

BALLOON WIT HAVE GONE 1200 MILES

Sky Race Greatest in History if Bag Sighted at Ville Marie Is Competitor.

OTHERS ARE DEEMED SAFE

Graphic Story Told of Mishap Met by Harburg III—Swiss, German and Yankee Aircraft Thought to Have Also Landed.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 20.—Colonel Theodore Schick, pilot of the Swiss balloon Heivetta, which started in the international race here Monday, landed at Ville Marie, Pontiac County, Quebec, late this afternoon, according to a message received by the Aero Club of St. Louis tonight.

This is not thought to be the balloon sighted at Kiskiskimunc, Canada, 1200 miles from St. Louis today. If the report of that balloon is authentic, it makes the international race start here the most remarkable in balloon annals.

Three May Have Landed.

The other three balloons which are believed to have reached Canada and landed are the Swiss balloon Azures, Lieutenant Moser, pilot; the German balloon Dusseldorf II, Lieutenant Hans Gericke, pilot, and the America II, Alan R. Hawley, pilot.

In a telegram received today, Lieutenant Leopold Vogt, pilot of the Harburg III, which landed in Lake Nipissing, Ont., Tuesday night, describes his trip and open landing graphically.

Balloon Blown Back. "We reached Lake Huron Tuesday afternoon at 4 o'clock," the message says, "and were across it at 4 o'clock. Then we were driven back again.

The wind changed and the next we saw the water of Lake Nipissing, which we believed was Lake Huron. Not having enough ballast to cross the big lake, we made all arrangements to let loose the basket if necessary and then we decided to come down.

Drop to Water Made.

"We were about 6000 feet up, so we had to let out the gas intending to alight on land, but we landed in the water, close to Gulf Islands Lake Nipissing, where we had to fight two hours in the water, swimming and towing the balloon to shore.

We were rescued by two Indians, Peter and Alexander Comandoo, at 30 o'clock, but it was quite a while before the Indians would come near us as they thought the moon had fallen into the lake. However, they took us off the island, and up to Nipissing village, where we received the kindest treatment from the citizens.

"I have a tug now going to pick up the balloon. My chum, Herr Asmann, sustained a broken arm and was cut badly."

NEARBY TOWNS TO VISIT

Eugene and Springfield to Celebrate Bridge Completion.

EUGENE, Or., Oct. 20.—(Special)—The Portland, Eugene and Springfield bridge across the Willamette River connecting Eugene and Springfield, has been completed and elaborate arrangements are being made by the two towns to celebrate the event by visiting each other Saturday.

The completion of this bridge marks the third thoroughfare across the Willamette River at Springfield, a distance of a few hundred yards. The first is the wagon bridge, then the Southern Pacific Railroad bridge, and now the bridge for the electric line.

Turney Stuart in the case, created a sensation by asking that the doctor be released on his own recognizance. This motion the court granted.

When the case was adjourned for the noon recess, it was understood that the trial was to begin the first thing in the afternoon. However, when court convened again, Mr. Logan gave fresh surprise to the defense by asking the court to dismiss the indictment against the physician, giving as his reason that Guy Moore, one of the principal witnesses for the state, was in British Columbia and that his presence in court could not be secured at this time.

Friends Congratulate Him.

After the defense had put in an objection to a dismissal of the indictment, unless it was for all time, Judge Rice signed the order of dismissal. At this prospect of freedom Dr. Peacock's face lighted up and several of his friends in the courtroom rushed forward to congratulate him.

As the defendant started to leave the room, the attorneys for the prosecution unceremoniously their third sensation of the day's proceedings, the Sheriff arresting Dr. Peacock on the new indictment, charging manslaughter in the same case. He later secured his release, pending a preliminary hearing of the new case, on \$1000 bonds.

Time of Trial Not Known.

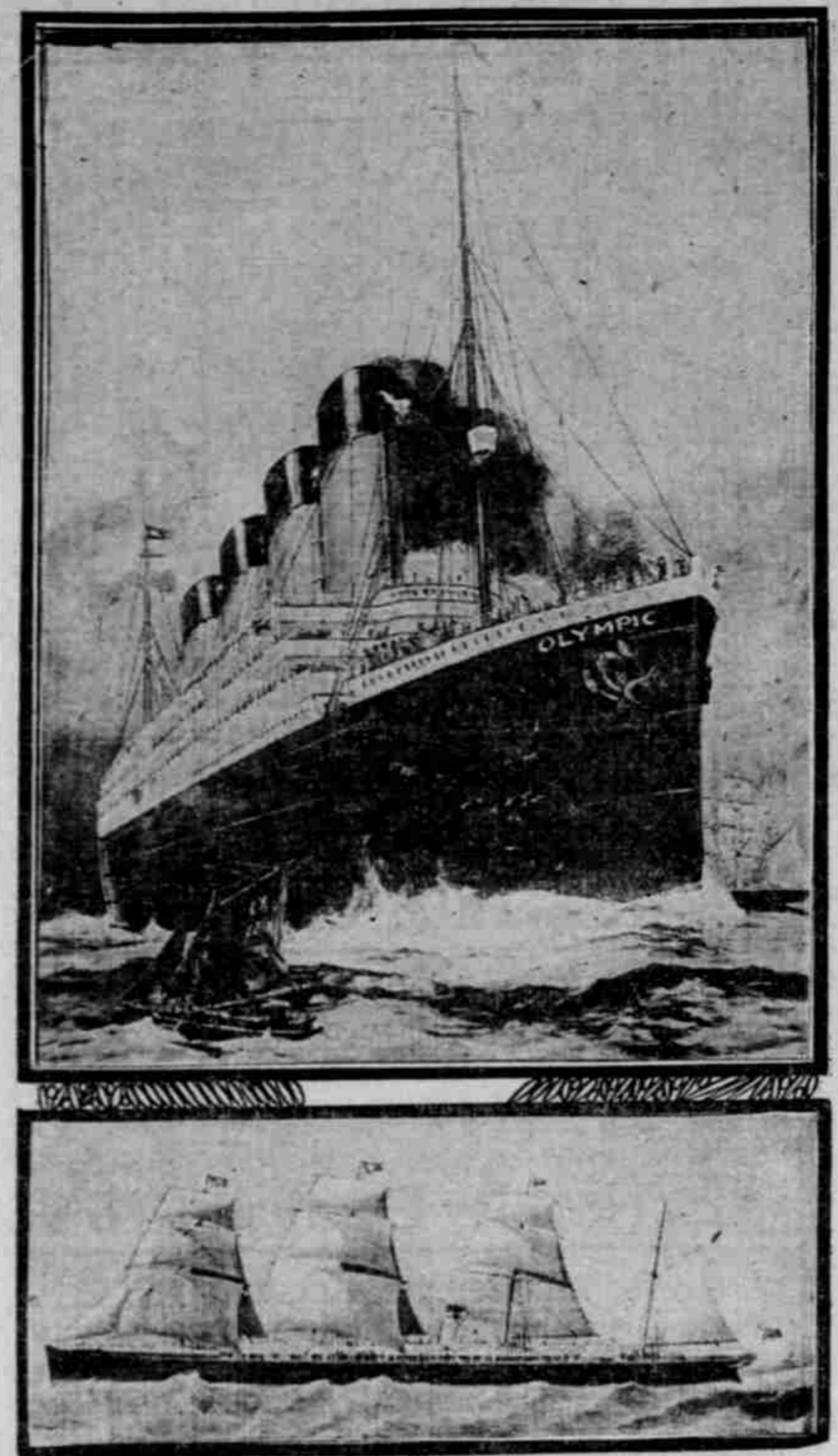
When the new case will be called for trial is uncertain. No one seems to know at this time.
