RABBI WISE TO PREACH TONIGHT—Rabbi Joseph R. Wise will preach tonight at 8:15 o'clock at Twelfth and Main streets, on "Let There Be Light: The Slogan of the Age." The choir under the direction of E. E. Courant will sing the service music and anthems. The service will begin at 8 o'clock. Tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock Rabbi Wise will begin a series of lectures on Jewish customs of the past and present. The lectures will be held at the home of the children of the community in the booth in celebration of the Feast of Booths on Sunday morning. Services will be held Monday night at 8 o'clock and Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock in celebration of the last day of the Feast of Booths.

THIEF SENTENCED—For stealing a sack of sugar from the local department store, a man named Wadhams & Co., at Fourth and Oak streets, Wednesday afternoon, James Burke and Joseph Riley were arraigned in Police Court yesterday morning. The testimony showed that Riley carried the sugar away. Burke denied any knowledge of the theft. Both were sentenced to serve 60 days' imprisonment, but a restraining order was issued by Burke's attorney, previous character, as he asserts Judge Tawell will join in an application for a pardon for him.

SALESMAN IS ARRESTED—L. I. Lichten, a salesman for a local department store, was arrested yesterday afternoon by Detectives Helyer and Moloney, on a charge of embezzlement, brought by Ward T. Smith, manager of the Belfast Importing Company, of Seattle. The amount of the alleged shortage is \$600. Lichten is held under bail of \$500. He says that the accusation is prompted by anger because he left the company's office after his secretary, who admitted collecting the money, but says that there is a net balance of about \$1000 due him.

CHARLES FERNAU IS DEAD—Charles Fernau passed away at 4 o'clock yesterday, after an illness of several days. Mr. Fernau had been in failing health for the past several years, and retired from business seven years ago. He was a resident of Portland for many years. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Mrs. Joseph H. Fernau, of Portland, and a son, George Fernau, of Seattle. Mr. Fernau was 61 years of age.

NORTH EVANGELIST RETURNS—Alonso T. Jones, evangelist and historical writer, will speak in Drew Hall, at Second and Morrison streets, every night until October 26. Thirty-three years ago Mr. Jones was a resident of Portland. Since that time he has preached throughout the United States, Europe and in Asia. In the meetings to be held he will discuss leading present-day issues, local, national and international.

OSGON "DRY" RALLY PLANNED—Under the auspices of the Baptist Young People's Union a big "Oregon Dry" rally will be held Friday night at 7:30 o'clock, at the White Temple, at the corner of Twelfth and Taylor streets. CHAUFFEUR IS ARRESTED—Jack Rapp, a chauffeur, was arrested yesterday on a charge of larceny by embezzlement, preferred by his employer, W. E. Green. He was released on bail. It is charged that Rapp has failed to issue receipts for the car in a collision between his taxicab and an automobile owned by Philip Lovengard, last week, and was partially injured. ARMED YOUTH ROBS PEDESTRIAN—Three youths, less than 15 years of age, armed with one big revolver, held up and robbed George Meyer, of 72 Wayne street, at Nineteenth and Planders streets, Wednesday night. Meyer lost between \$5 and \$10. He can give no satisfactory description of the robbers.

BOY CHAUFFEUR ARRESTED—Howard Fuqua was arrested at Grand avenue and East Davis street Wednesday night by Patrolmen Burke and Bishop, for driving an automobile without lights. As the offender is only 15 years old, he was turned over to the Juvenile Court.

VACATIONS OF MILWAUKEE STREET ASKED.—A petition will be presented to the City Council November 3, asking for the vacation of Milwaukee road through block 2 in Sellwood and also between block 2 and Miller's Addition and block 2 in Mosley's Addition. If the petition is granted the Milwaukee road would be closed north of Nehalem avenue. Milwaukee road runs through block 2 and connects with East Nineteenth street at the intersection of Nehalem avenue. Apparently the vacation means the closing of Milwaukee road back to Lambert, in all about three blocks. The Sellwood Board of Trade and Commercial Club will be asked to look into the project.

ANTHONY GANZOW DIES.—Anthony Ganzow, an old resident and veteran of the Civil War, died at his home in the Mount Scott district October 19, at the age of 74 years. Mr. Ganzow was a member of Sumner Post, No. 12, G. A. R., having joined November 6, 1866, and was highly regarded by his comrades. He enlisted in Company C, Fourth California Infantry, during the Civil War and served for three years. This regiment was retained on the Pacific Coast to prevent California from joining the Confederacy. The funeral will be held this afternoon from his home, 454 East Sixth street South, and the interment will be made in Multnomah Cemetery.

ANNUITIES LEFT BY WILL M. J. Heney Provides for Relatives Out of \$600,000 Estate.

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 20.—The estate of Michael J. Heney, the Alaska railroad builder who died last week, has a present value of \$600,000 which, according to the will filed, is to go to the benefit of old friends, relatives and charitable institutions. Ten thousand dollars is given to Bishop Bove, of the Episcopal Church, for the Alaskan Indians. The will provides for the payment of \$500 a month during her life to Mrs. Mary Ann Heney, of Ottawa, Canada. Other bequests include the following: P. J. Heney, Packington, Canada, \$300 a month; Mrs. E. E. Heney, Green Bay, Wis., \$300 a month and \$30,000 cash; G. J. Heney, Minnesota, \$100 a month and \$10,000 cash; O'Brien, of Ottawa, \$200 a month and \$2,000 cash; William G. Robinson, North Anson, Me., \$200. The annuities devised, excepting the mother's, are for a period of ten years.

California Authorities Hold Wade.—SALEM, Or., Oct. 20.—(Special.)—Word was received from California by the asylum authorities today that Superintendent F. W. Hatch, of the California Lunacy Commission, had referred the case of Wade's sanity to the Superior Judge at Willows, where Wade is under arrest on a charge of horsestealing. Wade will be examined by a physician and if he is found to be insane the California authorities have consented to his commitment in an institution of that state if Oregon will agree to keep Henry Dreyer, a California patient, in the asylum here. Wade is a desperate paranoiac.

SECRET PROBE CONTINUES. Seattle Graft Committee Explains About Executive Sessions.

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 20.—Members of the City Council committee, which is investigating charges against police and other city officials, announced that the committee was holding secret sessions for the purpose of ascertaining the character and reliability of testimony to be used when the committee shall sit in the open and bring witnesses face to face with any official who may be charged with crime. The committee has received and discarded anonymous communications, letters that turned out to be forged, and much vague and hearsay testimony. The committee has given out no information whatever and is vexed that certain rumors investigated by the committee should have been proved as findings of the committee. The two keepers of the Arcade dancehouse deny that they have shared the profits of the place with any other person. The committee is continuing its secret sessions.
