Contract for Broadway Sub-Structure Should Be Awarded Soon.

MODJESKI GIVES

Consulting Engineer Outlines Specifications and Declares First Part of Task Should Be Completed by October 15, 1911.

Mayer Simon resterday afternoon re-ceived from Ralph Modjeski, of Chi-cago, consulting engineer, the detailed plans and specifications for the sub-structure of the Broadway bridge. Ac-

plans and specifications for the structure of the Broadway bridge. Accompanying them was a letter in which Mr. Medjeski said that he would arrive in Portland about Friday of this week. He recommends that the contract for the substructure be awarded before January 1, 1911, and that October 15, 1911, be fixed as the date for completion of the work.

"As soon as you have approved the plans and specifications, whre me and I will have the specifications printed and copies sent to several contractors who, I think, will be able to handle the work efficiently," says the engineer in his communication to Mayor Simon. "The substructure should be entirely complete by October 15, 1911, and the whole bridge should be finished in the Summer of 1912."

The plans show the bridge commenc-

The plans show the bridge commencing at the intersection of Seventh and Hoyt streets, following Seventh streets a point about midway between Kearney and Lovejoy streets, and then swinging to the east, cuts diagonally across the corners of Riocks I and 1% and Lovejoy street. Front street is acrossed at right angles. The bridge will then proceed east in a straight line across the Willamette River, landing within a few feet of the intersection of Broadway and Cresby streets. The plans show the bridge commenc

Bridge to Have 15 Piers.

There will be 15 piers, numbered from A to H, inclusive, and from I to T, inclusive. Piers A, B, C, D, E, F, G, and H will be strung along from the starting point of the bridge on the West Side to a point just north of the Union Depot where it turns due east to cross the river. These, according to the specifications, are to be built of concrete masonry. The retaining walls and abutments and pier No. 2 will also and abutments and pier No. 2 will also be constructed of concrete masonry. They will be supported on concrete pile foundations.

Piers 1 and 3 will be steel cylinders Piers I and I will be asset cylinders on concrete bases and supported on concrete pile foundations. Piers 4 and I will be steel cylinders supported on concrete bases and pneumatic calsson foundations. Piers I and 6 will be of granite ashiar face, with concrete backing. They will be supported on pneumatic caisson foundations. All calsson foundations are to be sunk into the cemented gravel, or until a satis-factory foundation is reached.

The specifications give practically all

The specifications give practically all the discretionary powers to the consulting engineer, who in this case will be Mr. Medjeaki. The quality of materials to be used are rigidly set forth and provision is made that no extra work is to be paid for unless specifically arranged for at a stated price in advance. The contractor must make all changes in plans ordered by the city after the contract has been awarded without extra charge, unless they inwithout extra charge, unless they in-volve the rejection of material already ordered. The proportions of sand, broken rock and cement to be used in mixing concrete for use in different places are mentioned, and details are also given as to how the mixing must be done and the mixture placed in the

Good Men Must Be Employed.

Under the heading "General Clauses" it is specified that the contractor shall employ only suitable mechanics and must assume all risk of accident to men and materials prior to final ac-ceptance of the finished piers; that all material shall be subject to the inspec-tion of the consulting engineer or his authorized representative; that the city will not be responsible for any loss or damage incurred by flood, fire or other causes during the construction work, and that the contractor shall commence his work at such points as the engineer may direct, and conform to the directions as to the order and time which different parts of the work

hall be done.
If any person employed by the con tractor be incompetent or disorderly, he must be discharged at the demand he must be discharged at the demand of the consulting engineer. The con-tractor must also be responsible for all damages to adjoining property.

damages to adjoining property.
The specifications cover 16 typewritten pages and in them Mr. Modjeski has gone exhaustively into detail, leaving, apparently, no loophole for future differences. Under the heading of "Terms" is the following:

Terms Are Outlined.

"The contractor shall be paid for the proper quantities of the following items at the unit prices agreed upon and no other compensation beyond the compensation due for these items at the unit price agreed upon shall be claimed by him, and no extras of whatsoever kind or nature will be allowed, excepting when eatin work is done upon the written order of the same is fixed in advance."

Monthly estimates will be prepared by the engineer at the end of each month for work performed up to that time. Ten per cent of all amounts will be retained from the estimates till the completion of the work. Work must be commenced within 15 days and finished not later than October 15, 1211, except that the contractor shall be al-"The contractor shall be paid for the

ished not later than October 15, 1911, except that the contractor shall be allowed time where delay is occasioned by changes ordered by the engineer. The contractor must file a bend of \$75, 1900 and forfeit \$50 a day for each day's delay beyond the expiration of the contract period.

First—That not more than one retail license be issued for every 1000 persons as shown by the last censua, and that no more be issued until the next census.

Second—That a license fee of not less than \$1000 be charged.

Third—Allow no women in any place where liquor is sold.

Fourth—Allow no assignment or power of attorney to be given.

Pifth—Require each and every applicant to give a bond in the penal sum of at least \$2000, the same to be forfeited in case of violation of either city ordinances or state laws. This feature is similar to one in New York State, where we seldom hear of an arrest for the violation of the liquor laws, although by referring to the court records it will be found that thousands of delivers are recovered every year, in although by referring to the court records it will be found that thousands of dollars are recovered every year in actions brought in the state courts for forfeiture of the bonds for violations

of its liquer laws.

In this state, under the Home Rule law, City Councils would still issue the licenses, but in case of their violation the City Atterney would bring suit in the Circuit Court on the bond, and

the Circuit Court on the bond, and the whole question would then be up to the Judge of the Circuit Court before whom the suit is tried.

If this provision is put in the license law I believe that only responsible persons would be able to take out licensea, for an irresponsible person would find it very difficult to obtain a bond. This would do away with the trials in the Municipal Court, and appeals from the latter to our Circuit Court, and at the most a fine, which is almost gladly paid. If it means not only the loss of a license, but \$2000, there is going to be very few who will violate the law.


