

VIVIAN GOULD TO WED WITH POMP

Elaborate Ceremony to Accompany Marriage to Lord Decies.

MUSIC TO BE EXCEPTIONAL

Reception at Home of Parents of American Heiress to Be Limited in Numbers Present, but Marked by Elegance.

NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—(Special).—Another American heiress will be added to the ever-growing list in England by the marriage Tuesday afternoon in St. Bartholomew's Church of Miss Vivian Gould, second daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George J. Gould, to Lord Decies.

Several young women were married last autumn to me of rank but these men were Frenchmen. Arrangements are complete for the wedding. The bride's dress will be Misses Hope Hamilton, Hannah Randolph, Louise Cromwell, Beatrice Claffin, Emilie Holmes and Allison Pierce, who have been since childhood intimate friends of Miss Gould. Two little nephews of the bridegroom, the Masters Marcus and Graham Beresford, sons of William Beresford and Mrs. Beresford, who live in Providence, R. I., have come to New York with their parents and will act as pages. They will carry the train of the bride's gown as she walks up the middle aisle of the church.

Musical Programme Long.
There will be an elaborate musical programme at the ceremony. While the guests are assembling the choir from St. Bartholomew's and the Cathedral of St. John the Divine will sing and there will be solos by Ricardo Martin, tenor of the Metropolitan Opera. The Rev. Dr. Leighton Parks, rector of the church, and Bishop David H. Greer, of the diocese of New York, will officiate. The floral decorations of the church are to be mainly white and Spring flowers. All the pews will be decorated and the chancel will have masses of lilies and be banked with lily palms. No details of the bride's gown have been given out as her family do not wish them to be known before the wedding. However, she will wear it with the addition of the regulation court train when as Lady Decies she is presented to the King and Queen of England at the Buckingham Palace. While invitations to the ceremony have been general, the reception to follow at the home of Mr. and Mrs. George J. Gould will be comparatively limited. The decorations of the house will be elegant and smart roses will be used. Throughout the reception an orchestra of 50 men will play under the direction of Mr. Nathan Franke.

Couple Off for Egypt Soon.
It is the intention of Lord Decies and his bride to depart for Egypt on board the Carmania on February 18. After remaining some days in Cairo, they will start for Upper Egypt. They will visit Luxor and other places of interest. Their departure for England will be made on a ship called the Captain C. F. G. Sowerby, of the British Embassy in Washington, is at the Plaza to attend the wedding. Mrs. Oliver Cromwell and Miss Louise Cromwell also are there.

NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—(Special).—"Ladies and gentlemen: The first bout of our programme will be between Robert 'Kid' Beresford, champion heavyweight amateur of Great Britain, and 'Spiky' Drexel, amateur prize of New York. After that Kid Beresford will take on for one round Phil Mills, amateur champion of the New York 60s."

RECTOR'S IS ROBBED

Outlaw Loots Restaurant as Guests Are Dining.

SUM OF \$3494 SECURED

Unmasked Man Holds Up Cashier and Compels Him to Hand Over Money—Thief Escapes, Walking Past Police Officer.

CHICAGO, Feb. 5.—(Special).—One of the boldest daylight robberies in Chicago ever known was carried out successfully at 5:20 o'clock this morning, when an unmasked man, armed with two revolvers, entered Rector's restaurant, 126 Monroe street, and, covering John P. Adams, the cashier, and Roy Salasine, the head waiter, with his weapons, compelled Salasine to open the cash drawer, money box and safe, and deliver the contents, \$3494.

The robber then slowly backed out of the restaurant, walked up the steps and made his escape, passing a policeman less than 50 feet from the entrance of the place he robbed. The robbery was one of the most carefully planned the police have been called upon to solve in years. While Adams was standing, hands upraised, and facing against the wall, and Salasine was passing over the money, more than 20 men and women employees of the establishment were sitting and performing their duties in different rooms.

ASHLAND CITIZENS MOURN

Funeral of Representative Eggleston Largely Attended.

ASHLAND, Or., Feb. 5.—(Special).—The funeral of M. P. Eggleston, late member of the Legislature from Jackson County, took place here today and was very

largely attended. The body reached Ashland this morning, accompanied by R. O. Bonbrake, J. B. Westerlund, Dr. C. Smith, E. D. Peterson, George Neuner, Jr., E. P. Carter and Timothy Brownhill, representing the Oregon Legislature, and appointed by the speaker of that body. Dr. H. M. Shaw, a former resident of this city, but now a prominent physician of Salem, was also a member of the funeral party. The sudden and unexpected death of Captain Eggleston was a severe shock to the people of Ashland and much sympathy is felt for his bereaved family. Previous to his election to the Legislature Captain Eggleston was for five years recorder of this city, was the founder and first executive of the Ashland Chamber of Commerce and later served both as president and secretary of the Ashland Commercial Club and was prominently identified with every movement looking to the gradual development and upbuilding of this section. Mr. Eggleston was a graduate of West Point and previous to his coming to Ashland had been in command of several Army posts in New Mexico and the West.

LORDS ISSUE CONTROLS

ALL ELSE OVERSHADOWED IN NEW PARLIAMENT.

Extremists Who Insist on Single Chamber Likely to Be Overruled by Government.

LONDON, Feb. 5.—The new Parliament, which will be the first opened in state by George V and Queen Mary, will be memorable also to the Parliament to decide the status of the House of Lords and thereby probably make the greatest change of a century in the British constitution. Parliament assembled last Wednesday, but the state function was reserved for tomorrow. There are many important measures on the programme of the Liberal party—home rule for Ireland and possibly "home rule all around," the abolition of plural voting; state insurance against unemployment and illness and other extensive financial schemes. But the question of the Lords will dominate, and until it has been disposed of other projects cannot be taken up.

To insure the control of finance by the Commons and settle the issue the Lords raised when they rejected the Lloyd-George budget, the bill proposes that any money bill which the upper chamber does not pass within one month after it is sent up from the lower house, shall become law. Full authority is given the Speaker of the Commons to decide whether any measure deals only with taxation, appropriations and loans and is properly money bill.

The last and not the least important provision reduces the life of a Parliament from seven years to five years. In the statement: "And whereas, it is intended to substitute for the House of Lords as it at present exists, a second chamber constituted on a popular basis, the bill proposes that such substitution cannot be immediately brought into operation."

On the part of the labor and Irish members, the bill is a compromise. The enemies are for a single chamber government. They oppose the reform of the Upper House by changing it to an elective body and would have the Liberal party drop the preamble.

There seems little doubt, however, that the government will introduce the bill as it stands and that it will be passed after comparatively short debate by the combined vote of the Liberal, labor and Irish members and sent up to the Lords for their action.

When the Lords receive the bill, the real interest of the struggle will begin. Their policy is not yet declared nor even formulated.

Glover Has Released Claims as Heir, Declares Counsel for Executor.

PETITIONER IS DISPUTED

Law Against Leaving Great Sum to One Church Not Contravened, Is Contention—Spiritual Education Intended.

CONCORD, N. H., Feb. 5.—An answer to the bill in equity by which George W. Glover, of Lead, S. D., seeks to have the residuary bequests in the will of his mother, the late Mary Baker Eddy, founder of Christian Science, declared invalid, was filed in the Superior Court late Saturday night. It is by counsel for the executor of the will, Henry M. Baker, of Boston, N. H., and for the trustees—Adam S. Hickey, Archibald McLellan, Josiah E. Ferdinand, Stephen A. Chase and John V. Dittmore—all of whom are named as defendants in the original bill.

The answer disputes the assertion of the petitioner in the bill in equity that the statutes of New Hampshire and Massachusetts prohibit the First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, from legally receiving the residuary bequest.

Use Is Not Limited.
While the statutes in question limit the amount of a bequest in any one church, the defendants aver that the request of Mrs. Eddy is intended "for denominational or other uses which are not confined to one church."

The defendants deny that there is no regular system of educational and charitable work connected with the mother church, and say that "on the contrary, the fundamental purpose for which the church was established and exists, namely, the promotion of the doctrines of Christian Science, is essentially charitable, the objects sought to be furthered by such promotion being the furtherance and spreading of religion, the spiritual education of mankind, and the relief and overcoming of sin, suffering, disease and distress."

Another point set forth is that George W. Glover has released all claims as an heir to the estate of his mother and has bound himself never to contest or question any disposition of property which she might make, and therefore does not occupy any position of trust entitling him to the direction and guidance of the court in the performance of judicial duties for which he has asked. It is further declared that the signing of the bill in equity is a flagrant breach of faith on the part of the plaintiff.

Even if the residuary bequest were void, says the answer, in effect it would not go to the heirs at law of Mrs. Eddy as intestate property, but would pass to the church in trust for the execution of her final and paramount purpose, and for the extension of the religion of Christian Science.

Hence, it is argued, the plaintiff, George W. Glover, has no interest in Mrs. Eddy's estate or in the effect of the statutes upon the residuary bequest.

Injunction Is Asked.
The defendants ask that the present bill be dismissed and that Glover and his managing attorney be enjoined and commanded by the court not to bring, prosecute, or maintain, any other proceeding in any other court relating to the alleged claim of interest as an heir-at-law in Mary Baker Eddy's estate.

A paragraph of an alleged agreement with Mrs. Eddy signed for George W. Glover, his attorney, William Chandler, under date of November 10, 1909, is given in the answer. It follows: "I do hereby agree to release my heirs, executors, administrators and assignees, covenant with her and her executors, and to defend and protect her estate, and to discharge of any and all possible claims."

RATE CUT OPPOSED

San Francisco Sends Telegrams to Ripley.

INTERCESSION IS ASKED

President of Santa Fe Requested to Have His Road Withdraw as Competitor; Responsible for Schedule Change, It Is Said.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 5.—(Special).—Action on the part of the Transcontinental Passenger Association in Chicago last Friday when it decided that the special rate tickets for the National Educational Association's convention should be validated in either Los Angeles or San Francisco, as terminal points, has created much surprise in the city where the convention is to be held on July 8 to 14.

The San Francisco convention League and several other civic and commercial organizations have interested themselves in the situation and telegrams have been sent to President Ripley, of the Santa Fe, who is in Santa Barbara, requesting that he intercede to have his road withdraw the opposition that, it is stated, is responsible for the change in the regulations which have prevailed at other conventions of the association.

It is not complained that Los Angeles is included in the ticket itinerary, for San Francisco was included in the itinerary in 1907. But by reason of the attitude taken by the Santa Fe, according to the belief now held here, the special rate tickets will be good upon validation by an agent of the railroad over which the excursionist desires to return home, whether or not the ticket is endorsed by an official of the National Educational Association. This will mean that the \$2 validation fee that always has gone to the association and which is only a source of revenue, will be withdrawn from its treasury.

Whether this ruling on the part of the railroads will have the effect of causing the executive committee of the National Educational Association to select some city other than San Francisco as the place in which to hold the convention of 1911 is a question.

MORE CONFIDENCE IS SEEN

Reflected in East.

Prosperous Outlook for Business

NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—Fresh growth of confidence in the promise of the prosperous outlook for business was reflected in the new uplift of prices and activity of the stock market last week.

The decision of the Union Pacific management to proceed with the doubling of the system by the expenditure of \$75,000,000 extending over the next five years, swept into the background many of the misgivings over railroad conditions which remained.

The programme and the expression of confidence by the chairman of the Union Pacific proclaimed a sense of security which is not impaired by the still undecided question of rate increase, and anti-trust cases before the Supreme Court and the possibility of dissolution of the Union Pacific and the Southern Pacific systems.

Restored confidence on the part of the railroad management may be traced to the ready absorption of new capital issues.

The statement of the United States Steel company said that the daily average of booking of new orders for the corporation had risen in January to 20,000 tons, compared with 22,000 last November and December.

Steel Mills Show Activity.
NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—The steel companies are inclined to make much of the fact that mill operations have increased from 5 to 10 per cent since the end of last month. The larger new orders and specifications have increased activity. The sheet and tin plate mills are operating slightly under 50 per cent of the capacity. The wire mills a little over 80 per cent, and the tube and bridges about 75 per cent. Much of the increase in business has come from export trade.
