for playing a man who has been under salary to us all season I do not understand the rules of baseball. However, the decision was not unexpected by me, for I have never yet been associated anything else than injustice since I have been associated with this league."

"I do not believe in making threats. But I shall take this case before the entire board of directors of the Pacific Coast League and ask them to review the matter thoroughly and if ruled against in that instance, as I believe will be the case, I shall take the matter before the National Association. If ruled against by that body I shall be firmly convinced that there is no justice in baseball as it is constituted today."

Past Favors Forgotten.

W. W. McCredie, as soon as he is furnished with the text of President Graham's decision, will commence his reply to the league on the Helling case. He desires to be fair to the league and has been one of the biggest factors in its present success. The California magnates are prone to forget past favors, and one thing that McCredie has done for them is absolutely forgotten.

In 1906 the San Francisco disaster threatened to wreck the Pacific Coast League completely, and he had led the league instead of casting their lot with the Northwestern League at that time, not only remained loyal to the Coast organization after Jim Morley, of Los Angeles, "threw up the sponge" and quit cold, but McCredie brought the San Francisco and Oakland clubs north at his own expense and the season was opened in Portland and Seattle and the league has been originally scheduled. In return for this favor what has Portland ever received from the Pacific Coast League? Absolutely nothing but the worst of it. The Shinn case, the Carson dispute, the signing of Pyl by Oakland, and now comes the Helling matter, the protesting of this player being one of the most idiotic and nonsensical things that has ever occurred in baseball.

WASHINGTON HIGH DEFEATS LINCOLN

Old-Time Rival Meets Waterloo on Gridiron by Score of 5 to 0.

ONE BREAKS COLLARBONE

Clever Buddenhagen Is Second Lincoln Man of Year to Meet With Accident, Which Puts Him Out of Game for Season.

Playing superior ball in every department of the game, Washington High School defeated its old-time rival, Lincoln High School, on the Catholic Young Men's Club field yesterday by the score of 5 to 0. The game proved one of the most interesting ever seen between the two.

Owing to the fact that the field was not roped in, the spectators surged on the gridiron and the game was delayed many times to force them back. Many penalties were inflicted for offside play. Although many formations, much different from the former formations, were used, no real football was shown. Washington had one play which invariably proved a ground gainer. This was the smash through tackle. Lincoln's backfield men played too far back of the line to break this play and the ends were too wide for it.

Lincoln had only two men that were consistent at carrying the ball for gains—Buddenhagen and Jack Day. The former quit the game about five minutes after time was called in the last quarter with a broken collarbone, which made his right arm useless. He is the second Lincoln man out of the game with an injury of this kind. Paul Cochran, captain and right tackle, had his collarbone broken last week.

Coach Earl's speedy youngsters simply overhauled Lincoln during the first quarter and scored a touchdown after about eight minutes of play. Many times during the game they had Lincoln's goal in danger but were not able to negotiate the required distance for a touchdown. Jack Day's reliable right foot put Lincoln out of danger many times for he was called upon to punt from behind his own goal line several times.

Soon after the first kickoff Washington High School commenced a series of onslaughts through Lincoln's line which soon took the ball into Lincoln's territory, where for the time being Lincoln held like grim death. Obtaining possession of the ball, Jack Day, who had attempted to punt out of danger, but one of the Washington men blocked the kick and Flattery fell on the ball. Again Lincoln held and this time the punt was made but Cornell ran the ball back about 25 yards. Then with Parsons, Sax and Lapham carrying the ball, it was again in Lincoln's five yard line, from which Lapham scored on a play through his left tackle, Jackson by inches only missed the goal from a difficult angle.

After Lincoln had kicked off, several penalties were given against Washington and then the teams battled first to one end of the field and then to the other. Washington took the ball several times and Lincoln's defense was not able to hold it. When Day went punt out. After an exchange of punts, Cornell caught a punt and almost got away for a touchdown. He was stopped by Patterson and ten yards from the goal. Two times Washington tried to put it over but failed and the game ended with the ball in Washington's possession on Lincoln's five-yard line.

Parsons, right half for Washington, was the best player of the day. His blocking and his ability to break anything of like character ever seen in interscholastic play save the work of Amos Cornell, who also shone in this department. This duo ran back many times for gains. Patterson and Toomey were the best defense men for Lincoln. Patterson was in every play and tackled fiercely while Toomey and Trine effectively broke up end runs around Lincoln's right end.

Expecting one of the liveliest games of the year and in keeping with the spirited rivalry between the two schools many roars turned out from each school. Many yells and songs were given, although Washington roared did not evince the same spirit that has been shown in years heretofore. There was no fight after the game as was the case last year and the large crowd dispersed orderly. The line-up:

Philadelphia Fans True.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 12.—Encouraged by early successes to get backing for the Philadelphia Americans in the world's series against the Chicago Nationals, a coterie of Philadelphia fans has collected \$100,000 to bet on the home team at even-money or better.

The men promoting the scheme desire to send the team into the battle against Chicago next Monday confident that the Philadelphia fans are with them.

One of the men behind the deal is a former Swarthmore student and noted in the city as a plunger. The commissioners are still soliciting contributions here to increase the betting fund to \$150,000 before the first game is called.

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
