

ARMISTICE ON IN CHICAGO CAR-WAR

Five-Cent Fare Restored to Suburbs Which Struck for Nickel Rate.

GROSSCUP MAKES PEACE

Passengers Win First Victory Over Railways Company When Double Fare Is Suspended Till Lincoln's Birthday Comes.

CHICAGO, Dec. 30.—(Special.)—An armistice lasting until Lincoln's birthday, February 12, was arranged today by Judge Peter S. Grosscup between the citizens of Chicago's outlying suburbs and the Chicago Railway Company, by which peace will be restored in the warfare over double car fares.

The privilege of a 5-cent charge to the city will be restored to those communities from which it was abruptly snatched at midnight on Tuesday, and all of the other conditions of striator operations which formerly existed on the Consolidated Traction system will be resumed with a single exception.

Only in the matter of the place of changing cars between the city and suburban community will any feature of the new and unwelcome order of things be retained, but the railway company promised to provide shelter for those transferring at the city limits. Otherwise the attorneys for the town communities agreed that it would be as convenient to change at the border line as at points previously arranged within the city territory.

The peace plan will go into effect as soon as resolutions, which were being drafted this afternoon, embodying what was agreed to in Judge Grosscup's court-room this morning, are passed by the town boards of Oak Park, River Forest, Cicero, Forest Park, Berwyn, Maywood and Elmhurst.

"If we receive word at midnight that the boards have acted," promised Attorney W. W. Gurley, of the railway company, "the 5-cent fare will be accepted tomorrow morning."

COURT SAID SOUGHT

Grandmother Refuses to Give Up Child to Mother.

LATTER IS DETERMINED

Aged Woman Learns to Care So for Little One She Is Loath to Let Parent Take Girl From Her Vancouver Farm.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Dec. 30.—(Special.)—To overcome the affection of a grandmother for their 3-year-old granddaughter, the mother of the child today enlisted the power of the Superior Court and secured a writ of habeas corpus, which was served this afternoon on the aged woman by Jack Walters, deputy sheriff.

Mrs. Mabel Walker, when she was divorced from her husband, more than a year ago, went to the home of her mother, Mrs. Matilda Goodrich, who lives three miles north of Vancouver. Mrs. Goodrich says she cared for her daughter and for the grandchild, little Ida, 3 years old.

Then came a time when the young mother went out and secured employment, leaving Ida with the grandmother. The grandmother made the clothes for the little one, fed her and reared her just as she had done when the child's mother was a baby, she said. She became much attached to her granddaughter.

Mrs. Mabel Walker married William L. Bates, last August. She was at home at the time, but when she wanted to move away to be with her husband, the grandmother refused to give up the child. Judge McMaster today issued the writ of habeas corpus, demanding that the grandmother bring the child into court on January 3 and to show cause why she should not give her to the mother.

LACK OF FUEL IS CAUSE

Alaska Hampered Because Coal Mines Are Not Opened.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 30.—A marked falling off in the production of gold in

Alaska, due to the failure of placer mines in the Fairbanks and Seward peninsula districts, is reported in the preliminary statement of the Geological Survey upon Alaska mining conditions for 1910. The production within the year has been approximately \$16,360,000 compared with \$20,271,000 in 1909.

The decline, which has been apparent for some time, is blamed upon the working out of the best placers about Nema, and the other placer mines of the two districts named.

Much good placer dirt is left, but cannot be worked profitably, under present conditions. Experiments are now being made in Alaska, to find an economical method.

The Geological Survey experts do not believe the future will develop any placer mines as rich as those now giving out. Production of other minerals is increasing, but rapid development is hampered by the high cost of fuel and the fact that coal mines are not being opened.

Extensive operations are being started in lode mining of gold and copper and the future production is expected to be greater than that which followed the development of the placers.

Since mining began in 1880 Alaska has produced minerals worth \$188,000,000 of which \$175,000,000 was gold.

The Juneau district is expected to produce heavily when new plants are installed. There are now 15 gold lodes operated in Alaska.

M'CARTHY WANTS PROBE

SAN FRANCISCO MAYOR ASKS TO BE INVESTIGATED. Grand Jury Requested to Ascertain Truth of Reports That He Accepted Big Bribes.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 30.—(Special.)—At its session last night the grand jury considered another letter which it had received from Mayor McCarthy, insisting that he be investigated concerning the rumors of his having accepted bribes.

After some discussion the matter was shelved by a reference to the standing committee of that body of the Mayor's office. This, the second communication of McCarthy's, refers to the fact that his previous call to action had received scant attention, the reason offered being that the grand jury did not investigate chance rumors.

McCarthy attempts to cure this defect in his petition by specifically charging that the last-named person in the list previously furnished made a statement that he had accepted bribes of \$60,000 and \$100,000.

In the Mayor's letter of November he gave the names of Colonel George H. Pippy, John Rothschild, Thorwald Mullally, William M. Abbott, Leon Liebes and Luther Brown, all prominent business men of the city. When questioned after the publication of the letter to the grand jury, all these denied having made any such statements as were attributed to them by the Mayor.

EUGENE FIGHTS TYPHOID

Commercial Club Co-operates With City Authorities.

EUGENE, Or., Dec. 30.—(Special.)—At a meeting of the Commercial Club this evening a committee was appointed to take charge on behalf of the club of the matter of the control of the situation with reference to the appearance of typhoid fever in the city.

The committee consists of Drs. F. W. Prentice, George Wall, J. W. Harris, William Kuykendall, F. M. Walling, W. W. Calkins, S. H. Friendly, E. G. Young and J. M. Williams.

It is the unanimous opinion of the physicians on the committee that the new filter plant, now nearly completed, will, when finished, be a guarantee against any future epidemic of typhoid, but that until the filter plant is completed it will be advisable to take strict measures to prevent further spread of the disease.

It was deemed advisable that steps be taken for the short time until the filtration plant is completed to notify and compel all citizens to use boiled water.

The committee will follow up this matter, in conjunction with city officials until the filters are in operation and the water is pure.

One Killed, Five Hurt in Wreck.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Dec. 30.—One passenger, James A. Bell, of Kansas City, was killed, five persons were seriously injured and a score of others were bruised when a San Antonio & Arkansas Pass passenger train was wrecked at Pettus, 75 miles south of here, late today.
