SHIP SEARCH KEEN

Success of 15 Stowaways at Bay City Causes Shake-Up.

IMMIGRATION MEN AWAKE

Following Capture of Celestials by Customs Service, Sister Department Orders Strict Watch Over Every Vessel.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 8--(Special.)

The fact that the 15 contraband Chinese stowaways in the hold of the steamer Manchuria were overlooked by immigration inspectors when they went aboard the vessel in quarantine last night, and that the Chinese men and women were captured by customs inspectors after a thrilling midnight exploit on the waterfront, have caused a shakeup in the local Government immigration department. Commissioner Stewart has decided on an entirely new system in connection with the boarding and searching of vessels from the Orient. He has also decided to have steamers searched by a much larger force than heretofore. The new order of things will be inaugurated tomorrow when the Japanese liner Chiyu Maru arrives. It was decided today that every available immigration inspector in the local service will board the Chiyu Maru when she arrives in quarantine, and no one will be permitted to leave the ship until the inspectors have thoroughly satisfied themselves that there is no one aboard who will attempt to land in violation of the Chinese exclusion act of the immigration laws. While it was said by immigration officials at Angel Island that no admissibles had been received which would indicate there was any contraband immigration aboard, as was admitted in the case of the steamer Manchuria, very precaution will be taken to prevent a repetition of the startling affair which developed after the arrival of the Manchuria. Immigration Commissioner Edsell believes that in his opinion 25 inspectors are none too many to search one of the large Pacific liners thoroughly. While neither Commissioner Stewart nor his assistant would discuss the details of the new plans of inspection of the Oriental liners, it was admitted that the course which will be pursued in the future will be decidedly exacting. Heads of the local immigration and customs departments are said to be working in harmony, but it is known that there had been a lack of accord of purpose among inspectors of the two departments. That petty jealousies and quibbling differences may be corrected immediately there have been conferences held in the last few days between Collector of the Port of San Francisco, Colonel Blinn, special officer of the port, Chief Hearing Officer Stephens and Immigration Commissioner Stewart and his assistant, Harry Edsell.

SPECIAL COOPS ORDERED

Walla Walla Poultry Show Expected to Eclipse Past Exhibitions.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Dec. 8--(Special.)--With modern coops ordered in which to put feathered aristocracy of the Inland Empire and unusual interest being shown by poultrymen in this section, indications are that the Walla Walla Poultry Show, to be held here the week of January 16, will be a record-breaker in exhibits of the barnyard "400." Expectations are that the entries will reach more than 1000 this year and exhibits are expected from all parts of the Northwest. There will be four special days at the show, entries for which close January 13. The special days follow: Wednesday, Kennewick, Richland, Pasco and Wallula day; Thursday, Pendleton, Athena, Weston and Adams day; Friday, Lewiston, Clarkston, Starbuck, Dayton, Wabburg and Prescott day; Saturday, Walla Walla, Milton, Farmers' and School Children's day.

DAIRYMEN OPEN SESSION

EUGENE, Or., Dec. 8--(Special.)--Immediately following the adjournment of the convention of the Oregon Butter and Cheesemakers, the Oregon Dairymen met in the St. Francis building today and perfected their organization for the annual meeting. President Moran, of the Eugene Commercial Club, welcomed the visitors and President Kent responded for the association. President Kent's address occupied the meeting until noon. The following officers were elected this afternoon: President, Carl Abrams, of Salem; first vice-president, J. M. Dickson, of Elsie; second vice-president, William Larson, of Astoria; secretary and treasurer, M. S. Shrock, of Portland.

IOWAN IS BOOMED

Nomination of Cummins for President Predicted.

WEST'S INFLUENCE GROWS

East Does Not Comprehend Vastness of Resources and Future of Pacific Coast, Says Partisan of Insurgent Senator.

UNCLE SAM ARRESTS TWO

Prominent Citizens Charged With Buying Cattle From Indians.

CRUEL HUSBANDS BARRED

Citizenship Is Not Extended to Men of Such Character, Is Ruling.

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KLAMATH FALLS, Dec. 8--(Special.)--Mortimer Hamaker and "Buck" Anderson, prominent citizens of the Klamath basin, were arrested today by Deputy United States Marshal T. E. Hammersley on a charge of having purchased cattle from Klamath Indians to whom they were issued as blooded stock some time ago by the Government. They were each placed under \$500 bonds to appear in the Federal Court in Portland and, giving bail, were released.

Some 2000 young full-blooded bulls and heifers have been issued the Klamath Indians in the last two years and it is said many of these were sold. This is against the law as the cattle were not given to the Indians as their individual property but were placed under charge of the Government agent for use in raising the standard of cattle. These special ones were kept under the thumb of the Indian agent, but several head were driven off and sold to whites.

EVERETT, Wash., Dec. 8--(Special.)--A man who is cruel to his wife cannot become a citizen of the United States, according to the ruling yesterday of John Smead Smith, special agent of the Government, at a hearing here yesterday, at which only four of the 12 applicants for citizenship papers were admitted. John Goodreau was the man who was refused papers.

Judge W. W. Black, candidate for Congress in the last election, who presided at the trial, was hard hit when an applicant admitted it was news to him. Another thought the election held in November was a city election, and one did not know who was Governor of the state. Three were denied papers and the cases of five were continued.

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Having complete faith that the cause of the insurgents within the Republican party will prevail ultimately and rule the action of the Republican National Convention, which will meet in the Summer of 1912 to nominate a President, and that the nominee will be United States Senator Cummins, C. G. McCarthy, of Des Moines, arrived in Portland yesterday to be the guest of friends. Mr. McCarthy was one of the managers of Cummins' campaign and was foremost in the 12 years' fight which landed the Iowan in the United States Senate.

"We have great faith in Mr. Cummins," said Mr. McCarthy yesterday. "He is to my mind the ablest man in the United States Senate today in intelligent public capacity. We believe he is the strongest man for the Presidency, and hope to see him elected. His training in corporation law and knowledge of the facts which go to fix the relations between the public carrier and the people are far superior to those of any other man in the West. He is only part of the evolution going on in which the West will soon get its just dues from Congress. For years the East has ruled the upper house to suit its own ideas. Take Aldrich, for instance. While I am willing to concede that he is an able man in many respects, I also believe that he is far from the people and knows little or nothing about the residents of the West from personal contact. Aldrich has been in the Senate 30 years. He paid the Missouri Valley a visit a year ago and it was his first visit west of Chicago in 19 years. How can he get a full grasp of the Middle West and your growing Coast by visiting it only once in 30 years? His views are all based on what he has been told of this country.

"Aldrich is no exception to the rule. The Eastern Senator does not appreciate the West--that is, he has not formulated a correct mental picture of its strength and immensity, and the result is that we suffer for want of better laws to meet our requirements. It is time that the West had a President of its own, and should one be chosen at the next convention I believe that he will bring to us a continuation of the growth we are experiencing now, and that the Coast will go forward by leaps and bounds.

"Senator Cummins has many friends in the Middle West and his strength is bound to be manifest as the delegates are chosen."

Mr. McCarthy is heavily interested in gold mines in Sonora, Mexico, together with his son Marion, who is chief engineer for the Manhattan Exploration Company, with a capital stock of \$2,000,000, in which J. Pierpont Morgan and other New York financiers are concerned. The company has 37 mines and has been engaged in exploring the property the past seven years.
