

FAMOUS HARNESS HORSE HERE SOON

The Bondsman, Purchased by Hood River Man, Will Come North in Spring.

ANIMAL NOW 14 YEARS OLD

After Passing Winter in California Captain McCann Will Stable Great Sire in Portland With Other Horses Purchased.

While acting as agent of Captains C. P. McCann, of Hood River, and other Oregon horsemen, Dick Wilson, the well-known driver and trainer of horses, recently purchased the Bondsman, one of the best-known sires in the harness horse world, and the purchase was made for Captain McCann.

The Bondsman will be taken to Pleasanton, Cal. for the winter and about the latter part of March will be brought to Portland and stabled with the other horses recently purchased by Dick Wilson for Captain McCann.

George A. Westgate, one of the best-known harness trainers in the West, offers the following history of the Bondsman in a recent issue of the Rural Spirit: "When Captain McCann purchased the Patches Boy, pacer, 2:10 1/4, he expressed a desire to acquire a trotting stallion of the first rank. The Bondsman's name was first to the tongue of suggestion, and Captain McCann, accompanied by the well-known trainer, Dick Wilson, journeyed to Kentucky to see the Bondsman, look over his colts, and, finally, to make the high bid of \$11,000 and acquire this noted sire. Mr. Wilson has known the Bondsman for number of years and is one of his most consistent admirers."

So far as romantic interest can attach to stallions, it is in the case of the Bondsman. His breeding combines two lines of extreme greatness. His sire, Baron Wilkes 2:18, is known as the "Future of the Future." A sire of the century class, with 12 in the 2:10 list and, at the close of 1909, with daughters producing 145 standard performers, his great distinction is in the way speed is transmitted in the second generation.

Sped Seen in Baron Wilkes' Son. Among the speed-sling sons of Baron Wilkes are the Bondsman, Moko, Oakland Baron, Barondale, Baron Review, Margrave, Alfonso, Prince of India, Rubenstein, Baron Dillon and some 49 others. And his daughters are writing many names on the roll of honor. Sorrento, dam of the Bondsman, "The futurity mother," is a brood mare to be named in the extra, selected list. Santos, dam of Peter the Great 2:07 1/4, is her half sister, and Scotia, Queen and Sentinel Belle are two other distinguished brood mares by the same sire. Grand Sentinel 2:23 1/4.

The Bondsman is a brown stallion of noble conformation, only 14 years old, younger than Ringen, Peter the Great or Moko.

SEASON OPENS TONIGHT

Four Games Scheduled for Columbia Basketball League Initiation.

Aberdeen Wins and Loses Ball Fight. OLYMPIA, Wash., Dec. 6.—The Supreme Court, by a decision today, holds that the Northwestern Baseball League acted illegally in dropping the Aberdeen team from the league January 15, 1910, but says that, as a baseball league of an old number of clubs would be a public utility, it is not to be dissolved by a legal dropping of that club, no good purpose can be served by issuing the writ, so the same is denied.

H. V. L. Ross Turns New World's Tricks at Milan, Italy.

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—News of the establishment of a series of new world's walking records, made a few days ago in Milan, Italy, has just reached this city. The new title holder is H. V. L. Ross, an Englishman who was entered as scratch man in a 20-kilometer walking handicap. The distance in that measure is 12 miles, 75 yards, and Ross won in one hour, 35 minutes, 1-5 seconds, a new world's record for the distance.

SPILLS CAUSE INJURIES

SIX-DAY "BIKE RACE" BEGINS TO TELL ON RIDERS.

Twelve Teams Are Tied at 933 Miles With American-Swedish Aggregation in Rear.

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—After having smashed record after record yesterday, last night and today, the strain began to tell on the six-day bicycle riders tonight and at 10 o'clock, the 46th hour, the 13 teams remaining in the grind were behind the mark established last year by Galvin and Kegan—937 miles 5 laps.

Twelve teams were tied at 933 miles, 4 laps, with Galvin and Anderson, the American-Swedish team, bringing up the rear, 933 miles flat. The French team was eliminated early in the afternoon with the refusal of Pouchou to relieve his partner, Georget.

SALEM, Or., Dec. 6.—(Special.)—Perpetually enjoining the Joseph Waterworks from extending its water mains, the Supreme Court reversed the

decision of Judge J. A. Knowles, of Wallawa County, today in the case of the City of Joseph versus the water company. The company wished to extend its mains to streets not already provided with water, and the city started injunction proceedings. As one defense the company alleged that the city desired to establish a water plant of its own and through competition render the present company's property valueless. The lower court dissolved the

injunction, which was only temporary, but the Supreme Court declared a reversal of judgment and made the injunction perpetual. Other opinions today were: N. C. Longfellow, plaintiff and respondent, vs. W. Huffman & Son, defendants and appellants; appealed from Wallawa County, J. W. Knowles, Judge; affirmed by Justice Slater. Frances M. Snyder, as executrix of the estate of Victor E. Snyder, appellant, vs. John Harrington, respondent; appealed from Jackson County, H. K.

Hanna, Judge; reversed by Justice McBride. Arguments were heard this morning in the case of Dan Kellaher and 11 others versus the City of Portland, testing the constitutionality of the vehicle tax ordinance.
