### LODGE APPEARS FATED TO DEFEAT

Senator Has Margin of Only One Vote With Enough on Fence to Beat Him.

FOSS DELIVERS PHILIPPIC

Democratic Governor Says Lodge Is Against People on Every Live Issue, Is Reactionary and Belongs to Dead Era.

BOSTON, Mass., Jan. 4.—(Special.)—
Senator Lodge's chance of re-election
is daily becoming smailer. Driven by
the onslaughts of Governor-elect Foss
to defend his course in public for the
first time during his tenure of the
office, he is immediately met by another flerce attack from the same
source and it appears that a fusion of
Democrats and Insurgent Republicans
may accomplish his overthrow. In order to facilitate such a fusion, a leading candidate for the Democratic nomimation has already withdrawn.

As the Legislature now stands, the
winning over of one Republican to the
ranks of the Insurgents would mean
Lodge's defeat, unless he can win over
some other vote to offset it. The Re-

some other vote to offset it. The Republicans have a majority on joint ballot of 27. Of the Republican members, 12 have declared themselves against his re-election. Their defection to the opposition would leave a margin of only one vote. But as many tion to the opposition would leave a margin of only one vote. But as many more Republicans have declined to declare themselves either for or against Lodge. With the tide setting so strongly against the Senator, it appears hardly probable that he will win over any of the Insurgents, while there is small probability that he can secure the support of all those who have hitherto held aloof. The voting will begin on January 17.

"Senator Ledge's speech of last night was an eloquent personal reminiscence. It told of the past, by not a word of the present or future. If there was any doubt as to the fact that the Senator was defeated, this speech has completely flispelled that illusion. For his own utterances have defeated him. "He stands pat on the tariff, on reciprocity with Canada, on the income tax, on the direct primary, on the election of United States Senators by popular vote, on the recall, on the initiative and on the referendum.

"All of these issues are what the election was fought and won on in Massachusetts last wall. We now see that he is opposed to every one of them and, if he had been a candidate before the people, he may have been

before the people, he may have been overwhelmingly defeated.

"He knows it, and for the life of me I do not see how he can offer himself as a candidate for the Senate un-



#### Forfeits Enforce Agreement.

Under the terms of the contract, these lines agreed, it is alleged, to divide their

Senators Are Apathetic Over Slight State Got in Irrigation Allotment.

HAWLEY AND ELLIS WORK

Although Two Delegates in Upper Branch of Congress Are Indifferent, Members of Lower House Will Ask Taft for More Aid.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Wash ington, Jan. 4.—If Oregon hopes to get more than \$925,000 out of the \$45,000,-900 irrigation fund apportioned by President Taft on December 26, it must look to Representatives Hawley and Ellis for help. Neither Oregon Senator is at all concerned over the fact that the state received only 2 per cent of this big fund, and neither has thus far indicated any willingness to do more than formally file any protests that may be received from Oregon commer-

cial and business organizations.
On the contrary, both Senators have taken ground that Oregon, by reason of being the heavier contributor but one to the reclamation fund, is not necessarily entitled to large benefits from that fund and neither is disturbed because the Government reclamation work will cease in Oregon after the close of next season.

#### Argument Is Framed.

Representatives Ellis and Hawley were today at work upon an argument which they will present to the President urging that some material portion of the \$45,000,000 be allotted to Oregon, and particularly will they urge an allotment for the west side of the Umatilla extension and for the completion of the lower Klamath project. Thus far, neither Senator has given any intimation that he knows there is such a thing as the West Umatilla project and neither has exhibited any concern over thing as the West Umatilia project and neither has exhibited any concern over the fact that this promising irrigation enterprise has been entirely overlooked. 
