TURNBULL STORY

Two Witnesses Say Mrs. Turnbull Told of Marriage to Lucky Baldwin.

GOD WAS THE WITNESS

Claimant to Share of Estate for Daughter Says Baldwin Introduced Her to Charles Fair and Milliner as Wife.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 5.—After seven days of severe cross-examination, Mrs. Lillian Ashley Turnbull completed her testimony today in her daughter's contest for a share of the "Lucky" Baldwin estate, and two other witnesses were promptly called upon to corroborate her testimony that the turnman had married her by contract on March 3, 1903.

Dr. J. W. Truworthy, who officiated at the birth of the contestant, Beatrice Anita Turnbull and who was Baldwin's physician up to the time of his death, was the first witness. He could not remember whether Mrs. Turnbull had told him, as she testified, that she was Baldwin's contract wife. But his account book, placed in evidence over objection of counsel for the estate, contained entries under the name Mrs. Baldwin. He also admitted having reported the birth of Mrs. Turnbull's child to the Board of Health with the information that E. J. Baldwin was its father.

Over the name Mrs. Baldwin in Dr. Truworthy's account book there appeared also the name Lillian A. Ashley.

Contract Witnessed by God.

The second witness was Mrs. Margaret A. Holmes, of Monterey, Cal., who testified that Mrs. Turnbull had told her in April, 1903, that Baldwin had married her by a contract "witnessed only by God."

"Mrs. Turnbull explained to me that while such a marriage would be frowned upon in the East, Mr. Baldwin had assured her it was all right and proper in the West," said Mrs. Holmes.

The witness also corroborated Mrs. Turnbull's testimony today that she had introduced the turnman to Mr. and Mrs. Holmes as her husband.

Under the questions of the cross-examination, she recalled not only a number of persons to whom the turnman had introduced her as his wife, but she remembered at least two, to whom she had introduced him as her husband.

Introduced to Fair as Mrs. Baldwin.

"Mr. Baldwin introduced me as Mrs. Baldwin to Charles Fair and a milliner named Ray Wilson," said Mrs. Turnbull and then she started the counsel for the estate by remarking she had not named either Fair or the milliner because her own attorneys had told her not to mention them until the cross-examination asked the question.

Gracie McNab, who conducted the cross-examination, followed up this information with a query whether she had introduced the turnman to Fair only after she had a conference in San Francisco last week with a Mr. Blazer, who was private secretary of Charles Fair before the latter's death.

Mrs. Turnbull denied this emphatically, though when the opposing side showed a surprising familiarity with her movements in San Francisco she admitted she had conferred with Colonel Henry I. Kowalsky and a number of others while in the North. With that, the attorneys for the estate relinquished the witness after a cross-examination lasting in all nearly seven days.

The case was adjourned until Monday afternoon.

MADRAS MEN FIGHT DUEL

Both Shot When Revolvers Flash at Climax of Argument.

MADRAS, Or., Jan. 5.—(Special.)—Excitement was caused here today at noon, when two men who had been engaged in a heated argument pulled their revolvers and commenced shooting at each other at close range. The participants were A. J. Weston, ex-Night Marshal, and J. B. Harper, employed several months past as the Night Marshal at Madras.

Weston received one shot through the left leg just above the knee, and another through the left side. Neither wound is fatal. Harper received two wounds, one on the right hand and the other entering the back part of the head and glancing downward, coming out under the chin. He will live.

Both men, however, were placed under arrest on the charge of assault with a deadly weapon.

WORRY KILLS ATTORNEY

Robin's Tangles Said to Have Led to Lexow's Death.

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—The grand jury today, it is reported, ordered six additional indictments against Joseph G. Robin, charging him with grand larceny to the amount of \$200,000 from the Northern Bank of New York, and the Washington Savings Bank.

District Attorney Whitman said today he had been told that Clarence K. Lexow, who was counsel for Robin, had worried himself to death over the tangles into which Mr. Robin became involved. Ex-Senator Lexow died at his home in Nyack last Thursday. The grand jury will make its report to Judge Swann tomorrow.

TOWN COVERED BY LAKE

Rumors of More Earthquake Disasters Reach St. Petersburg.

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 5.—A message from Tashkent, Russian Turkestan, says there are unconfirmed rumors that the towns of Erzevinsk and Plabepk in the territory of Semirychensk were destroyed by yesterday's earthquake and that a lake has formed on the site of the former. Each town has a population of about 8000.

Communication with the disturbed section is still impossible.

MOQUILA Logging Camps Resume.

MOQUILA, Wash., Jan. 5.—(Special.)—The logging camps have resumed operations after a shutdown during holiday week. The log market is steady. Fir is quoted at \$10 for No. 1 and \$6.50 for No. 2 per thousand. Spruce is bringing \$10 per thousand and cedar \$11 to \$12.

DETHRONED MONARCH OF PORTUGAL TO GET MUCH
NEEDED CASH.

EX-KING MANUEL.

LISBON, Portugal, Jan. 5.—The British government has intervened successfully with Portugal on behalf of the deposed King Manuel. Representatives from the foreign office at London set forth that the exiled monarch was possessed of means insufficient for his personal needs. Accordingly, the Portuguese government has decided to allow him to receive the revenue derived from the properties of the House of Braganza pending a final settlement between the state and the royal family.

DAVIS TRIAL HALTS

Stay Likely, So Marine Officer's Mother Can Testify.

ELLIOTT GOES ON STAND

Retired General of Corps Says Major Was Insubordinate—Incident Leading to Present Court-Martial Is Reviewed.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 5.—Major-General George F. Elliott, United States Marine Corps, retired, testified today against Major Henry C. Davis, who is being tried by court-martial on charges which include insubordination.

Elliott testified that he believed Major Davis and himself which he believed amounted to insubordination.

Major Davis won an important point today when the court decided to hear the testimony of Mrs. Alvira Davis, mother of the accused officer.

A telegram was sent to Secretary Meyer, of the Navy Department, asking permission to adjourn the court indefinitely when it could be learned that Mrs. Alvira Davis, mother of the accused officer, and other witnesses could be here to testify.

The sending of the telegram is a matter of form and a short session of the court will be held tomorrow, when the reply of the Secretary will be read. If he gives the desired permission the court will be adjourned.

Officers Are Unfriendly.

Out of a long-standing unfriendliness between General Elliott and Major Davis grew the charges which led to the court-martial.

Major Davis was accused of insubordination because he wrote a letter to the Secretary of the Navy, in which he declared that General Elliott always had been his enemy and had insulted him.

A trumpeter from the island of Guam, Philippine Islands, where Major Davis was in command of marines, blurred his bugle calls.

Officer Is Suspended.

Captain E. J. Dorn, a retired naval officer, was in command of Guam. He suspended Lieutenant R. F. Ludlow because of the bugler's mistake. Lieutenant Ludlow wrote to the Secretary of the Navy asking that his punishment be not held against his record. Major Davis concurred in his request.

General Elliott, as head of the Marine Corps, seized upon the insubordination, declaring that it showed laxity of marine discipline on the islands. He severely reprimanded Major Davis. The latter wrote to the Secretary of the Navy in which it is alleged he impugned the motive of General Elliott. His court-martial was then ordered.

Although there are 30 counts in the indictment against Major Davis, the main point the court must decide is whether the latter is insolent and insubordinate in tone.

COAL LEASES PROPOSED

Nelson Offers Bill Opening Alaska's Great Fields.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Jan. 5.—Senator Nelson, chairman of the public lands committee, will tomorrow introduce the Administration's bill authorizing the leasing of coal land in Alaska.

The bill authorizes the Secretary of the Interior to issue two-year licenses for prospecting not over 3200 acres by any one person or corporation at 25 cents per acre the first year and 50 cents the second year. The license may be extended another year at the rate of \$1 per acre.

HOTEL ROBBED OF \$5000

Two Masked Highwaymen Hold Up Clerk and Porter in El Paso.

EL PASO, Tex., Jan. 5.—Two masked robbers entered the office of the Angelus Hotel at 4 o'clock this morning and robbed the safe of about \$5000 in cash and jewelry.

The clerk and porter were forced into the basement at the point of revolvers. Thirteen safety deposit boxes were extracted and carried away.

About 25 boxes, containing several thousand dollars in cash and diamonds, were left untouched in the hotel safe. The hotel cash box included \$600. One box left behind is said to have contained \$2000 in gold.

ARIZONA IS ADVISED

Bourne Says Adopt Constitution, Despite Taft.

GRAVENS IF THEY YIELD

Oregon Senator Tells Arizonians They Should Not Surrender God-Given Liberty at Dictation of One Man in Washington.

GLOBE, Ariz., Jan. 5.—United States Senator Jonathan Bourne, of Oregon, in a letter addressed to President Hunt, of the Arizona Constitutional Convention, urges the people of the territory to adopt the constitution promulgated at Phoenix and says they would be unfit for statehood if they failed to do so.

Mr. Bourne's letter, in part, says: "At the outset, let me say that the question of whether the President will or will not approve the Arizona constitution should be wholly immaterial. The people of Arizona had better lose

statehood than yield the control of their own state government. What mockery it is to start the constitution with a preamble declaring, 'We, the people of Arizona, grateful to Almighty God for our liberties, then to harbor for an instant the thought of surrendering or limiting that God-given liberty at the instance of any man who happens to occupy temporarily the office of President.'

"Dictation from one man in Washington should be as distasteful to the people of Arizona as dictation from London was to the American colonists. If the people are so craven in spirit, so doubtful of their own intelligence, of their own ability to govern themselves, as to consider the elimination of the popular government features of the new constitution, then I shall be doubtful of their fitness for statehood."

Continuing, Mr. Bourne says he has no idea of what action the President will take regarding the constitution, but believes that no President will set up his judgment against the judgment of the entire people of a commonwealth, especially when the people have decided that they wish to retain control of legislation."

MISS PANKHURST HERE

She Declares English Women Will Get Ballot in Year's Time.

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—Miss E. Sylvia Pankhurst, daughter of the leader of the British militant suffragettes, and who has been imprisoned twice because of her activity in the cause in the streets of London, is here to instruct American
