

QUAKER CITY IS TENER'S SAVIOR

Democratic Candidate for Governor of Pennsylvania Wins Rest of State.

REPUBLICAN'S LEAD 20,000

Grand Old Party Loses Slightly in Legislature—Socialist Is Sent to Assembly—Secretary Also Has Big Plurality.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 9.—The plurality of John K. Tener (Republican) for Governor may be as low as 20,000 or even less.

Philadelphia gave Tener 45,254 plurality. Philadelphia's vote was needed by Tener to win, as Berry (Democrat) polled sufficient independent votes to carry the state outside of Philadelphia.

The Republicans sustained a slight loss in the Legislature, but it is strongly Republican. Socialists elected James H. Maurer to the Assembly from Berks County.

BEVERIDGE'S CHANCE GONE

Democrats Control Indiana Legislature, Kern Indorsed.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 9.—Senator Beveridge's hopes for another term at Washington went glimmering tonight when returns showed conclusively that the Democrats had elected the majority of the Indiana Assembly.

John W. Kern has been indorsed by the Democrats and in all probability will become the colleague of Senator Shively, also a Democrat. It is conceded that the Democratic state ticket was elected by about 15,000.

Of the 12 Indiana members in the National House of Representatives 12 will be Democrats, Edward D. Crumacker, of the Tenth District, being the only Republican elected.

Senator Beveridge, who had hitherto refused to acknowledge his defeat, today admitted the tide was against him. "Fertuses of war it is all right; 12 years of hard work; clean record; I am content," he said tonight.

For the first time in 13 years the Democrats have control of every branch of the state government, the two United States Senators and all but one member of the Congressional delegation.

Governor Marshall's term has two years to run. The programme of Democratic legislation, as announced in the party's platform, includes repeal of the county option law and the substitution of a law providing for city, ward and rural township option units.

REPUBLICANS HAVE ALL IOWA

Governor, Nine Representatives and Others Are in Lead.

DES MOINES, Iowa, Nov. 9.—Returns from 21 counties out of 99 in this state tonight show that the Republicans have elected nine Representatives and the entire state ticket headed by Governor Carroll. The latter's plurality probably will reach 15,000.

The Democrats elected I. S. Pepper to Congress from the Second District. In 1908 he lost to D. D. Murphy, but that he had also elected D. D. Murphy in the Fourth. At that hour, however, a dispatch was received from Mason City, saying that while returns were not yet all in, Congressman Haughey, progressive Republican, had won by 108 votes.

The loss of Carroll shows a Republican loss of about 45,000 votes compared with the vote of two years ago. The Legislature is Republican with a majority of 69 on the final ballot. The progressive Republicans say they will control the party caucus by 70 votes. If this proves true, it indicates that a man of the Cummins stamp will be chosen to succeed the late Senator Dolliver.

DEPEW'S SUCCESSOR TALKED

New York Senate Democratic Prophets Forecast Change.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—With a safe Democratic majority assured in the next State Legislature which will select a United States Senator, political prophets are picking a probable successor to Chauncey M. Depew.

Already the names of four men in New York City have been advanced as having performed party services meriting this reward. They are W. F. Sheehan, ex-Judge A. B. Parker, Edward M. Shepard and John B. Stanchfield.

Parker and Sheehan are law partners. Sheehan ex-Speaker of the House and former Lieutenant-Governor. Edward M. Shepard of Brooklyn was the Democratic candidate for Mayor of New York City in 1907 and was one of the men mentioned for the gubernatorial nomination at the Rochester convention.

John B. Stanchfield was the Democratic nominee for Governor in 1909 and received the complimentary nomination of his party for United States Senator in 1901.

COLORADO'S HEAD DEMOCRAT

Bourbon Chairman Says All State Ticket Will Win.

DENVER, Nov. 9.—John F. Shafroth (Dem.) has been re-elected Governor of Colorado by approximately 15,000 plurality. He carried Denver County by at least 12,000 and his party leaders say he also carried the outside counties by at least 900.

Republican State Chairman McDonald conceded Shafroth's election tonight, but claims the election of several of the Republican candidates on the state ticket.

Democratic Chairman Bradley asserts that the whole state ticket has been successful.

The proposal to submit a constitutional amendment for initiative and referendum had carried two to one.

BALDWIN ELECTED BY 3500

Connecticut Democrats Gain Governor and One Representative.

The Democrats gained one Representative, Thomas L. Reilly, in the Second. The Legislature remains Republican, but by a decreased majority and the pro-Leban will win the United States Senatorship from Senator Bokley, Republican.

SOUTH DAKOTA REPUBLICAN

Equal Suffrage and County Option Lose at Polls.

PIERRE, S. D., Nov. 9.—The Republican State and Congressional tickets were elected by a majority of from 10,000 to 15,000.

The Legislature is almost unanimously Republican. Equal suffrage and county option were voted down.

Late returns today increased the majority by which Governor Vessey and other candidates on the State and Congressional tickets swept the state.

MINNESOTA IS REPUBLICAN

Eberhardt Carries Gopher State by 50,000 Over Democrat.

ST. PAUL, Nov. 9.—Adolph O. Eberhardt, Republican, defeated James Gray, Democrat, for Governor, by an old-time majority of more than 50,000.

For three successive elections prior to this the late John A. Johnson, Democrat, carried the state by overwhelming majorities. The Legislature is Republican and all

KANSAS ALL REPUBLICAN

Governor Has Big Lead and Other Candidates Far Ahead.

TOPEKA, Kan., Nov. 9.—Governor Stubbs, Republican, tonight is leading George H. Hodges, the Democratic candidate, for Governor, by 9,425 majority on returns practically completed from 93 of the 105 counties in the State. Stubbs' majority over Hodges probably will reach 18,000.

Definite figures have not been received on the rest of the ticket, but the Republican candidates have won by about 25,000.

Burke, Democrat, Wins in Dakota.

FARGO, N. D., Nov. 9.—According to returns received today, the Republicans have carried every office except that of Governor, although by greatly reduced majorities compared with two years ago. The Republicans concede the election of Burke, Democrat. Hanna and Helgeson, Republican Congressmen, win by big majorities.

The Legislature is overwhelmingly Republican.

Arizona Fixes Salaries.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Nov. 9.—The executive committee of the constitutional convention reported a substitute proposition today providing for a system of state officers and salaries, the officers to be elected for terms of two years and the treasurer to be ineligible for a second term. The elective officers' salaries are: Governor, \$5,000; Secretary of State, \$4,000; Auditor, \$3,500; Treasurer, \$3,500; Attorney-General, \$3,500; Superintendent of Public Instruction, \$3,500.

The committee reported in favor of abolishment of the fee system and the placing of all state and county officers on the salary basis.

Republicans Save Cutting.

CHICAGO, Nov. 9.—Returns of yesterday's vote re-checked indicate that the Republicans of Cook County saved one candidate from the wreckage. He is Charles S. Cutting, candidate for re-

election as Probate Judge. Cutting, is one of the most popular members of the Cook County bar and earliest returns showed he was making the strongest fight.

Nebraska Elects Hitchcock.

OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 9.—Late tonight the World-Herald had gathered returns which give Hitchcock, for Congress, a clear majority in both houses of the Legislature.

Of the total membership of the next Legislature, 22, including 22 Republicans, have signed what is known as "Statement No. 1," which pledges the signer to vote for the candidate receiving a majority of the popular vote for United States Senator. Should all the Republicans who signed the statement add their strength to the Democratic majority, Hitchcock will receive 109 out of 153 votes.

Carey Seems Safe in Wyoming.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Nov. 9.—Returns from yesterday's election in this state are still far from complete, but there seems to be no doubt of the election of ex-United States Senator Joseph M. Carey, running as a Democrat, for Governor. The count in 176 precincts out of 489 gives Carey 234, Mullin (Republican) 122. Mondell is re-elected to Congress by a largely decreased plurality. The Legislature is probably Republican.

Bourbons Win; First Time in Years.

KINGWOOD, W. Va., Nov. 9.—Preston County returned a Democratic plurality

vote for Governor in Milwaukee County was:

Jacobs, Social-Democrat, 23,812; McGovern, Rep., 20,030; Schmitz, Dem., 15,895; Van Buren, Prohibitionist, 805. Added to this the Socialists elected 12 members to the Legislature, one Senator and 12 Assemblymen from Milwaukee County.

"The reason for this is obvious. The working classes of Milwaukee have been educated by a literature propaganda of many years. They have been taught the cardinal truths of Socialism, which is nothing more nor less than the political economy of the working class."

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Nov. 9.—The Social-Democratic party appears to have achieved a notable victory yesterday by electing Victor L. Berger to represent the Fifth Wisconsin District in the National Congress.

Berger, if the unofficial returns are correct, will have the distinction of being the first Social-Democrat to sit in Congress.

In addition to this, the party swept Milwaukee County, electing its county ticket from top to bottom by pluralities ranging from 3900 to 7060, the latter being attained by William A. Arnold, the candidate for Sheriff. The

DALLAS, Texas, Nov. 9.—Colquhoun, Democrat, for Governor, received a majority of approximately 130,000. The Socialists polled about 5000 votes. The Legislature will decide whether or not a state-wide prohibition amendment shall be submitted to the voters.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Nov. 9.—With over half the votes in, the local optionists have a majority of 2341. Later returns probably will cut down the majority, but the state is sure for local option.
