

TRAIL OF SUSPECTS LEADS TO MEXICO

Los Angeles Officials Reticent, However, Regarding Disclosures Expected.

DEVELOPMENTS DUE TODAY

Detective Brown Says Chain of Evidence Is Complete, That Names of Men Are Known and That Conviction Will Follow.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 20.—If any action has been taken upon the information supplied through the investigation at Los Angeles that three men suspected of complicity in the dynamiting of the Times here are aboard a Mexican coasting steamer, no one connected with the man hunt here would admit it tonight. Attaches of the District Attorney's office denied having any official knowledge of Secretary Knox's telegram to the Governor. So did Earl Rogers and the officials of the police department.

Rogers said that he expected important developments in the case tomorrow, but whether these developments concerned the men supposed to be aboard the steamer fleeing across the border to some foreign state, he declined to say. No one would admit that Mr. Knox's suggestion that the Mexican authorities be asked to question the steamer and take off the suspects had been accepted.

SUSPECTS ARE ON STEAMSHIP

Mexican Authorities Will Aid State Department in Capture.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 20.—Information that may lead to the apprehension of three men believed to be involved in the Los Angeles Times dynamiting case was received yesterday by Governor Gillett from Secretary of State Knox, who telegraphed to the California executive that the State Department was in receipt of advices from Mexican authorities that three suspects were aboard a Pacific Mail steamer bound from San Francisco for Mexico and South American ports. Secretary Knox in the telegram asked whether the suspects should be arrested when the boat put in at San Pedro.

Governor Gillett immediately forwarded the information to J. D. Fredericks and Chief of Police Galloway, of Los Angeles, and then notified Secretary Knox of the course of action he stated that he would give the State Department specific instructions as soon as a reply was received from the Los Angeles authorities.

The name of the steamer was not given in the Washington message, but the liner is believed to be the Acapulco, which from this port on October 5, four days after the dynamiting of the Times building.

Pacific Mail passenger officials here are positive that if the three suspects are aboard the Acapulco they are not numbered among the cabin passengers, all of whom were known to the booking agents of the company's office. The steamer, however, carried many strange persons, many of whom were booked for the Canal Zone.

FRIEND HELPS FIND SCHMIDT

Los Angeles Chief Counts on Aid of Millmen's Union Delegate.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 20.—Chief of Police Seymour announced tonight that Anton Johnson, friend of M. A. Schmidt, one of the trio suspected of having bought the dynamite used in the destruction of the Los Angeles Times building, would appear at his office tomorrow.

How It Was Done. Following is a stenographic report of the proceedings resulting in denial of the injunction.

GRAF IN CURERS DROP BRIBE CASE

Investigators Turn to Ailds Scandal for Moment in New York Inquiry.

FULL INQUIRY TO BE MADE

James R. Keene Says He Never Attended Meeting at Delmonico's. Racetrack Bribery Charges. Raise Storm in New York.

NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—The legislative investigating committee began the question this afternoon and for the moment abandoned all attempts to find out who raised the money subscribed at Delmonico's to defeat the Hughes race-track bill, where it went to, or even if any money really was raised. Elsewhere, following the story told on the witness stand yesterday by Robert Elder, first assistant District Attorney of Kings County, of his conversation with Frank J. Gardner, ex-State Senator, details were not wanting.

Bridge Scandal Investigated.

Instead of pushing forward on the pending question yesterday, the committee turned its attention to the bridge scandal accounts in the Ailds trial in Albany in the last session of the Senate. Senator Benn Conger, who made the charges that led to the expulsion of Senator Ailds, retold the story of bribes paid to legislators.

Newspaper Men Deny Charge.

Louis Solbold, of the World; Patrick Reihan, of the Press; George Janarin, of the Brooklyn Citizen, and Joseph A. McEntee, of the Sun, said they had never received a cent. Tomorrow the committee will resume its inquiry into Gardner's tale as related by Mr. Elder of the use of \$500,000 to defeat the bill.

Hyde Not Subpoenaed.

No subpoena has been ordered, however, for Charles H. Hyde, City Chamberlain, who, Elder testified also was charged by Gardner with attending the meeting, and no explanation of the omission was offered.

James R. Keene this evening issued a statement which anticipates a denial on the stand. E said:

"I never attended a meeting at Delmonico's with the gentlemen named, nor have I ever heard of such a meeting. I have never, directly or indirectly, paid or caused to be paid, one penny or other sum to any individual or individuals, or person or persons, or other individuals, or to any fund as charged in respect of any such race-track legislation."

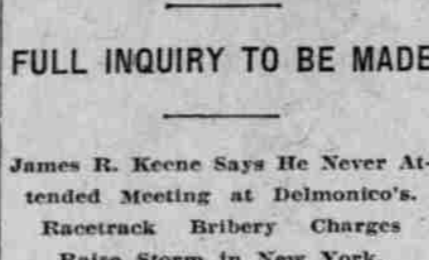
