

# BOWENMAN CAUSE

## Business Suspended While People Turn Out to Republican Meetings.

## NOMINEE WELL RECEIVED

## Pledge Given That People's Laws Shall Be Kept Inviolable and Bourne's Bad Record Is Reviewed—Dimick Joins Party.

## ALBANY, Or., Oct. 20.—(Special.)—

Linn County today added its voice to the chorus of approval that everywhere has greeted Jay Bowerman, Republican direct primary candidate for Governor, in his tour of the state.

## Dimick Joins Party.

Upon his arrival in Albany Mr. Bowerman was joined by Judge Grant B. Dimick, of Oregon City, who is an opponent in the primary campaign. Judge Dimick spoke eloquently in behalf of his former opponent at the mass meeting, and the Albany band and the mass meeting at the opera-house brought out an audience that put standing-room at a premium. Many stood in the aisles and at the rear of the theater.

## Democrats Reject West.

A majority better than normal is counted upon because of the Democratic disaffection that exists hereabouts over the activities of the Bourne-Chamberlain-West combine. In fact, the only party disaffection of Linn County falls within the Democratic party, it is asserted. Democrats are openly avowing that they will support Bowerman in preference to West.

It is their contention here, as elsewhere, that the integrity of the party demands a rigid resentment of the efforts of Bourne and Chamberlain to put a mere clerk into the Governor's chair because he happens to be a puppet and will do their political bidding.

The Bowerman party left Eugene by automobile early this morning and covered 20 miles, taking in Junction City, Brownsville, Lebanon and Intermediate points. At all these towns Republican loyalty was found to be pronounced. It was found, too, that the Bourne-Chamberlain trick of "boosting" their man West has become known among the voters of the rural districts. The public meetings at Junction City and Brownsville were in the nature of a surprise to the campaigners, for at both places business was dropped and the people turned out en masse. Practical stores, shop and business places in Brownsville were locked up during the stay of the party in that place and a crowd of several hundred, toward the addresses of Bowerman and Hawley.

At the meeting in Albany tonight an unusual array of verbal meekness was directed at Jonathan Bourne, Jr., who is being pointed out as a principal issue in this campaign by reason of the fact that he is attempting to capture the office of Governor for use as a political asset.

E. Bean, candidate for the Legislature, who was one of the speakers, designated the senior Senator as being the most corrupt, most inefficient, most reprehensible creature ever tried his way into public office.

"To those reputable people who know the man, the mere mention of his name is enough to cause a cry of indignation to keep that place and as a means to ward that end he is trying to foist one of his creatures, West, into the Governor's chair. But the people are not going to be tricked a second time. As has been said, 'You can't fool all the people all the time.'"

## Primary Law Indorsed.

Mr. Bowerman was heartily welcomed when introduced by L. M. Curl, chairman of the Linn County Central Committee, who presided at tonight's meeting. The speaker succeeded in convincing on which he stands as candidate for Governor, enumerating the various improvements and changes for the betterment of state affairs which he will make if elected Governor. With reference to his stand on the direct primary law, he said:

"The people nominated me at the primary election and I am making my campaign essentially as the direct primary nominee. All friends of that law, including Messrs. Dimick, Hofer and Axtell, who were my opponents in the primary, are now advocating my election. I have but one notable exception, Bourne, and I shall revert to him later. As showing my attitude on the subject of the people I wish to make the election, unqualifiedly, if I elected Governor I shall not during my tenure of office permit any change, alteration, revision, or any law put on the statute books by the people except that the change be made by the people themselves. I will prevent their laws from legislative interference by use of the veto if necessary. That applies to the primary law, statement No. 1 and all the rest, and I make this pledge without restriction or mental reservation of any kind."

"As to Bourne: I have said much about this man, and I shall say more. It is due to the people that they know that man as he is. A more craven or depraved creature in his private and political dealings never existed and he is a menace to the welfare of our state which cannot be overlooked by those who have the interests of Oregon at heart. To him, the office he holds of United States Senator is a toy, a bauble which gives him access to the Eastern society. Instead of looking after the needs of Oregon he lets such important things as a \$7,000,000 appropriation for irrigation purposes, go by default, while he gabs about among

# EWANS' MIND SEEN

## Astoria Promoter Has Deal on for Salem-Stayton Line.

## IDENTITY KEPT SECRET

## Marion County Surprised at Exposure of Man Who is Also Asking for Franchise There—Owners Say He is Mere Employee.

## SALEM, Or., Oct. 20.—(Special.)—

Several Salem and Marion County persons gasped this morning when they read the expose in The Oregonian of operations in the promotion of the Astoria, Seaside and Tillamook Railway, and the connection had with the road by "Captain" T. H. Evans.

It was coincidental that on the same page was printed a story relative to the promotion of an electric line from Stayton to Salem, of the development of 500,000 acres of land and the operations of the Santiam Development Company. For the seafaring "Captain" Evans has been in the city taking steps toward securing a franchise for the road from Stayton to Salem and Monday presented an ordinance for such a franchise to the council.

At the time Evans was insistent that the newspapers should say nothing of the franchise. He said it would injure the scheme if the operations in view for the company should be made public.

He said the company desired to secure a number of options between here and Stayton and for this reason shunned the great white light of publicity. Evans was highly incensed when he was informed news of the franchise would be printed anyway and threatened to be presented to the council for many weeks if it were to be given the faintest shadow of publicity.

Other persons who are connected with the Santiam Development Company say that Evans is merely a representative of the concern, that the Santiam Development Company is purely a local proposition and has no connection with the National Public Utilities Corporation, with which Evans is alleged to have been operating.

Evans was not in the city today. But the men who are behind the Salem-Stayton scheme positively declare that he is employed merely to do field work for the company and that the proposition under way here and in Stayton is strictly bona fide.

"Captain" Evans is reported by persons who knew him in Eastern Oregon, to be thoroughly inoculated with the promoting disease and they say he has been connected with the promotion of many companies in that section, including some oil-well propositions.

Articles of incorporation for the Santiam Development Company were filed with the Secretary of State September 21, and show a capitalization of \$500,000. The incorporators are named as John B. Goddard, Walter W. Hardinger and F. L. Evans. F. L. Evans, of Astoria, is named by the Philadelphia North American as one of the stockholders in The Astoria, Seaside & Tillamook road.

Another project of the Santiam Development Company is named in the articles of incorporation as a road to extend from Stayton to Silverton. "Captain" Evans has made the assertion several times since he has been here that he was the man who promoted the Astoria, Seaside & Tillamook road, using this as an endorsement of his prowess in the field of promoting.

# REGISTRATION IS LOWER

## Total at Astoria Is Under That of Two Years Ago.

## ASTORIA, Or., Oct. 20.—(Special.)—

A revision of the registrations at the County Clerk's office for the coming state and county election, shows that the total is 2632 or 375 short of the registration two years ago, when it was 3057. Of the registrations this year, 1652 are in the precincts of the city, 1980 are in the country precincts and there are 491 voters who registered after the primary election.

The registrations are segregated among the several political parties as follows: Republican, 1825; Democrats, 286; Prohibitionists, 19; Socialists, 94; Independent, 30; Refused to state politics, 218. Total 2632.

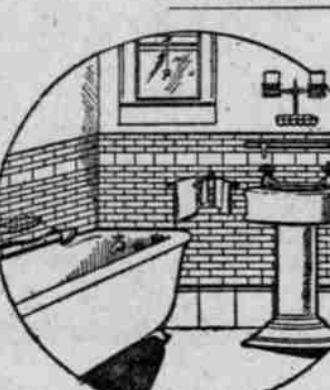

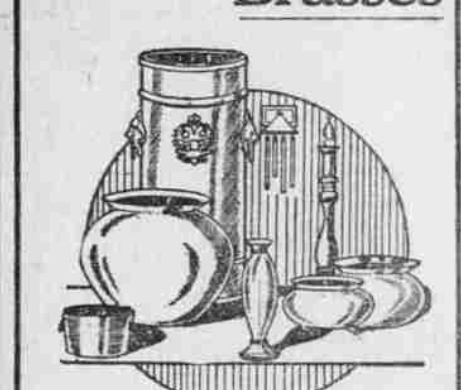
