### LUMBER KING DIES

Robert Laird McCormick Succumbs at Sacramento.

### LOSS HITS WEYERHAEUSER

Twelve Million Dollar Timber Company Was First Organized by Tacoma Resident; He Was Elected Mayor When 27.

TACOMA, Wash., Feb. 5.—(Special.)—Robert Laird McCormick, secretary of the Weyerhaeuser Timber Company and president of a number of banks and prominent business companies in Tacoma and Western Washington, died in Sacramento early yesterday morning following two days of suffering from an acute attack of Bright's disease. The body is being brought north on the Shasta Limited. The funeral will take place here.

McCormick was born on a farm in Pennsylvania, October 29, 1847, and his early life was spent in that state. Soon after he left school he began working in a railroad office, and when 21 went to Winona, Minn., and took a position in the office of the Laird Norton Lumber Company, which had been offered him by his uncle.

His work ultimately gave him a considerable interest in the Laird Norton Company, and he also obtained extensive interests in the Rhik stone quarries, near Mankato, Minn.

He served as Mayor of Waseca six years, from 1874 to 1880, having first been elected when 27 years of age. So efficient an executive did he prove that when he was 23 years of age he was elected to the Minnesota State Senate, in which he served through two regular and two special sessions. ### FUNDS ARE ASSURED

Reclamation Officials Favor Klamath Project.

### WORK WILL BE RUSHED

Landowners Told That Government Will Commence Operations as Soon as Contract for 15,000 Acres is Signed.

KLAMATH FALLS, Feb. 5.—(Special.)—It has positive assurance from Secretary Ballinger that the Upper Klamath project will have ample means from the Government, and that work is to be rushed thereon as rapidly as it can possibly be done, said Jacob Rueck, the special representative of the Yonna and Langell Valley landowners, who was sent to Washington to confer with the reclamation officials about this part of the Klamath project. He returned to Klamath Falls yesterday.

"And there is but one string to this promise, that being that the landowners sign up on a special contract now being prepared for at least 15,000 acres of the 20,000 acres to come under the Horsety reservoir."

**Work to Be Started.**

The Government will commence this work as soon as the owners sign contract, which is not to have any connection with Klamath Water Users' Association, but is to be handled separate from the rest of the project. They believe that there will be very little trouble in getting the landowners who come under the Horsety project to sign, and if this is done I have the assurance of the entire reclamation force in Washington, from Ballinger

### down, that work will be started on the reservoir dam early this Spring.

Mr. Rueck left Klamath Falls for Washington on the morning of January 3. He was sent there by the landowners of the Langell and Yonna Valley country with two objects in view. The first was to make every effort to get the Government reclamation officials to agree to put water on the lands that were estimated would come under the Horsety reservoir site. In case he could not get the Government to build that part of the Klamath project he was to work for the release of the water covering the Horsety project, which the Government held when it agreed some months ago to release the land under it from the stock subscriptions to the Klamath Water Users' Association.

### Private Capital Promised.

The people of the Langell and Yonna valleys had been promised private capital to build the Horsety reservoir site, but under the ruling of the Government when it released the lands this money was useless, as there was no other water source that could be utilized.

Under the basis of 16,000 acres it is estimated that the cost of building the Horsety reservoir and placing water on the land cannot exceed \$49.77 an acre. The original amount that was to come under this project was estimated at 20,000 acres, and if this amount can be signed up and irrigated, this will cut down the estimated cost about \$10 an acre.

The Government has already expended \$21,000 on the Horsety project in surveys and investigating the system. It is estimated that to complete this entire project will cost \$73,000 more.

"As to the money to complete the project," said Mr. Rueck, "we have nothing to fear. Secretary Ballinger and the other reclamation officials have agreed to see that there is means available for the work as fast as it could be done."

**Elgin Ranchers Sell Wheat.**

ELGIN, Or., Feb. 5.—(Special.)—Many local ranchers are disposing of their wheat, several carloads having been shipped from here the past few days. The price being realized is about 71 cents, while this is a good price it is somewhat discouraging to the ranchers, who threshed in time to

WESTON PROJECT STARTED

### Irrigation Scheme Expected to Be Benefit to City.

WESTON, Or., Feb. 5.—(Special.)—Organization of the Weston Irrigation project was effected this afternoon by

the selection of the following officers: William MacKenzie, president; S. A. Barnes, secretary; J. H. Price, treasurer. These officers, together with G. W. Stagg, O. M. Richmond, George Winn and Frank Greer, constitute the board of directors. All are leading farmers who own or represent large holdings under the project.

The sum of \$6000 has been subscribed by the owners of 6000 acres, to defray the expense of the permanent survey and other work. Engineers will be employed by the board, which is empowered to expend such portion of this fund as may be necessary. No more land is desired, and the construction of the project is now regarded as a certainty.

It is expected that the population of Weston will increase to at least 3000 people within three years. It was founded in the sixties, and, next to Umatilla and Pendleton, is the oldest town in Umatilla County.
