## Crawford Pleads Not Guilty.

For the first time, J. G. Crawford, the young lawyer of Marshfield, who is charged with having impersonated a secret service officer of the United States, was yesterday formally indicted by the grand Jury. The officers of the court were of the impression that Crawford had been indicted on Monday and as a consequence the young day, and as a consequence the young man was brought down to the United States Court to plead at the morning

After grabbing a law book and searching its covers for a statute which would aid his case, Crawford pleaded not guilty to the charge on which no indictment had ever been returned. He was held for trial at the November term, and heling unable to furnish ball was sent back to jail. In the afternoon it was discovered that Crawford had never been indicted and the grand jury was asked to rectify the error.

Crawford, who has practiced law at Marshfield for two years, will attempt to take advantage of the technicality to secure his freedom.

Indictments were not returned against the officers of the National Bank of Vale, which is considered to be the most important case now pending before the grand jury. Charges are made that Cashier Clark and an ex-vice-president of the bank manipulated its stocks and deposits for their own profit.
