

STRIKERS ATTACK LABORERS' HOMES

Garmentworkers Use New Tactics in Chicago and Serious Riots Follow.

AUTO PATROL IS STONED

Policeman Struck With Brick and May Lose Eye—Families of Striking Tailors Driven Into Streets by Mobs.

CHICAGO, Dec. 9.—(Special.)—Five men were arrested, a policeman was struck on the head with a brick and made unconscious and residents were thrown into excitement this afternoon in a series of outbreaks by striking garmentworkers, who are declared to have surrounded and stoned houses of nonunion tailors.

Policeman May Be Blind. A brick shattered a window in the right eye. He fell unconscious on the floor. He suffered a gash over the eye, and it is said he may lose the use of it.

Those arrested were Louis Perillaki, 21 years old; his brother, Joseph, 19 years old; Joseph Kantar, 20 years old; Emil Iwaszoff, 20 years old, and George Brecha, 27 years old. They were locked up on charges of inciting riot and disorderly conduct.

Trouble Lulled, but Renewed. The mob in the street had started an attack upon Schaboss when neighbors notified Lieutenant Johnson of the Canal port-avenue station.

Occupants of these dwellings fled to the street in terror. Half a dozen calls for aid were received at the Canal port-avenue station, and Lieutenant Johnson and a squad of reserves again responded.

CORRUPTION RIFE IN SAN FRANCISCO

Lawyers File Sensational Charges Against Police Court Magistrates.

GRAND JURY IS DEMANDED

Shortall, Weller and Conlan Are Involved and Only One, Deasy, Is Omitted in Scathing Report of Committee.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 9.—(Special.)—That corruption is rife in San Francisco Police Court is the charge of a committee of attorneys appointed by the Bar Association.

Involved in the evidence obtained are Judges Shortall, Weller and Conlan and the grand jury will be called upon to consider the grave counts against their procedure in handling criminal cases.

Under eight heads the report is marshaled. The means by which a defendant "in the know" may have his case tried by any court he prefers, lack of dignity in handling cases; wholesale granting of continuances; the frequent interference of unqualified practitioners; schemes of half-breed firms, whereby they are said to profit largely; the detestable practices; the prevalence of "muggings" prisoners before conviction and the consideration of ransom of blood money by the courts generally, form one of the most remarkable documents ever placed before the grand jury.

Although it had been agreed to consider the report at last night's meeting of the Bar Association, so grave was the report that it was deemed advisable to have the trustees peruse it first and after due consideration lay the matter with their recommendations before the grand jury.
