Mayor Replies to Port of Portland as to Bridge.

CITY WILL NOT CONSENT

Executive Board Does Not Feel Justified in Suffering Any Postponement of Work on Proposed Broadway Structure.

Delay in the construction of the Broadway Bridge, as suggested by the Port of Portland, is not favored by Mayor Simon, who yesterday sent a letter to C. F. Swigert, president of the commission, telling him that the executive board did not feel justified in causing any delay. The Mayor's let ter reads as follows:

"I have to acknowledge receipt of your communication of the 18th inst. transmitting resolutions adopted by the Fort of Portland, in relation to the proposed construction of the Broadway Bridge, notifying the authorities of the City of Portland that the commission is opposed to the carrying on of the plans now under way for the construc-tion of such bridge and urging post-ponement of further activity in the matter for the time being, etc.

"You have asked me to acknowledge receipt of your communication, and this I now do.

"Replying therato I feel compelled to say that the Executive Board of the City of Portland deems it its duty to proceed with the construction of the Broadway Bridge, and it does not feel justified in suffering any delay that can reasonably be avoided."

BIG DEMONSTRATION URGED

People Should Show They Demand Bridge, Says Mr. Buchtel.

Joseph Buchtel, a member of the North-East Side Improvement Association, yes-terday urged that a big popular mass meeting be held in North Albina to pro-test against the Interference of the Port of Portland with the Broadway bridge. of Porlland with the Broadway bridge.

"Such a demonstration ought to be held." declared Mr. Buchtel, "as will convince the members of that board that the people want the Broadway bridge built as soon as it can be, and that they do not want any more delays. The sole object now is to hold up and delay the erection of the bridge until after the rall-road bridge is finished, and then have the whole question again referred to the peowhole question again referred to the peo-ple. But the people voted for the Broad-way bridge by a large majority. Let us make such a demonstration in favor of the prompt construction of the bridge that will convince the Port of Portland that the people have not changed their minds in the least. Let us get the whole of the Peninsula together in this demonstration. We will have the co-operation of the West Side. The whole city is inter-


