

MURDER GUILTS 'THWIXT 2 WOMEN

Defender of Hattie Le Blanc Insinuates Mrs. Glover Killed Husband.

JUDGE IS VERY CAUTIOUS

He Carefully Weighs Evidence Ere Allowing It to Be Submitted to Jury—Slain Man's Spouse Witness at Trial.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 30.—Two decisions in favor of the defense in the trial of Hattie Le Blanc charged with the murder of Clarence F. Glover, and the accusation by the defendant's counsel that Mrs. Lillian M. Glover, the widow, had the motive, inclination and opportunity to shoot her husband, were developments in the case today.

Attack Turned on Mrs. Glover.

The prosecution had not gone far in its evidence when it was found that the defense, on cross-examination of a witness, was seeking to turn the attack on Mrs. Glover. The District Attorney protested strongly, but Melvin M. Johnson, counsel for the defense, declared that he proposed to show Mrs. Glover "had the motive, the inclination, the mental and physical capacity and the opportunity to murder her husband."

Judge Bond decided to repeat his method of weighing the evidence before allowing it to be submitted to the jury.

This evidence was given by Dr. N. W. Cousins, who owns the private hospital to which Glover staggered after he was shot. Dr. Cousins told of calling Mrs. Glover by telephone and of her coming to the hospital, of her refusal to see her husband and of her going away with the request that she be notified in case of Glover's death. Later there came an inquiry by telephone as to Glover's condition and whether he had implicated his wife in the shooting.

Judge Admits Evidence.

Judge Bond then decided that the jury might hear the evidence against Mrs. Glover.

Dr. Cousins repeated his testimony under cross-examination. The prosecution then called Mrs. Glover. She told of her discovery of the alleged relations between her husband and the defendant. She explained her failure to see her husband at the hospital by saying she was faint and was told he was about to be operated upon. Although officers searched her house twice and she searched it once, it was not until three days after the alleged murder that Hattie Le Blanc was found hiding under a bed in the witness did not know.

She identified jewelry found near the laundry belonging to Hattie Le Blanc, as well as a handkerchief found in the laundry. She said her husband had several firearms in the house and usually carried a revolver. She identified the weapon which the prosecution asserts was used. She said she had owned the laundry for 15 years and bought with her own money. Direct examination had been concluded when court adjourned.

There was a gash four inches long over his left eye. Friends of Walwright believe he was foully dealt with. The police say his death was due to an accident.

NOVEMBER WET IN ASTORIA

City by Sea Records Precipitation 6.61 Inches Over Average. ASTORIA, Or., Nov. 30.—(Special.)—According to the records in the local weather observer's office November has been unusually wet. The rainfall was 15.55 inches, or 6.61 inches above the average for the corresponding month of previous years, which is 9.24 inches. While the precipitation this month has been heavy, it has not been a record-breaker. The greatest amount of rainfall during any November since the records have been kept here was in 1872, when it was 22.21 inches. In 1889 it was 21.77 inches, in 1902 15.87 inches, in 1904 17.43 inches and in 1906 the precipitation was 16.98 inches. The smallest amount of rainfall in any November was in 1890, when it was only 1.87 inches.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Nov. 30.—Jack Thomas, negro, of Blytheville, Ark., turned outlaw tonight, terrorized and robbed passengers on a westbound St. Louis and San Francisco fast train and in the end was shot to death by A. B. Walton, railroad watchman.

The train had just started across the bridge over the Mississippi River on the outskirts of Memphis, when Thomas, revolver in hand, emerged through the doorway which separated the white and negro smoking car.

Four Are Robbed.

In true frontier style, the negro commanded "hands up," and without further ceremony a score of hands were raised. Then he passed his victims along into the negro section of the car, emptying their pockets as they went along. Four had been directed of their purses and trinkets when Walton appeared on the scene, summoned from the rear platform by a fare collector who had escaped the eye of the negro.

Watchman's Aim True.

Walton fired as he entered the coach, the bullet striking the negro just above the heart. He staggered and attempted to aim his weapon, but Walton continued his fire, two other bullets finding lodgment in the negro's body.

Coroner's Inquest Held.

The train was stopped at the next station, and the body of the negro was taken off. A coroner's jury was impaneled on the depot platform and Walton was exonerated from blame. Then the train proceeded on its way after the negro's pockets had been stripped of the money and trinkets which were returned to the owners.

state and far greater than when the same kind of work is performed by private enterprises. The cost and inconvenience attendant upon the administration of forests further illustrate the weakness of Federal supervision. If the leasing system of mineral lands and power sites must be adopted, then let the price that may be charged consumers for service be the determining factor rather than the amount of revenue that is received.

Mississippians Takes Issue.

Governor Noel, of Mississippi, spoke in behalf of the Federal control of resources. He said that the Union was one great family and that one should help the other. This idea was inspired by the fact that Mississippi once had wealth in natural resources, but through mismanagement by state officials the commonwealth now gained nothing from its extensive forests. This brought a warm retort from Governor Norris, who said the fact that Mississippi had mismanaged her affairs was no reason why the people of that state should try to put the control of the natural resources of the West in the hands of the Federal Government. Governor Hadley, in his address on "Employers' Liability and Workmen's

Compensation," suggested that a committee of Governors be appointed to draft a bill to be presented to all Legislatures. The subject was deferred until tomorrow morning.

Governor Sloan, of Arizona, declared the states could best control water rights and public lands, although he said the recently completed irrigation work done by the Government in his territory was beneficial.

Bostonian Predicts Revolt.

Stripping State Legislatures of many powers, making the Governor's office the real organ of authority, and voting for men, not measures, were advocated by Gamaliel Bradford, of Boston. Unless the right was given to Governors to be heard in discussion of proposed laws in the Legislatures, another revolution will result, he predicted.

Mr. Bradford contended that the Governor should be the real power in the state. He said that such diverse interests were represented in a Legislature that intelligent action for the state as a whole was impossible. For this reason the Governor, representing the whole state, should have more power in framing the laws.

He urged that government by commission was wrong, and based his statements on the increased expenditures in New York state since departmental government has been governed by them.

The question of perfecting a permanent organization was discussed at the executive session, it was understood, but no action was taken. Many of the Governors favored this.

The conference chose Spring Lake, N. J., for the next meeting place, and will gather there in the first week of September next year.

PRIEST STATE WITNESS

FATHER SCHUMMANN TESTIFIES AGAINST CHURCH JANITOR.

Important Evidence in Wendling Murder Trial at Louisville Brought Out by Kellners.

LOUISVILLE, Nov. 30.—What the commonwealth considers part of its important testimony against Joseph Wendling, on trial for the murder of 8-year-old Alma Kellner, was given today by Father Schumann, pastor of St. John's Catholic Church, and by James M. Peyton, a gas meter-reader.

Father Schumann testified that on the day the Kellner child disappeared he noticed an unpleasant odor coming from the furnace. He asked Wendling, who was janitor at the church, what caused the unusual smell, and testified Wendling replied that he was "burning rags."

Other witnesses testified to seeing the child a few hours before and members of the Kellner family identified clothing found with charred and dismembered portions of a child's body in the cellar of the church as that worn by Alma Kellner the day she disappeared.

Peyton testified that for six years he had read the gas meter in the music-room once each month, but that after the disappearance of Alma Kellner Wendling refused to allow him to enter the room until Peyton threatened to complain to Father Schumann.
