**5 DIE, 22 INJURED****Engineer Sees Caution Lights but Fails to Stop Train.****STANDING CARS ARE HIT**

Occupants of Rear Coach Are Plunged to Death When Giant Engine Crashes Into It—Engine Men Jump for Lives.

BATAVIA, N. Y., Jan. 13.—Five men are dead, two probably fatally injured and more than 20 seriously hurt in the wreck of the Western Express and the Boston and Buffalo Special, both west-bound, on the New York Central road here today.

Four of the victims were killed instantly, and one has since died.

The Buffalo and Boston special train, No. 49, was at a standstill in the station yards, when it is alleged by railroad officials, Engineer Lydell, of Buffalo, on the Western Express train, No. 28, ran past cautionary signals and crashed into the rear of the standing train. The signals, Superintendent Evans declared, were in good working order.

The dead: C. C. Perrin, of New York; instantly killed.

Robert McFarland, Detroit, Mich.; died at hospital.

Fred J. Speaker, New York.

W. R. Brown, Syracuse, N. Y.

Leonard Donovon, Philadelphia; identification not positive.

Two Fatally Hurt.

Probably fatally injured: P. VanPeltburg, Bentonville, conductor of the Boston and Buffalo special.

Conditions are such that handling trains is hazardous. A heavy fog prevails and a drizzling rain turns to ice the moment it touches anything. The rails were covered with a coating of ice that makes trains hard to stop.

Train No. 28 reached Syracuse ahead of No. 49 and took precedence on the western division between there and Buffalo. It was ahead of time at Batavia and was awaiting the signal from the conductor to start on time. Train No. 22 followed closely.

Engineer Saw Lights.

Engineer Lydell admits that he saw a cautionary light 4000 feet east of the station, and the railroad officials say he

also admits having passed a signal set against him.

When Lydell saw the tall lights of the express through the fog, it was too late to prevent disaster.

He jammed the air brakes and with a cry of warning to his fireman, jumped.

The train, with scarcely an appreciable check because of the ice on the rails, plowed into the Pullman coach. The heavy coach was telescoped and tossed to one side, the engine going on through the wreckage to the next car, a day coach.

The work of rescue was quickly organized. Vans and cars were used as ambulances to carry the injured to the hospital.

It was two hours after the wreck occurred when the first body was taken out. Soon afterward three more were found near the same spot. All four had been traveling in the rear coach of the forward train, which bore the full brunt of the first impact.

ANGELS GIVE WELCOME**INLAND EMPIRE EXCURSION ENTERTAINED AT LOS ANGELES.****Great Factotum Wiggins Shows 140 Visitors All Sights and Spokane Men Boom Spokane.**

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 13.—(Special.)—The local Chamber of Commerce has suspended operations for a day or two in order properly to entertain the Inland Empire excursionists from Oregon and Washington.

The visitors, 140 strong, arrived late last night and were hustled to the Chamber of Commerce building, where an enthusiastic reception was held. Then they were allowed to go to their various hotels to get some needed rest, but were warned to be ready early in the morning, for Frank Wiggins, the local factotum, was to take charge of them. He guided them today around the kite-shaped track with stops at Riverside, Redlands and San Bernardino, at each of which places they were entertained by the local Chamber of Commerce.

The party will break up tomorrow night, and the members will return to their various homes at their convenience. Many of them will remain in Southern California for some weeks.

At the reception last night, C. M. Fassett, A. E. Gallagher and N. W. Durham, all of Spokane, sounded the praise of the great Inland Empire of the Northwest and said that, although they were glad to be here and see Los Angeles property, they had left behind something just as good.

Postoffice Receipts Increase.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Jan. 13.—(Special.)—Postoffice receipts for 1910 were \$26,151, an increase of \$3089 over 1909. Receipts now average more than \$5500 a quarter and are increasing rapidly owing to the unprecedented growth of the city.

OIL TRUST GRILLED**Kellogg Presents Scathing Argument for Dissolution.****ROCKEFELLER GIVEN DIGS**

Special Prosecutor for Government Tells Supreme Court Standard Magnate Did Not Tell Truth on Stand.

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—Painting the Standard Oil organization as bred by opposing competitors and hanging now as a threatening cloud over the country, Frank B. Kellogg, special assistant to the Attorney-General, today pleaded with the Supreme Court to dissolve the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, as a violator of the Sherman anti-trust law.

He opened the Government's side of the controversy and probably will complete it Monday or Tuesday. Mr. Kellogg spoke for nearly four hours.

Mr. Kellogg went over the early years of the Standard's business leading up to the central point of the present controversy—the organization of the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey in 1899.

Forms Are Illegal.

He characterized this reorganization as merely the substitution of one illegal form of holding together the oil companies for another illegal form. The first was the "trust" of 1892, with its several trustees, and the second the "Standard of New Jersey."

"Take away the fear of prosecution by the Government and the Standard Oil Company would put every independent out of business in five years," Mr. Kellogg said.

Mr. Kellogg dwelt upon the "enormous profits" of the companies as evidence of monopoly. The records did not show where all the profits went, he said.

Milburn Makes Summary.

In a summary, John G. Milburn for the Standard Oil, said: "Damned for anything, but praised for nothing, is the way the Standard Oil has been treated by the Government. In this record, covering 40 years of business, everything the Standard has ever done is related. It has done some things in strenuous times that it should not have done. That was human. It has done nothing that goes to the issue here."

Mr. Kellogg first referred to the re-

bates the Standard received "up to the time this suit was begun."

"I have listened with admiration," he said, "to the charming story of growth and centralization of this benevolent institution. But I mean to tell to the court cold facts. And the equal of this record in oppression is not to be found in the commercial history of this country."

In his argument the question came up as to whether John D. Rockefeller had made a slip once upon a time. Mr. Kellogg said Mr. Rockefeller either did not tell the truth in an affidavit he made in a suit in 1890 about the alleged connection of certain refineries with the "trust," or when he was on the stand in the present trial.

"Didn't he offer any explanation of the affidavit when he was on the stand in this case?" inquired Justice Lurton. "No," he couldn't," responded Mr. Kellogg.

ROAD REGULATION AIM**CALIFORNIA BILL PROVIDES FOR STATE COMMISSION.**

Insurgent Republicans Take First Step in Effort to Drive Railroads Out of Politics.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Jan. 13.—In conformity with the campaign promises of the insurgent Republicans, the state administration elected last November upon a platform pledging it to drive the railroads out of California politics, inaugurated today its programme of reform legislation with the introduction of a Railroad Commission bill simultaneously in the Senate and Assembly. Its essential provisions are:

Enforcement of the Commission's order by contempt provisions.

No arrangement for appeal from the Commission's order.

Penalties both for railroads who violate the Commission's orders or for officers and agents who allow such violations.

Power in the Commission to inaugurate and establish new rates.

Power in the Commission to establish actual rates instead of maximum rates.

Extensive provisions against discrimination.

An anti-pass section.

HUGHES' FUNERAL HELD**Body Rests in Chapel, Awaiting Construction of Mausoleum.**

DENVER, Jan. 13.—Tonight all that is mortal of United States Senator Charles J. Hughes rests in the chapel at Fairmount Cemetery, awaiting the construction of a mausoleum. Following the lying in state for two hours at the State Capitol, the casket, containing the body of Senator Hughes, was carried to the home of the late Senator, where a private funeral was held. Then the last cortege formed and the body was taken to Fairmount.

Both at the home and at the cemetery the utmost simplicity prevailed in the ceremonies.

From 2 to 3 o'clock, pursuant to a proclamation by Governor Shafroth, business throughout the state practically suspended, this being the hour of the private funeral ceremonies. All state, county and city offices were closed during the day as a mark of respect. The Legislature was in session only long enough to adopt joint resolutions of sorrow over the death of Senator Hughes.
