APPLE UNION PLANNED

GROWERS MEET TOMORROW TO DISCUSS ACTION.

Regulation of Sales Declared Necessary in View of Prospective Gain in Product.

The meeting called by President Atwell, of the Oregon State Horticultural Society, for the creation of an apple co-operative selling agency company, will be held in the Y. M. C. A. assembly hall tomorrow. The call includes six states—Washington, Idaho, Oregon, Utah, Colorado and Montana. Leading apple-growers from the various orchard districts will be present. Among those scheduled to take part in the proceedings are: Daniel E. Willard, of St. Paul, development agent of the Northern Pacific Railway Company; Fremont Wood, of Boise, Idaho, Judge of the third judicial district of Idaho; Miles Cannon, of Weller, Idaho, prominent apple-grower; E. F. Benson, of Prater, Wash., president of the Washington State Horticultural Society; and C. E. Whistler, of Medford, Or., prominent fruit-grower, of Southern Oregon. The object of the association is to "protect the apple market primarily from indiscriminate dumping of products without due consideration of the opportunities presented by gradual distribution of the crop over a period of time, thus permitting the demand to be held in control so that remunerative prices may be obtained." It is proposed to form a company with sufficient paid up capital to create distributing centers in the various large cities of the East, coupled with ample storage plants to hold the crop and care for it, and through agents to market the product of the mountain and Coast states in such a manner as will not permit slumping of the prices. It is conceded by the fruit-growers behind the movement that the undertaking is a large one, but they believe it is one that can be handled in a practical manner to the advantage of all of the apple-growers. The company is not to be organized with a view to profit for the promoters, but for the advantage of individual members in marketing their apples. It is pointed out that the quantity of new apple trees coming into bearing for the first time in 1911 will equal the number of trees already in bearing, virtually doubling the crop of the Northwest. It is likely that the meeting will last several days. Consultation is to be had with lawyers familiar with the drawing of incorporation papers of co-operative companies in California, where success has met the efforts of the raisin and orange-growers. Delegates have been selected by the fruit unions and local co-operative companies at Hood River, Yakima, Weller, Idaho; Walla Walla, Goldendale, Modoc, Albany, Eugene, Boise and other districts. DATE OPENING NORMAL SET Monmouth School to Receive Students Next September. SALEM, Or., Jan. 22.—(Special.)—That the State Normal School at Monmouth will open next September is the announcement made by J. H. Ackerman, president. It is stated that the State Board of Normal Regents is making arrangements to carry that plan into effect. It is the purpose of the Board to secure the strongest faculty possible, place all the buildings in the best of repair and fit all of the departments with modern apparatus. In many ways the course of study will be materially strengthened and it is the hope of the new president to place the school in the front rank of educational institutions.

REFORM'S CLOCK STOPS

MINISTER SAYS POLICE STATION IS "HELL-HOLE."

Judge McGinn's Method of Treating Criminals Indorsed in Sermon—"Door of Hope" Needed.

"When you find a hell hole like the place where human beings are detained at the Portland Police Station, you can make up your mind that the clock has not only stopped, but that the hands have been turned back. Such a place ought not to be tolerated another day. It ought to be wiped off the face of the earth. Think of keeping a person in there or in the County Jail in idleness, with no recreation, no outer air, no out-of-doors." So declared Rev. James D. Corby yesterday morning in his address on "What o'clock is it in Reform?" in the First Universalist Church, East and Broadway. Judge McGinn's method of treating criminals as diseased individuals was indorsed in the course of the sermon. "Society once built its jails to resemble the infernal regions," said Dr. Corby, "and then filled them with persons charged with misdemeanor or crime and left them there, forgotten and neglected. It was with the idea of revenge, or with the idea of getting even with a man or woman who ran in debt or who committed a crime that long terms of imprisonment were given. The church woke up and in the field of morals we consider the erring and criminal as diseased, learn the causes of the disease and remove them. Over large areas prisons have become reformatories. For 'abandoned hope, all who enter here,' has been substituted, 'the door of hope.' Instead of the stigma of the prison and its certain number of years incarceration or execution, society sends to school until he learns self-control and becomes proficient in some honorable trade. "What o'clock is it in our treatment of boys and girls? For 20 years the George Junior Republic has been training boys and girls for good citizenship. It is not reformatory, but formative. Judge Lindsey has inaugurated the separate court for juveniles and in most progressive communities the child who has been arrested is kept from contact with older criminals. While our state is young and we excuse a great deal for that reason, it is hard to find any excuse for a great state not having any training and industrial school for girls. There is great need.

"In regard to the white slave business, stringent laws have been adopted, but it would seem for the good of society the degenerates ought to be turned over to surgeons who would prevent their reproduction. In view of the silence of parents and teachers it is fitting that our Bible schools should be sane. In this reform the church has come to her own, and now says without hesitancy that what affects humanity is vital and interesting to her. The day of tears has given way to the day of action."
