

HOME RULE LEADS; MAJORITY SMALL

Vote Now Stands at 35,401 for Measure and 32,066 Against.

SUFFRAGE BILL SWAMPED

Liability Law Submitted by Labor Bodies Carries by Big Vote.

Proportional Representation Loses by Small Margin.

Many Measures Voted Down.

The following measures have been defeated by decisive majorities according to the partial returns received:

Constitutional convention measure, railroad district amendment, Baker County judgeship bill, all county division bills, amendment providing for separate districts for members of the Legislature.

The three tax amendments are in doubt, with indications favoring the approval of the change amendment that appeared first on the ballot and the defeat of the other Grange amendment and the amendment giving counties the right to regulate taxation within their borders.

The bill providing for a commission to draft an employers' indemnity bill has been defeated by a heavy vote.

Outside of Multnomah County the official gazette bill received generally an adverse vote, but sufficient figures are not available to determine whether this vote will offset the majority of 4500 given the measure in Multnomah County.

While the Presidential primary bill met with less favor in Multnomah County, receiving a majority of about 2500, it gained more favor than the gazette bill in other portions of the state.

The bill is probably defeated. The amendment changing the judicial system and providing for a verdict by three-fourths of the jurors in civil cases, etc., received a majority of about 1800 in Multnomah County, but scattering returns indicate that the bill ran well in the state outside. The result is uncertain.

Good Roads Measure Carries.

The good roads amendment seems to have carried by a substantial majority. The Rogue River fish bill carried, and the bill providing a method for reforming county boundaries, it is indicated, has failed.

Prohibition has been defeated, according to late returns, by upwards of 8000. This figure may be greatly increased by the final totals, but estimates are now based on the theory that in the unreported precincts, which are in the rural districts, will cut down the heavy lead existing against the bill in the early reports.

OREGON CITY, Or., Nov. 10.—(Special).—Returns from 31 out of 42 precincts give the following: Woman suffrage, yes 1473, no 2323; constitutional convention, yes 649, no 2516; Clackamas-Natimouth annexation, yes 1674, no 2214; home rule, yes 1548, no 2047; statewide prohibition, yes 1530, no 2521.

Home Rule Wins in Klamath.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Nov. 10.—(Special).—Incomplete returns from Klamath County give home rule 387 yes, 678 no; employers' liability, 574 yes, 247 no; proportional representation, 443 yes, 227 no; woman suffrage, 425 yes, 479 no; Monmouth Normal, 327 yes, 423 no; Weston Normal, 602 yes, 492 no; Ashland Normal, 523 yes, 337 no.

Douglas Votes to Be Dry.

ROSEBURG, Or., Nov. 10.—(Special).—Incomplete returns received from 24 of the 24 precincts in Douglas County show that a 6 o'clock limit evening show that local option has carried in Douglas County by a majority of 29 votes as follows: For county option 1231, against county option 1135. These figures are considered accurate by leaders of both the dry and wet factions.

Vote Close in Lincoln.

NEWPORT, Or., Nov. 10.—(Special).—Owing to a severe storm which has cut off telephone communications throughout Lincoln County, election returns are delayed. So far as obtainable West is still in the lead, while the rest of the Republican ticket is safe. Prohibition is defeated. Vote of county ticket is very close. It will take the full count to decide any election.

SALEM, Or., Nov. 10.—(Special).—Returns complete from 30 out of 43 precincts in Marion County give the following vote: For home rule 2049, against 1752.

From 12 precincts the returns show a vote for woman suffrage 433, against 1034; for Monmouth Normal 504, against 956; for Weston Normal 517, against 1032; for Ashland Normal 571, against 1071; for liability law 687, against 666; for proportional representation 411, against 517.

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COQUILLE, Or., Nov. 10.—(Special).—Twenty-five precincts out of 24 in Coos County give Bowerman 1130 and West 1142. The same precincts give Hawley 127, Smith 70. Prohibition was voted down, 70 to 105.

Gilliam Wet by 58 Votes.

CONDON, Or., Nov. 10.—Gilliam County went wet by 54 majority. Home rule carried. Woman's suffrage was defeated.

Baker City, Or., Nov. 10.—(Special).—The complete returns from 29 out of 27 precincts in the county show the following vote on initiative measures: For home rule 292, against 780; for woman's suffrage 936, against 418; for woman's suffrage 616, against 805; for Monmouth Normal 792, against 480; for Weston Normal 824, against 472; for Ashland Normal 648, against 574; for increase of initiative power 739, against 546.

Additional returns received here today indicate the election of Dr. Thomas J. Fox, Republican, for Coroner, over Tom J. Myers. The early returns gave Myers a substantial lead and his election was conceded, but outside precincts went heavily for Fox.
