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Creation of Otis County Most Sensible

Reply to an article appearing in The Vale Oriano of recent weeks, claiming to have been written by commercial clubs of Juntura and Riverside, showing how the so-called commercial clubs were organized and why they oppose the proposed County of Otis.

We are informed that an invitation was extended the other day to the Vale Oriano by a non-progressive citizen of Riverside, their surroundings surely indicate, to come up and assist (for?) in organizing two commercial clubs and write up the action.

The Oriano man came, first to Juntura, where a was organized consisting of two members who advanced him for a write up, thence to Riverside, where a club of three met. Now he mustered together another \$50 worth raised to swell a write-up fund. The data given this manipulator of the quill were extravagant, scarcely a trace of truth was discernible in this conglomerate mass.

When the Otis County measure was first launched this non-progressive citizen of Riverside, and now the main knocker, was willing, and offered to stand by the Otis County measure with his whole soul and might to the last ditch if citizen of Drewsey would donate and deed to him a block of land in the Town of Drewsey, the proposed temporary county seat.

Every person who knows the sentiments of the people living in the proposed Otis County knows that more than 90 per cent of the people are strongly in favor of the measure; that there is not a measure that will appear upon the ballot of 1910 that is more righteous nor one that will benefit us directly as this will.

Malheur and Harney counties are too massive to enjoy the best of health; their circulatory power can scarcely reach their extremities; the life blood that should freely flow to every part is absorbed and almost exhausted before its mission is performed. And so it will remain while it is in this abnormal condition. This the people feel, and know, and demand the creation of Otis County, where new enterprises and new centers will spring forth which will inject new life and new blood into the newly-created localities; but to remain as we are it is impossible to remain as we are.

The press and the people of Harney County strongly support the measure, not because they wish to be rid of us, but because they are fair and inspired by the spirit of enterprise and friendship for our locality and Otis County boundary; they realize that we have contributed largely to the old counties and have done our share in putting them on a solid footing; that we are amply able to take care of ourselves and can not be expected to remain forever under the control of our good old parents without losing that personality that belongs to youth and growing strength.

Talk is showing a spirit of unfairness and selfishness; she is sucking our life blood and amazing wealth at our expense, and as far as the commercial clubs of Juntura and Riverside are concerned, they are miserably poor. We want to keep pace in the march of progress, and are doing all they can to hold the country back, to keep out civilization and enterprise, fearing it will shorten their days of supremacy of the range and water necessary for the life of the large stockmen, who are always detrimental to the best interests of localities that desire to move along in the march of progress. We want schools, churches, and new centers, better roads and nearer centers of trade. In fact the things the people need and want and are trying to get are just the things these stockmen do not want, and are trying to get through the so-called commercial clubs to rob us of.

Examine the map of Oregon if you are undecided just how to vote, and you will note that these counties, either of them, are larger than some of the states. These two counties are about the size of Iowa, which is made up of ninety-nine counties, all of which are of good size.
