

EFFECT OF ALIENS ON LABOR FEARED

Immigration Commission Is for Greater Restrictions by United States.

BAN ON HINDUS ADVISED

Report Says Sentiment No Longer Necessary as Immigrants Seek No Longer to Escape Intolerable Conditions.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—Sentimental considerations in restricting immigration should be waived in lieu of the economic problems arising from adverse effects on wages and living conditions which the many aliens have had in recent years by their entry into basic industries, according to the final report of the Immigration Commission, transmitted to Congress today. The Commission unanimously urged the reduction of unskilled labor immigration.

"The present immigration movement," says the report, "is in large measure due to economic causes, but immigration from Europe is not now an absolute economic necessity and, as a rule, those who emigrate to the United States are impelled by a desire for better conditions rather than by the necessity of escape from intolerable ones. This fact should largely modify the natural incentive to treat that immigration movement from the standpoint of sentiment and permit its consideration primarily as an economic problem."

The commission presents several proposals by which restriction of immigration might be affected, including a reading and writing test, the exclusion of unskilled laborers, limitations in the number arriving at any port and from particular races, and restrictions as to the amounts of money in their possession.

\$11,000 TAXES TO BE PAID

Kentucky Judgment Against Railways Approved by Supreme Court.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—The Supreme Court of the United States today rendered a judgment by Kentucky courts for more than \$11,000 in favor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky and against the Illinois Central Railroad and the Chesapeake & Ohio Southern Railroad in 1907.

The case was taken to the Supreme Court on the ground that the Illinois Central should not have been held liable because it was acting merely under a power of attorney in building the road for E. H. Harrison, who should have been assessed. The court ruled this argument was not sound.

SUIT FOR \$511,719 IS FILED

Illinois Central Auditor Accused of Making Untrue Tax Returns.

FRANKFORT, Ky., Dec. 5.—By direction of the Kentucky suit was today filed in the Circuit Court by the state against the Illinois Central Railroad for back taxes for five years amounting to \$511,719. The petition charges that the reports of the road to the Auditor were fraudulent.

MRS. EDDY MAY BE BURIED IN CHURCH

Crypt Under Altar in "Mother" Temple May Be Resting Place of Leader.

FUNERAL TO BE THURSDAY

No Arrangements Made for Moving Body to Former Home at Concord and Belief Grows Niche in Foundation Will Be Used.

BOSTON, Dec. 5.—That the body of Mary Baker Glover Eddy, founder and head of the Christian Science Church, who died Saturday night, will find its last resting place in the crypt under the altar of the First, or "mother" church in Boston, is the belief tonight of many leaders in the denomination.

No official intimation to that effect could be made, but as far as learned, no arrangements have been made to take the body to Mrs. Eddy's birthplace, at Bow, N. H., or to Concord, N. H., where she long resided.

When it was known at the time the new church was built a few years ago that a crypt was built in its foundation walls, it was generally reported that it would eventually hold the body of the founder of Christian Science.

Arrangements have been completed for the funeral on Thursday morning, at 11 o'clock, at the late home of Mrs. Eddy at Chestnut Hill. The services will be simple and the attendance limited to the family, the family household of Mrs. Eddy and the leading officials of the church.

Telegrams have been flowing in steadily from all parts of the world seeking verification of the news of the death of Mrs. Eddy, and containing many tributes.

No crowds gathered in the vicinity of the house today. Before leaving his home in South Dakota, George W. Glover said he believed his mother's burial would be at Tilton, N. H., where her husband, George W. Glover, is buried.

JAP'S WORDS STARTLE

ACCUSED SEEKS TO FASTEN CRIME ON WHITE MAN.

Description Fits Man Whom Rumor Has Associated With Murder of Denver Woman.

DENVER, Dec. 5.—Genkio M. Mitsuana, the Japanese who is on trial in the West Side Court, charged with the murder of Mrs. Catharine Wilson, took the stand in his own defense today, and part of his testimony, as conveyed through an interpreter, caused a sensation.

Mitsuana carried out the promise made in the opening statement of his attorney, O. H. Hilton, to attempt to fasten the crime on a mysterious white man. His contention in the confession, made to the police, which was read in full to the jury today, had been that he was forced to aid in the disposition of the body by a white man, and that he had no part in the actual killing of Mrs. Wilson.

In his testimony today, Mitsuana repeated this story, and to his previous description of the mysterious white man added the assertion that the latter was crippled in one hand.

After relating how he had heard whispering in a room of the Wilson home, where he had been engaged to work, Mitsuana said that Mrs. Wilson came back to the kitchen crying and holding a pair of bloody gloves.

ROOSEVELT TALKS SOON

On Tuesday Next ex-President Will Give Views on Recent Election.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Dec. 5.—In his letter to Colonel J. M. Ullman, president of the New Haven Chamber of Commerce, Roosevelt said his address at the dinner of that body Tuesday evening of next week will be in the nature of a survey of the recent elections in the country. He will also give a perspective view of current political events.

Colonel Ullman said today that at the time Roosevelt accepted the invitation, the selection of a subject was left with the guest. An inkling of the nature of the subject is given in this sentence from the letter:

"I will make my first public utterance on political matters at the New Haven Chamber of Commerce dinner."

Judge S. E. Baldwin, the Democratic Governor-elect of Connecticut, said he had nothing to give out in response to a query as to whether he had accepted an invitation to attend the dinner and make a speech.

The feeling is held here that before the dinner the recent controversy will become a thing of the past, and Judge Baldwin and Colonel Roosevelt will find common ground.

TROLLEY OUSTS ENGINES

SOUTHERN PACIFIC TO ELECTRICIFY LINES IN SOUTH.

Radrit, North, South, East and West of Los Angeles to Form Huge Freight System.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Dec. 5.—(Special.)—With the main object of developing a great freight system in this rich territory, in conjunction with its control of interurban passenger traffic, the Southern Pacific has commenced the work of electrifying all its steam lines centering here.

It will use the trolley exclusively for local traffic within a radius of from 75 to 175 miles, including Santa Barbara, Ventura and Bakersfield on the north, Santa Ana on the east and the beach points south and west.

The converted lines will be divorced from the steam line management, merged with the Los Angeles Pacific, Los Angeles & Redondo and Pacific Electric and the entire system will be operated under the name of the Pacific Electric, with Paul Shoup as directing head.

This will give the Southern Pacific a Southern California trolley network of 150 miles, the most complete in the world, without competition. It will reach every town of consequence except San Diego, and it is even believed an extension to that place is under consideration.
