Bowerman's Lead in County Is Downed by Democratic Candidate.

PROHIBITION FAR BEHIND

Home Rule Bill Gains Ground as Votes Are Counted—McGinn and Gates Have Good Leads Over Opponents for Judgeships.

When the 146 precincts had been footed Mr. Bean had 12,000, McBride 12,936 and Blair 6512.

In the contest for the long term George H. Burnett and Frank A. Moore had an easy victory. Judge King, who was competing for the place occupied by him as a Chamberlain's appointee and accepted by Burnett, ran far behind both the Republicans. The 146 precincts gave Burnett 22,000, Moore 11,200 and King 9004.

McGinn's Lead Safe.

In the Fourth Judicial District, Henry H. McGinn (Rep.) maintained a safe lead over John H. Cleland (Ind.), present incumbent, Department No. 2. Judge Cleland made a stronger race than had been anticipated, however. With 129 precincts in at 11 o'clock, McGinn had a total of 9117 and Cleland 7276.

In the 146 complete precincts the vote stood 13,285 to 8318, McGinn's favor, with McGinn still gaining. Prohibition, throughout the county, kept losing ground with Home Rule continually making slow gains. The 11 o'clock count showed that 8727 voters had been cast for Home Rule and 5974 against it. The latter count showed 28,872 for the measure and 7312 negative votes.

Prohibition, at 11 o'clock, had 9822 negative votes and 5183 affirmative. The totals in the 146 precincts left the tally 9215 for, and 13,565 against prohibition.

The election of W. H. Gates (Dem.) over John Ditchburn (Rep.), which was indicated clearly by the first returns, was made more decisive with the count of each precinct. At 11 o'clock, Judge Gates had the better of the argument by better than two-to-one. The latest count gave Gates a total of 13,232 and Ditchburn 6587. Wide-spread cutting of Ditchburn in his party had been generally forecasted because of his personal record and reputation.

Legislative Ticket Successful.

The Multnomah County ticket fairly well-pollared away from all competitors. The legislative ticket was successful throughout and the tail of the ticket was many degrees removed from the top of the Democratic legislative ticket, although several of the Democrats ran well up towards their normal party vote.

The county gave a normal vote to the state ticket, excepting Governor, the candidates who were recommended by the late "assembly" running as well as the others. Factionalism did not mar the result on the bulk of the state ticket at all.

Ben L. Norden was the only Republican on the county ticket who seemed to have anything resembling a contest and in the fight for Coroner he distanced C. H. Skewes, "anti-assembly" Democratic-Independent, about two-to-one, so the count as thus far completed shows.

Woman's Suffrage Beaten 2 to 1.

Woman's suffrage received a light favorable vote in the county, apparently being beaten by better than two-to-one. "No" is the general verdict in the county on the measures providing county divisions.

The county is giving a heavy affirmative vote on the Monmouth Normal School. The vote on the Ashland Normal school is negative by a narrow margin at this time. An even stronger negative vote is going to the Weston Normal school, which will likely be voted down in the county.

The Employers' Liability measure shows a marked lead in the county, which will likely give it a margin of better than 3000 votes.

ANNEXATION IS VOTED ON

Multnomah Precincts Also Ballot Under Local Option Law.

In several of the precincts in Multnomah County the voters passed on annexation to the City of Portland and also on Prohibition, St. Johns, Woodstock, Mount Scott and Mount Zion.

VOTERS ADOPT AMENDMENT AFFECTING PUBLIC DOCKS AND WATER MAINS.

With 56 precincts making and complete returns from 109 precincts, two city charter amendments have been carried by heavy majorities.

The amendment providing for the issue of \$2,500,000 worth of bonds for public docks and the amendment providing that water mains shall be paid from the water fund have carried.

The amendments providing that the City Council might regulate the salaries of City Engineer and City Attorney it seems have been defeated. The totals so far as the vote have been counted follow:
