"I hope that some day it will not be necessary to pick up a new team every year, for that is the hardest part of the baseball business," continued McCredis, "Some day we'll have a big league on the Coast and we won't be losing our hest players each year. Bight now we have a better league than the Easter League and are paying better maari than in that circuit. We are the equal maintin the American Association, which is the best of the Eastern Class A leagues, and I believe the Pacific Coast League will eclipse that circuit in the amount of ealaries naid this season."




