WORKMEN OUT OF DANGER
Contractors in Digging Foundation
for Building Are Overwhelmed
by Mass of Sand From Un-
der Adjoining Structure.
Through the shifting of an almost bot-
tomless bed of quicksand in the excava-
tion for the garage of the Covey Mo-
tor Car Company, at Twenty-first and
Washington streets, half of the east
wall of the garage of Neale & McCarthy,
next door, toppled over into the excava-
tion yesterday morning, the building
being damaged about \$3000. A gang of
men was at work in the pit at the time,
but was well out of the way when the
mass of brick and mortar slid down.
