Since the visit of President Earling, of the Chicago, Milwankee & St. Paul Rallway to Portland last week, specula-tion has been rife as to the methods

tion has been rife as to the methods the Paget Sound extension of that road will adopt in entering Portland. The conference between Mr. Earling and Freeident Williams, of the Chicago, Milwaukee & Puget Sound road did not bring forth the expected announcement of the company's plans and leaves the way open for further conjecture as well as a revival of all of the plans that have been suggested in the past. Prominent among the likely ways now receiving discussion is the old one of

receiving discussion is the old one of the Tacoma & Eastern extension, a bridge across the Columbia opposite Trouidale and entrance into Portland over the tracks of the Oregon Water Power Com-

While this plan has been declared im-practical by competent engineers it con-tinues to receive consideration. Although Milwankee officials have denied repeatedany wankee onclass have defined repeated-ly any intention of using such a costly means of reaching Portland, certain definite steps of the interests that con-trol the Oregon Water Power line have given rise to recent revival of that re-

The latest plans provide for funneling under the hill between the Lawis River and the Columbia, thus af-funding samy connection with the Taxoma & Enstein extension.

# INDIAN FIGHTER PASSES

# Lewis Esben Harris Dies at Dayton,

### Aged 80 Years.

DATTON, Wash., Dec. 7.- (Special.) Lewis Esben Harris, ploneer miner. Indian fighter and business man, widely Indian ngbter and business man, widely known throughout the Northwest, died here yesterday aged 30. His dying wish that his body be cremated will be carried out. The remains were shipped tills evening to Portland, where Ma-

tills evening to Portland, where Ma-sonic rites will proceed cremation. Born in Sandusky, O., in 1830, Mr. Harris at 15 years of age moved to Goshen. Ind. His father believed a boy who could not work his way through college did not deserve an education. He did this, receiving his degree at Indiana University. He assisted his father in the lumber and sawmill busi-ness until 1843. ness until 1849.

With a rifle and ammunition strapped to his back he set simulation strapped to his rack he sec-out for the mines, fighting Indyans oc-casionally, and in 1860 located at Elk City, Idaho. He accumulated several fortunes. He was Deputy Sheriff at Lawiston for several years, and re-mained in business there until 1874, when he came to Dayton.
