ACCOUNTANTS ARE BOGGER.—Frothing of charges against the Port of Portland Commission is at a standstill, pending the action of the County Commissioners upon the report of the accountants examining the books of the Port Commission. Following the appearance of M. G. Mundy and others before the grand jury last Wednesday, the matter of examining the books was taken up on the part of the work was secured from a number of accountants. These are now before the County Court, and it is that body that will authorize the report which will be made to the grand jury.

DISEASE CLOSING SCHOOLS.—Owing to the presence of infantile paralysis among her pupils in a public school near Estacada, Miss Doris Hild, the teacher, made a report yesterday to Dr. Calvin White, secretary of the State Board of Health, of the condition of affairs. She reported that she had examined the children, and the Board will permit it to be reopened. There are four cases, three in a family named Brinkstone and one in a family named Thomas. This makes 29 cases reported in the state since early last summer, a number of which ended fatally.

DRUMMER FVAMELLET TO SPEAK.—Theodore Osborn, widely known as the Chicago drummer evangelist, will open a series of evangelistic meetings in Hawthorne Park Tabernacle Sunday night, November 20. He will be assisted by Emily Matheson, evangelist, and Joseph Keener, an Osborn convert. Mr. Osborn is also a singer. Mr. and Mrs. Natfizer, considered two of the finest singers on the American evangelistic platform, will assist in the meetings. Mr. Osborn is interdenominational, and is known from one end of the country to the other.

RABBI WISE TO LECTURE.—"Early Israelite History," Moses and the World," will be the topic of Rabbi Wise's address at Beth Israel tonight. Tomorrow morning the subject will be "The Roman Ghettos." Services commence in the evening at 8 o'clock and in the morning at 10:30 o'clock. Thanksgiving service will be held jointly with the Unitarian and Universalist congregations in the Universalist Church, East Second Street. This service will be held on Thursday morning at 11 o'clock.

STREET VACATION CONSIDERED.—Vacation of Milwaukee street for 30 feet at Sellwood is being considered by the city committee of the Sellwood Commercial Club. Property owners have petitioned for this vacation, but it is not to take effect until another petition is filed.
