It is contended, furthermore, that the real purpose of such a club will be to benefit Bourne's cause immeasureably and that the senior Senator could want nothing better. Steps are being taken by Mrs. Campbell's solicitors to press her claim to the rank which goes with the estate. If the efforts are successful, it will mean that Mrs. Campbell will be known as Lady Campbell-Crawford, and she will have one-third interest in a princely fortune.

A short time ago Mrs. Campbell returned from a year's visit to the home of her ancestors, an ancient castle near Dublin, known as Mervine Castle, and which has many stirring historical associations connected with it. for Mrs. Campbell's ancestors took a prominent part in many of the delags of King William, Prince of Orange. It was while there in company with her lawyer that the most important step was made to establish Mrs. Campbell's claim to the estatle.

Through the energetic probing of her attorney into ancient and misty records, the discovery of a long-lost and missing will was made in a vault of the high chancery division in Dublin. This will, which had lain there forgotten for just 85 years, established Mrs. Campbell's claim to a clear line of descent from the early Crawfords of noble blood who fought with King William.



PORTLAND PORTLAND, DR. EUROPHAN PLAN


