BRYAN VELODS TO FATE EXPECTS NEVER TO BE PRESIDENT, SAYS HIS SPOKESMAN.

Bill Gives Baltimore Conference Broad Hint Bryan Forces Will Line Up Behind Clark.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18.—Democratic Senators and Representatives who attended the Jackson day banquet in Baltimore last night, were discussing with unusual interest today the significance of a warning note which came in the closing minutes of the dinner from ex-Representative Theodore Bell of California, generally recognized at the conference as the personal representative of William J. Bryan.

Mr. Bell did not attempt to start a Bryan boom; in fact he eliminated the distinguished Nebraska man by further consideration as the nominee either in 1912 or at succeeding Presidential year.

"Rate undoubtedly has decreased," he said, "that Mr. Bryan will not be nominated a fourth time and that he will not be elected President of the United States."

But Mr. Bell warned his hearers that if they were seeking a harmony which might bring about future Democratic success they must not continue a policy which omitted Mr. Bryan from consideration as a leader in the party councils.

Previous to his reference to Mr. Bryan, Mr. Bell had taken occasion to pay a high tribute to Champ Clark as a man in whom the Middle and Far West had implicit confidence. Total respect so far as to name Mr. Clark for the Presidency, but by inference his meaning was clear and there are many political watchers in Washington who regard the incident of last night as the lining up of the Bryan element in the party behind Mr. Clark as against Governor Harmon, Woodrow Wilson, or any of the other candidates mentioned for the Democratic leadership.
