

OFFICERS' ARMY ARE PESSIMISTIC

Hostile Attitude of Labor Toward Increase in Militia Depresses.

COLONEL WEAVER REPORTS

Preachings of Patriotism of No Effect Is Officers' Opinion—State Constabulary Regarded as Only Solution of Problem.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—The hostile attitude of the labor unions toward the organized militia has created a pessimistic feeling among officers of the Army and the National Guard, which is reflected strongly in the annual report of Colonel E. M. Weaver, chief of the division of militia, to the chief of staff.

The officers say it is almost hopeless to expect any reliance from the present conditions by enactment of state laws, or through any National law that would restrain the unions from their unfriendly attitude. The preachings of patriotism are of no effect, even where it is shown that the sole purpose of the militia is the maintenance of law and order and the National Guard is the only real practical solution of the problem lies in the creation by the other states of a highly trained and disciplined constabulary of Pennsylvania to supplement the effort of the local police or constabulary in the repression of disorders.

Militia's Increase Slight.

It is believed that the labor unions would then come to look upon the militia as a force for a National defense rather than as a state militia, and that in the course of time their opposition would disappear. Perhaps for the reason indicated, Colonel Weaver suggests the increase in the strength of the National Guard was only trifling during the last year. According to the latest returns this strength was 2152 officers and 109,000 men, which was an increase of only 4000 over the preceding years.

Uniform Training Hopeless.

It appears to be a hopeless task to endeavor to secure uniform excellence of training of the militia, a fact which is attributed to the difference in the militia laws of the states and the introduction of political influence in the appointment of militia officers where they should be selected wholly upon the basis of efficiency and devotion to the service.

ORCHARD TO BE PLANTED

Twelve Thousand Trees Will Be Placed on 250 Acres.

FAIRBANKS, Or., Nov. 12.—(Special.)—Contracts have been let for the planting and cultivation of 6000 English walnut trees and 6000 cherry trees. The orchard will cover 250 acres and is only two miles from this city. The promoters are D. J. James and E. R. James, formerly of Eugene, who have been actively engaged in the development of Fairbanks city since their arrival here a year ago.

PRICE OF TURKEYS RISING

At Roseburg It Is as High as Week Before Christmas.

ROSEBURG, Or., Nov. 14.—(Special.)—That the turkey-raisers of Douglas County are to command better prices for their birds than in previous years was clearly demonstrated today, when local poultry dealers offered 36 cents per pound for birds delivered at the Roseburg market.

MORE WITNESSES CALLED

Grand Jury on Times' Explosion Awaits Their Coming.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 14.—Having given at least a preliminary examination to all the witnesses so far assembled, the special grand jury which is investigating the destruction of the Times building, held no session today, but decided to await the coming of a score of new witnesses, for whom subpoenas were issued last Thursday and Friday. Some of these witnesses reside in and about San Francisco, and the process servers notified the jury that they could not get down here before Tuesday.

HILLMAN MAY GO FREE

INDICTMENTS AGAINST REALTY DEALER MAY BE QUASHED.

Federal Court Hears Arguments and Intimates Possible Ruling Favorable to Hillman.

TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 14.—(Special.)—The United States court devoted nearly all this afternoon to hearing arguments of the defense for quashing of the indictments, motion for abatement and arguments on demurrers in the case of the Government against Clarence Dayton Hillman, the millionaire Seattle realty man, under indictment for conspiracy and fraudulent use of the mail.

Hillman was represented in court by Frederick R. Burch, Oliver Hulback and R. M. Shipley, of Seattle, and Walter M. Todd, Tacoma. District Attorney Todd represented the Government.

Burch was nearly four hours presenting his arguments and citing authorities, again bringing up the point that the Government had no right to seize Hillman's books in his Seattle office and that it had violated the Federal Constitution. Todd took ten minutes to reply. At the conclusion of the arguments Judge Donworth said he would not rule on the motions, and added:

"The question here is what rule of law shall apply to this case. It is obviously of great importance to the defendant and the public as well. I have ruled on the question of the books before and I still adhere to my opinion. To the defendant's plea for abatement I will give careful consideration and deliver a memorandum during the week. I will set the hearing on the motion to quash and the demurrers for Monday, that depending on the disposition made of this motion for abatement."

CANAL OPENING AWAITED

Navy Department Will Enlarge Pacific Yards, for Pacific Fleet.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Nov. 14.—It is not the policy of the Navy Department to establish a Pacific fleet until the completion of the Panama Canal, according to a statement made today by Secretary Meyer.

He stated that the Navy Department is going ahead as rapidly as Congress will permit in enlarging and equipping the navy yards at Bremerton and Mare Island, and when the Panama Canal is opened it will be sent to the Pacific it may be adequately accommodated at those two yards.

NATION'S FUND \$30,889,641

United States Treasury Deficit Is Decreased \$15,000,000.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—At the beginning of the business today the condition of the United States Treasury was: Working balance in Treasury, \$39,889,641; deficit in Treasury, \$9,000,000; total, \$30,889,641. The total balance in the general fund was \$35,192,321. Ordinary receipts Saturday were \$2,355,591, with disbursements of \$2,387,815.

HAWLEY IS NOT WORRYING

Governor-elect of Idaho Is Resting at Hot Lake.

HOT LAKE, Or., Nov. 14.—(Special.)—Governor-elect James H. Hawley, of Idaho, has been resting at Hot Lake, Oregon, since his arrival here. He is recovering from the threatened contest of his seat for Governor.

In speaking of his future plans, the Governor-elect remarked: "I am here at the Hot Lake Sanitarium resting up, and very religiously following the instructions of my physician, and, besides, I am not worrying about politics or anything else."

Watchman Tied; Safe Blown.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 14.—Overpowered Seymour Newlan, the night watchman, and detaining one of their number to stand guard over him where he was tied to a post, three robbers at an early hour today blew up the safe at the office of the D. P. Flory Company, wholesale hay and grain dealers, East Seventh street. They secured less than \$100 in cash, several checks and a number of notes and escaped without being detected. The watchman was found at 4 o'clock still tied and helpless.

PACIFIC CONGRESS OPENS THURSDAY

BOAT BRINGS HOPS AND VALLEY FLOUR

Potatoes and Hay Crops Delayed by Low Water in Willamette River.

WIRES SAG OVER STREAM

Steamboat Men Complain to Government Engineers About Lines. Pomona Has Big Cargo on First Trip From Corvallis.

Bringing more of the Willamette Valley hop crop and carrying over 1000 bushels of flour consigned to San Diego, the steamer Pomona arrived down late last evening on her initial trip of the Fall season from Corvallis. From the bits forward on the main deck at the engine room railing, the steamer was loaded and freight was refused at more than half of the landings north of Salem. That work will be looked after by the steamer Oregon, which operates only as far as the Capital City.

It is estimated by officials of the Yellow Stack Line that the valley hop crop was approximately 92,000 bales, of which 15,000 bales has been moved by water. Owing to the poor boating stage of the Summer, much of the business was lost from the hopfields, as usually the steamers transport from 40,000 to 50,000 bales. At a number of points hops are being held for shipment, though most of them along the river have been sold. The buyers are being governed by market conditions, but it is expected the bulk will move by January 1.

Potatoes and Flour Delayed.

Potatoes, hay and flour are among the principal products delayed in transit and in some localities, apples are stored in large quantities. Some growers are said to have sold apples in large lots at a box, and unless large lots are contracted for, it is said to be a quotation that leaves a small profit for the grower.

The attention of the Corps of Engineers, U. S. A., has been directed to the practice of rural telephone companies in stringing wires across the Upper Willamette. The wires are permitted to sag to an extent that passing steamers are in danger of fouling them. On the first trip to Salem of the Pomona, her smokestack caught one at Wilsonville, but it escaped damaged. Wires are reported at Independence, Dove's and Wheatland, and it is expected that the Government authorities will order them hauled out or removed. There are also furlies on the stream operated by over-head cables, but they are high enough to permit the steamers to pass beneath.

Snagboat Mathloma Shifts.

The snagboat Mathloma, of the Government fleet, yesterday moved from Wilsonville, where she was tied up, to the high water started, and will work in the channel above Wheatland. A pilot was started in the channel at Carey's Bend, at a point termed by the pilots as the "Devil's Elbow," where a dike is being constructed to divert the water into the main stream. On the first trip to Salem through the Bend. Two rows of piling are being driven, between which will be placed sacks filled with cement and gravel and when the material sets the barrier will be permanent.

Alleged Counterfeiters Released.

CHICAGO, Nov. 14.—Richard K. Trumbull, manager of an engraving company, was released by United States Commissioner Foote today. He was charged with conspiring with George F. Williams, a printer, and H. N. Secret, of Managua, Nic., to counterfeit Nicaraguan money. Hearing of charges against Williams and Secret was postponed until November 23. Secret says that he was acting for the provisional government of Nicaragua. Estrada, now President of Nicaragua, Secret says, will clear him of the charge.

Metropolis of Utah Shows Gain of 75.3 Per Cent Over 1900.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—Salt Lake City has a population of 92,777, according to statistics of the thirteenth census made public tonight. This is an increase of 39,246 or 75.3 per cent over 53,531 in 1900.

The population of Salt Lake County, Utah, is 191,426, compared with 77,729 in 1900. Augusta, Ga., has a population of 37,826. This is a decrease of 1615, or 4.1 per cent over 39,441 in 1900.
