

PORTLAND BOY, MILK, NEEDS \$2000

Millionaire Barrett Won't Assist Son, San Francisco Police Declare.

BAIL RAISED FROM \$500

Former Midshipman in United States Navy Faces Charges of Grand Larceny Preferred by Shreve & Co. and Radke.

(SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 28.—(Special.)—William N. Barrett, Jr., formerly a midshipman in the United States Navy, who was arrested on Friday afternoon on charges of grand larceny preferred by Shreve & Co. and Radke & Company, jewelers, was ordered into custody last night until he furnished either bond in the sum of \$1000 or deposited with the bond and warrant clerk \$2000 in cash. This he failed to do. His bail was raised from \$500 to \$2000.

Attorney Lewis Blyington appeared before Judge Sheriff as a special prosecutor in the case and said that the bail of \$500, which had been deposited by the defendant, was far less than the value of the property alleged to have been taken. Blyington informed the court that the jewelry obtained by Barrett aggregated in value \$3600.

It was said that his father was on his way here from Portland, but this the police deny, saying that the young man has caused the parent so much trouble that it has been decided to let the law take its course.

Young Barrett, the son of William N. Barrett, of Hillsboro, wealthy and a State Senator. The young man attended Pacific University for several years, leaving the academy in 1905. Through ex-Senator Fulton he was admitted to the Annapolis Naval Academy and resigned from the service December 12, 1910.

State Senator Barrett was not at home yesterday when an effort was made to reach him at his residence in Hillsboro. He is said to have recently settled the trouble between his son and the St. Francis Hotel, in which the latter accused the young man of having passed on the hotel company several worthless checks.
