TAX ROLLS SUMMARIZED

MULTNOMAH COUNTY HAS 164,524 ACRES, VALUE \$23,090,840.

**Clerk Fields' Figures Do Not In-
clude Assessment on Railway
and Other Corporations.**

County Clerk Fields and his staff of
deputies have completed the summary
of the assessment roll of Multnomah
County for 1910, showing the total
value of real estate and personal prop-
erty in the county to be \$27,025,925.
This is several hundred thousand dol-
lars less than the estimate furnished to
school districts, but as the total prop-
erty, including millions, it will make little
difference as to the amount secured
from the levy.

Land in Multnomah County has an
average value of \$15.12 an acre, ac-
cording to Assessor Sigler's assessment.
There are 164,524 acres in the county,
valued at \$2,489,840. Improvements on
out-of-town lots are valued at \$2,413,920.
Town lots are valued at \$12,925,690.
Improvements on town lots are
worth \$48,262,270, according to assess-
ment.

There are 17.75 miles of logging road
in Multnomah County, valued at \$115,620.
Steamboats, sailboats, stationary
engines and machinery are valued at
\$7,140,990; merchandise, \$15,759,420.
Farming implements, wagons and car-
riages, \$1,084,165; notes and accounts,
\$8,959,490; stock, \$4,363,950; household
furniture, watches and jewelry, \$223,420.
Horses, \$728,480; cattle, \$224,025;
sheep and goats, \$925; swine, \$16,670;
dogs, \$11,410; franchise, \$356,000.

These sums do not include the assess-
ment placed on railroads, and other
public service corporations by the State
Tax Commission.

New Bills Open at the
Vaudeville Houses

Orpheum.

Many good, entertaining acts com-
bine to make the Orpheum bill this
week most attractive to the amuse-
ment-seeker.

Honors for first place go easily to
Charles Leonard Fletcher and com-
pany for an exceptionally excellent
playlet called "His Nerve." It's a real
gem, of the Kishinoue quality; an ab-
sorbing and delightful story centered
about the uprising and down-fall of
a burglar in the Raffles type. The
lines and situations, while keenly
humorous, are at all times consistent
and even at junctures quite thrilling.
In evening dress takes the oppor-
tunity to deliver several homilies on
the etiquette of the burglar of the common
or garden variety.

The owner of the apartments returns,
and by an exceedingly clever ruse,
the Chesterfieldian thief proves his
theory that plenty of gray matter or
plain nerve will accomplish anything,
calmly proceeding to save both his
skin and that of his companion, as
well as landing the real owner of the
house in the clutches of the law as the
burglar.

Mr. Fletcher's handling of the Raffles
role is in the highest degree artistic
and judicious, and his support is admi-
rable.

Lew Gordon is the policeman, a really
clever bit of characterization, while
the other principal role, in the sup-
port, that of the housebreaker, is cap-
ably handled by William Stafford.

One of the big hits on the bill is
the comedy skit, "Dying to Act," pre-
sented by Wellington Cross and Lois
Josephine. It's a discriminating bunch
of real comedy, with song and dance
trimmings, and coated all over with
thick alabaster of radiating personality.
How that pretty pink and white Lois
does dance, and certainly Wellington
has some nice big voice. The mere
fact that their act hasn't been changed,
only a hobnob on the skirts of Lois in
the scrub-lady act, does not in any
sense lessen its value as an enter-
tainment of the best sort. Their bur-
lesque on the mellerdrammer is a distinct
riot.

A charming novelty offering is that
of Joseph Hart's "Bathing Girls," fea-
turing Glenwood White, who sings
delightfully; and Albertine Benson, who
can't sing at all. The revue, very girly-
gaily, is elaborately staged; the songs
and specialties are new, and the con-
tours are eye-deceiving. A mighty
fetching tangle is afforded in a sur-
prise, wherein is depicted by aid of
the moving picture machine, an effec-
tive animated picture of modern mer-
maids splashing in the breakers.

A comedy concoction labeled "The
Comedy Girl," is offered by Marie and
Billy Hart, which serves as a vehicle
for the display of an amusingly bal-
ancing act by the girl, and gives
Billy opportunities to get several new
jokes out of his system.

Lew Wells gives a saxophone num-
ber and insists on "monologuing" on
the side. The music, really tuneful,
unusual melodies he plays, are of the
J. N. 1 variety; the monologues are in-
cessantly amusing.

Then there's the Quigley Brothers,
who dance well, and "dialogue" with
an Irish atmosphere.

The Marie-Alda Trio, two men and
a woman, open the bill with an un-
usually meritorious casting-acrobatic
act. The orchestra, as always, is one
of the features of the entertainment.
