McGinn's Lead Safe.

In the Fourth Judicial District, Henby E. McGinn (Rep.) maintained a safe lead over John B. Cleland (Ind.), present incumbent, Department No. 3. Judge Cleland made a stronger race than had been anticipated, however. With 129 precincts in at 11 o'clock, Mc-With 129 precisets in at 11 o'clock, Mc-Ginn had a total of 9117 and Cicland 7290. In the 148 complete precincts the score stood 11,205 to 8818, in Mc-Ginn's favor, with McGinn still gaining. Prohibition, throughout the county, kept losing ground with Home Rule continually making slow gains. The 11 o'clock count showed that 8727 votes had been cast for Home Rule and 5974 against it. The later count showed 10,972 for the measure and 7312 negative votes.
