

REPUBLICAN VOTE IN SENATE IS 51

Party Holds Power in Upper House of Congress With Majority of 10.

BEVERIDGE LOSES SEAT

Carter to Be Succeeded by Democrat in Montana—Democratic Plurality of 60 in Lower House Is Now Indicated.

The political upheaval of Tuesday was followed yesterday by a general survey of the field, which disclosed in greater detail and precision just what had been accomplished.

ELECTION RETURNS SHOW CERTAINTY OF DEMOCRATIC GAINS IN SENATE

Senate is now definitely settled. The Republicans are assured of 17 new Senators, which, with 34 hold-over Senators, gives them a total of 51.

Montana Is Democratic.

Returns late tonight from Montana are to the effect that the Democrats have elected at least 53 members of the next Legislature, which means that a Democrat will be elected to succeed Carter.

These determined totals, however, leave a Republican majority in the Senate as follows: Total membership 92, necessary to majority 47, Republicans 31, Democrats 41.

The 17 Republicans considered assured are from California, Connecticut, Delaware, Iowa, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Michigan, Nevada, North Dakota, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Utah, Vermont, Washington, Wisconsin and Wyoming.

The 16 Democratic Senators considered assured are from Florida, Indiana, Louisiana, Maine, Maryland, Missouri, Mississippi, Montana, Nebraska, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia and West Virginia.

The present Senate consisted, before the deaths of Senators Dooliver, of Iowa, and McKinney, of Louisiana, of 59 Republicans and 32 Democrats.

There are three new Senators to be elected the coming year, to fill the places of 35 Republicans and seven Democrats.

There are two Senators to be elected from Dakota this year. The term of Senator McAmber expires, and Senator Purcell was appointed for an unexpired term, following the resignation of Fountain L. Thompson.

The loss of Senator Beveridge's seat and the assurance that a Republican will succeed the late Senator Dooliver of Iowa, were features of the day's developments.

The table of losses and gains in the House shows that Democrats won 56 seats previously held by Republicans, while only six Republicans took places away from Democrats.

JOHNSON WINS BY MORE THAN 15,000

Candidate for Lieutenant-Governor Only California Republican in Doubt.

SOCIALIST VOTE STRONG

But Dissatisfied Members of Older Parties Are Thought to Have Voted for Wilson—Members of Congress Republican.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 9.—(Special.)—The election of the entire Republican state and Congressional ticket, with the possible exception of Lieutenant-Governor, in which Spillacy has an extreme outside chance, although running behind, is the outcome of the election in California.

Hiram W. Johnson, the Republican surmount candidate for Governor, running on a platform that was chiefly opposition to corporations and the Southern Pacific Railroad, will go into office with a majority of what is now estimated from 15,000 to 20,000, running well ahead of Theodore Bell (Dem.), who during the last week was presumed to have gained considerable strength.

Wilson's Support Outside.

The support for Wilson came from regular Republicans who did not want to support Johnson and from disaffected Democrats who were opposed to Bell.

The election of Johnson has no particular significance in itself except that it shows the inclination of California to remain in the Republican column in spite of the defections in other parts of the United States.

Before the election, it was believed on all sides that Johnson would come up from Los Angeles with 20,000 majority and it was conceded, even by the Johnson people, that Bell would have a good lead in San Francisco, but the figuring was all topsy-turvy.

Alameda, the stronghold of Republican insurgency, and reform, gave to Johnson a majority of 9000, which was a big factor in the final vote that he polled.

Although the fight between Johnson's running-mate, Wallace of Los Angeles, and Spillacy, on the Democratic ticket for Lieutenant-Governor, is not fully decided, it looks as if Wallace would pull through on account of the heavy Republican majority.

Republicans Go to Congress.

In the Congressional fight, the eight Republican candidates for Representatives swept California, most of them by good majorities.

Judge William Lawler, prominent in the Burr and Calhoun graft trials, who was running on the Democratic ticket for the Supreme Court was snatched under for the Republicans.

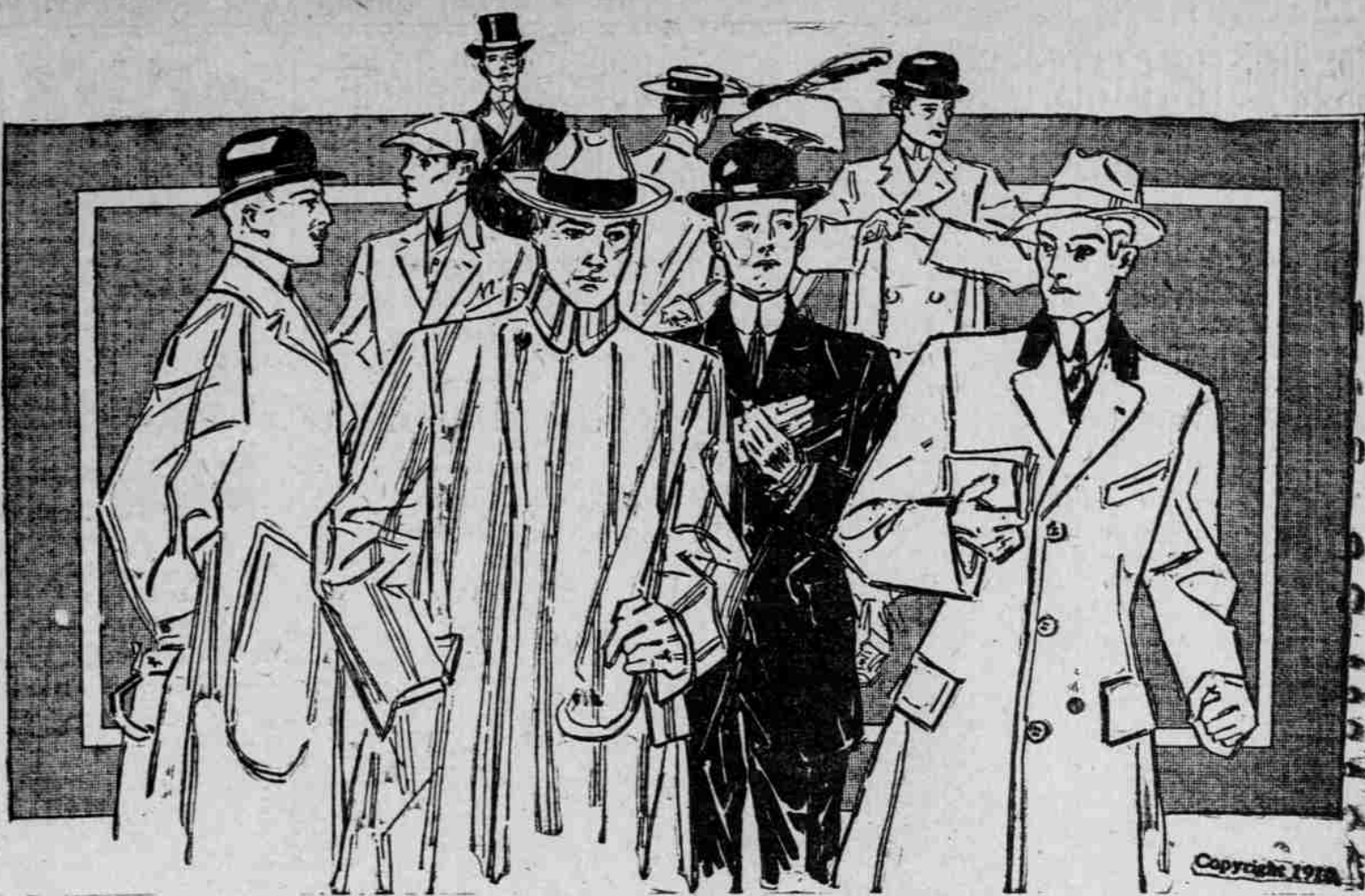
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
